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

HPL Hosts Relationship Workshop



Roberstdale Flood Insurance Relief

Mayor Thomas M. McDermott, Jr. and the City of Hammond are thrilled to announce that our appeal to the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) has been granted for additional flood relief in the Robertsdale section of Hammond. While a public comment period remains, residents in the Robertsdale area should expect to see flood insurance relief on or about May 4, 2018. This means that the remaining 138 primary structures and 89 secondary structures in Robertsdale have been removed from the Special Flood Hazard Primary structures Area. are considered homes, where secondary structures are detached garages and outbuildings. Removal is a direct result of hydrologic modeling and a convincing report by Hammond's consultant, Christopher B. Burke Engineering, LLC, led by its Principal Engineer, Siavash Beik.


"Once again, I cannot tell you how excited I am to announce more flood relief for our residents," said Mayor McDermott. "This has not come easy and has taken a long time to achieve this goal."

The announcement comes just days before the retirement of Mr. Don Novak, Hammond's Flood Plain and Zoning Administrator. "I'm happy to finally have my remaining neighbors out of the flood plain at the end of my career," said Mr. Novak.

In January 2012, Hammond initially received flood insurance relief to 946 primary and 743 secondary structures in Robertsdale as a result of a revised lake level elevation for Lake Michigan at Calumet Harbor, but that modification did not provide relief to many of the structures remaining in Robertsdale area west of Calumet Avenue.

In all, Hammond has removed 4871 primary structures and 4310 secondary structures during Mayor McDermott's tenure resulting in an estimated \$6 Million per year in savings to Hammond residents.

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BNI Student Recieves Scholarship

Making his childhood dreams come true, Bishop Noll senior Michael Quintero has been awarded the Lilly Endowment Community Scholarship, which covers four years of undergraduate tuition, plus a yearly book stipend, for any public or private Indiana college or university.

Quintero was one of only six Lake County students and 143 Indiana students total to receive the scholarship. In Lake County, the scholarship is given by the Legacy Foundation.

"Receiving this scholarship is the biggest honor and it is the biggest accomplishment of my life," he said. "It is a huge honor to represent Bishop Noll and Lake County with this scholarship. Nothing but glory to God for this opportunity. I have known about this scholarship since I was little and I always thought how cool it would be to win. Now I actually get to live out this childhood dream. It is a huge humbling accomplishment that makes me happy to know that I have made an impact in school and in my community."

Quintero is Bishop Noll's 12th Lilly Scholarship winner since the statewide program began in 1998.

After hearing the good news, Quintero felt thankful and honored to have this opportunity.

"I knew it was a dream come true. Not only is it a big deal to me, but it is a big deal to the rest of my family. When my family found out I was representing Noll, they had nothing but confidence in me. It feels amazing to know how proud my family is of me. Most importantly, two days before my interview at the Legacy Foundation, my grandpa died on that Monday morning. It was very hard on my family and I, but to bring this happiness into the family because I won is truly amazing."

Quintero is captain of the basketball and cross country teams at Bishop Noll. He is a eucharist minister at St. John the Baptist and volunteers throughout his community, including at Phyre Ministry and Pierogi Fest.

Quintero, of Hessville, attended St. Catherine of Siena and St. John Bosco schools before joining the Bishop Noll family.

That family atmosphere is what makes his high school special, he said.

After finding out he was Noll's Lilly Scholar candidate and that he would go against 24 other candidates, he began to feel doubtful.

He said all his teachers helped him on the journey and English teacher Rose Mullaney, a Lilly Scholar herself, kept him focused and helped him throughout the process. She made him believe he could achieve this dream.

Mullaney said, "Through his commitment to service and personal growth, Michael has left an indelible mark on Bishop Noll and his community. His hard work and generosity embody the Bishop Noll mission and will propel him to great success at Purdue University. We are very proud of Michael and all that he has accomplished as a Warrior."

Quintero plans to attend Purdue University in West Lafayette and study mechanical engineering.

Hammond Early Entrepreneurs

Cornelius S. Golden was born Dec. 11. 1840 with brother Peter Joseph Golden following on Feb. 23, 1844, the two youngest boys of Isaac & Elizabeth Golden's nine children born on the family farm in Oxford, Adams County, Pennsylvania.

From the time Peter could walk he became the shadow to older brother Cornelius, the boys did everything together to help on the farm and when worries grew with the news of the Civil war in 1861 the boys got even closer. As the call went out by President Lincoln to register for the draft, both boys went together on July 1, 1863. Even though Peter was only 19, he lied about his age to stay with Cornelius and they were "mustered in" (activated) together on March 20, 1865 as Privates with Co. C, 98th Pennsylvania Infantry. Since the war was nearly over, they didn't see much action and both were "mustered out" (discharged) in June of 1865 and quickly reunited with the family back on the farm. In 1867 Peter married Emma (Bushman), their mother Elizabeth died in 1870, and in 1873 Cornelis married Amanda (Dunklebarger). The older siblings had already moved on and with their father too ill to stay on the farm alone, brothers sold it off and everyone relocated to Ambia, Indiana, a small farming community south of Kentland.

The Golden boys had

decided to join two of their Civil War buddies, A. F. Malo and Thomas McKnight who were developing the new town of Ambia around a busy railroad crossroad. Peter opened a lumber yard and by Jan. of 1879 Cornelius had been appointed Postmaster and was a real estate dealer. They prospered and their families grew but when their father Isaac died in 1880, the lure of the growing city of Hammond offered new opportunities; Cornelius, wife Amanda and their seven children along with Peter, his wife Emma and three children relocated again. Cornelius went into contracting house painting jobs which led him to develop concrete foundation blocks. After Cornelius died in Dec. of 1908 his son Edgar took over The Hammond Cement Block Co. Peter Golden's chain of grocery stores, with his son Levi scheduling personal deliveries was innovative and allotted him the prestige of becoming a Government Beef Inspector for the G. H. Hammond Packing Plant. Peter died in Oct. of 1909 proud of his sons Levi & Emery embarking on The Golden Brothers Moving & Storage Company.

Close in life, close in death-The brothers died 10 months apart.

Give Blood to Save Lives Tomorrow

The American Red Cross is urging eligible donors to give more life to patients now and into the new year by giving blood or platelets.

Donations decline during the time between Thanksgiving and New Year's Day when busy holiday schedules cause regular donors to be less available to give and many blood drives may be canceled due to severe winter storms. Last year, nearly 64,000 fewer blood and platelet donations were given through the Red Cross during the seven weeks from Thanksgiving through the first week of January than the average during the rest of the year.

"By taking just about an hour of time today, you can help save someone's life within a few weeks or even days of your donation," said Rodney Wilson, communications manager of the Red Cross Indiana-Ohio Blood Services Region. "We're asking donors to give now to help ensure blood is available when patients need it most."

Blood is perishable and can only be replenished by volunteer donors. Red blood cells, the most transfused blood product, must be transfused within 42 days. Platelets, the tiny cells that form clots and help stop bleeding, must be transfused within just five days. More than half of all platelet donations go to cancer patients who may need platelet transfusions to prevent lifethreatening bleeding during chemotherapy.

"Platelet donors don't have to wait a few weeks to make a difference in a patient's life," said Wilson. "Someone could donate platelets on Monday, and by Friday, those same platelets can help someone's fight to kick cancer."

Kelly Ellison certainly knows that. Twenty-eight weeks into her third pregnancy, she was raced to the hospital with uncontrollable bleeding and received a doubly devastating diagnosis. Not only did she have aplastic anemia a rare blood disorder in which the body's bone marrow does not produce enough new blood cells - doctors also detected kidney cancer. Kelly received 43 units of blood and platelets. Five weeks later, she gave birth prematurely to her son, who also needed blood transfusions to survive.

"Our lives have been forever changed because of lifesaving blood and platelet donations," said Ellison. "Every breath I take is a blessing!"

All blood types are needed this winter. Platelet donations are especially encouraged the first week of the new year, which is among the most difficult to collect enough platelets to meet patient needs. Purdue University Northwest (PNW) will host East Chicago native and U.S. District Court Judge Gonzalo P. Curiel at two Martin Luther King Jr. programs in January. Curiel's address will honor Dr. King's legacy and vision and reflect the programs' theme, "Together we win with love for humanity."

The coordinating events will take place on Monday, Jan. 15 and Tuesday, Jan. 16 at the Westville and Hammond campuses, respectively.

Hon. Gonzalo P. Curiel, judge of the United States District Court for the Southern District of California, will deliver a keynote speech at both programs. Representing Model United Nations

A team of Purdue University Northwest (PNW) students were honored at the global American Model United Nations (AMUN) International Conference. The students' outstanding presentations earned them each awards at the conference held Nov. 18-21 in Chicago, Ill.

The 11 PNW students participating in the International Organizations and Model United Nations course, taught by Associate Professor of Political Science Meg Rincker, were assigned to thoroughly research India's stance on issues before actual U.N. General Assembly committees and then represent those views in a four-day simulation. These topics included: Improvised Explosive Devices, Women Disarmament and Security, Disaster Risk Reduction. International Financial System and Development, Human Trafficking, Human Rights to Water and Sanitation, Sustainable Urban Communities, the Right to Privacy in the Digital Age, Violent Extremism, and Peacebuilding.

The classroom experience led to the fall conference of more than 1,400 students from across the U.S. and the world, representing the 193 United Nation member states. The event gives university-level students the opportunity to learn diplomacy and international relations and experience public speaking and debate through an academic simulation.

The individual team members each won awards

for their position papers. The students included Liliana Andarcia (Hammond), Alexis Ballard (St. John), Cynthia Basu-Chavez (Merrillville), James Cook (Dyer), Alex Heaton (Crown Point), Sean Irwin (Griffith), Sohyun Kang (Yangin Si, South Korea), Jimin Kim (Suwonsi Gyeonggid, South Korea), Matt Ruiz (Schererville), Kylie Smolar (Highland), and Roza Tawil (Hammond).

Students Tawil and Ruiz, both political science majors, worked together on the U.N. General Assembly 2nd Committee for Economic and Finance. They were voted on by their peers on the committee some 300 delegates – to win the prestigious Outstanding Representation Award.

Leading up to the conference, the team's research included interviewing Consul General of India, the Honorable Neeta Bhusan. Tawil wrote a resolution on disaster risk reduction recommending all countries adopt a similar framework to India – research she confirmed when she met with Bhusan.

Purdue Northwest has been selected by a lottery to represent China at the conference in 2018.

With these new changes, and taking into consideration the lateness of the implementation of this new tax bill, it would be very beneficial for a taxpayer to consider filing the 2017 tax returns with a knowledgeable preparer.
