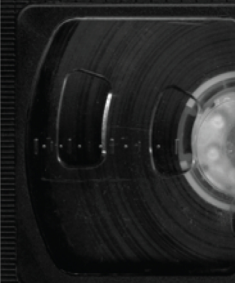

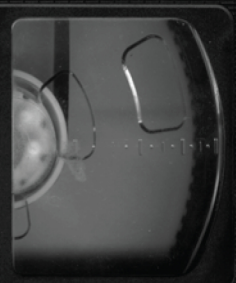

Missing Blood Type New Campaign

As part of an international movement, the American Red Cross is launching the Missing Types campaign to recruit new blood donors – and those who have not given recently – to ensure lifesaving blood is available for patients.

During the Missing Types campaign, the letters A, B and O – the main blood groups – will disappear from brands, social media pages, signs and websites to illustrate the critical role every blood donor plays. When the letters A, B and O vanish from everyday life, the gaps are striking. And when A, B and O blood types are missing from hospital shelves, patient care could be impacted.

“Unfortunately, blood shortages still happen and the number of new Red Cross blood donors is shrinking each year,” said Cliff Numark, senior vice president, Red Cross Blood Services. “That’s why the Red Cross is asking those who have never donated blood and those who haven’t given in a while to make a lifesaving donation. You are the missing type patients need.”

Don’t wait until the letters A, B and O go missing from hospital shelves. Join the #MissingType movement today – make an appointment to give blood by visiting RedCrossBlood.org/MissingTypes, using the Red Cross Blood Donor App or calling 1-800-RED CROSS (1-800-733-2767).

Missing letters can lead to delays in treatment. Lily Dotson and her family know how serious blood shortages

can be for patients. During Lily’s 2 1/2 years of treatment for high-risk leukemia, her family was told twice that the hospital didn’t have the blood or platelets she needed and that she would have to wait for transfusions. It was incredibly frustrating and eye-opening for Lily’s mom, Susie Dotson.

“People automatically think blood is there. They don’t realize we’re relying on their blood donation,” said Dotson. “Lily needed blood products just as much as the chemo or the treatment.”

Lily, now 11, has been cancer-free for four years and is preparing to enter middle school this year.

Each day, blood and platelets are needed for accident and burn victims, heart surgery and organ transplant patients, and those like Lily who are receiving treatment for leukemia, cancer or sickle cell disease. The Red Cross must collect more than 13,000 blood donations every day for patients at approximately 2,600 hospitals across the country.

Every two seconds, someone in the U.S. needs blood. But for the past four years, new Red Cross donors have declined by about 80,000 each year. This is not just a Red Cross trend, but a challenge blood collection organizations face across the country and around the world.

Donating blood is a simple process and only takes about an hour from start to finish.

BNI Alumna Interns at Lincoln Park Zoo

Sienna Gonzalez, Bishop Noll class of 2014, had extra reason to celebrate when she graduated from Indiana University this spring. Out of 9,844 degrees given at the Bloomington commencement ceremony, Gonzalez was one of 41 graduates who earned a triple major; and her combination of animal behavior, east Asian languages and cultures with a specialization in Chinese and biology makes her the first triple major in all three of those departments.

Gonzalez, an East Chicago native, is currently interning at Lincoln Park Zoo as a behavioral enrichment intern in the primate house.

During her six-month internship, she will evaluate enrichment items used in the primate enclosures and create a database of how they benefit the animal. Following her internship, she has been offered a position at the Shedd Aquarium in the marine mammal department.

While a student at IU, Gonzalez completed an internship at the Bifengxia Panda Breeding Research Center in China. She also studied year four Chinese at Minzu University in Beijing, China. She began speaking Chinese at age 12 in the Bishop Noll Prep Academy, the former Bishop Noll middle school.

"My education at Noll

impacted my ability to triple major. I began dual credit, ACP, and AP courses as a sophomore in high school and completed more than half a year in college credits, which allowed me to take more classes in my four years at IU. My college career began a week after graduating from Bishop Noll and every summer for the last four years I took courses that would allow me to complete three degrees."

Gonzalez plans to become certified in animal nutrition and then attend veterinary school in 2020, where she will specialize in large mammalian surgeries.

"I am very grateful for the opportunities offered at Bishop Noll Institute and my instructors who encouraged me to continue my higher education. I am grateful for (Chinese teacher) Julie Niu who gave me the foundations of understanding and learning the Chinese language, because without her influence in my high school education I would have not been able to become one of the best students from my Chinese language department at Indiana University, with the most collegiate, national, and local certification and awards for proficiency.

Purdue Reveals New Ambulance

Local ambulance company, inHealth, unveiled their newest co-branded ambulance to the fleet Thursday, June 21, 2018, at Purdue University Northwest. The ambulance is co-branded with Northwest Indiana Area Health Education Center's mission statement and logo, which will promote the organization throughout Northwest Indiana.

The newly outfitted ambulance was put into service after the unveiling ceremony and will transport patients in Lake, Porter and La Porte counties.

"Our organization is a best kept secret in our region," said Sandy Behrens, center director for Northwest Indiana Area Health Education Center. "The mission of AHEC is to help build Northwest Indiana's healthcare workforce. We accomplish this by developing and funding programs to educate, recruit and train, from high school age to working professionals," she said.

inHealth and NWI AHEC have been strong partners in the region, to develop and provide educational and training

resources to help support the healthcare workforce in Northwest Indiana.

"Our ambulances travel all around Northern Indiana, in a way, they act as billboards," said Ron Donahue, owner of inHealth. "To help spread the word about all the great work charity organizations do for our communities, we donate space on our vehicles to spread their message," he said. "NWI AHEC is a great partner of inHealth, helping to build the healthcare workforce in our region," he said.

Father Stephen Kosinski, Lake County Sheriff's Chaplain, blessed the ambulance at the ceremony.

"This is the result of what can happen when the Mayor, a Councilman, Public Works and Parks work together for the betterment of our community," stated Councilman Woerpel. "It was truly a collaborative effort in determining what was the best use of this space."

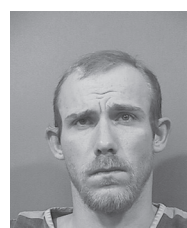

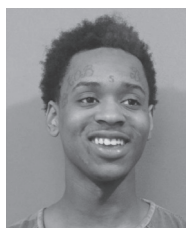

Over 24 days, the Hammond Police Department issued 476 citations and made six arrests as part of the 2018 Click It or Ticket mobilization.

More than 230 Indiana law-enforcement agencies joined thousands across the nation to enforce seat-belt laws in cars and trucks, for both children and adults, in the front seat and back, both day and night. The overtime, high-visibility traffic patrols were supported with federal traffic-safety funds administered by the Indiana Criminal Justice Institute (ICJI).

While many TV shows focus on violent-crime investigations, first responders actually see more traffic crashes. You are more likely to have a property damage crash and be injured or killed in a traffic crash than be a victim of burglary, violent crime or murder, respectively.

“Enforcement of traffic laws intends to prevent the crashes, injuries and deaths that impact our community,” said Lieutenant Patrick Vicari. “With the summer travel season fully underway, police urge motorists to buckle up – every trip, every time – and to use a sober driver.”

2018 marks 30 years since Indiana's seat-belt law began, and Indiana has participated in Click It or Ticket for more than 20 years. Since that time, Indiana – along with 34 other states – has enacted a primary seat-belt law, meaning that police can pull you over for being unbuckled.

From 2000 to 2017, the Purdue University Center for Road Safety says that seat-belt usage increased from 62 to 93 percent, beating the most recent national average of 90.1 percent. Indiana has made great progress through stronger laws and highly-visible enforcement, but the small percentage who still don't buckle up make up nearly half of those

killed on our roadways.

In 2016, there were 10,428 unbuckled motorists killed in crashes in the United States. Seat belts were estimated to save an additional 14,668 lives.

Pickup trucks and SUVs feel safer because they are larger and sit higher to the road. But don't let that lure you into a false sense of security! Motorists in pickup trucks are over-represented in unrestrained injuries and deaths.

ICJI partners with the Indiana University Public Policy Institute to analyze seat-belt statistics. The latest information is at www.in.gov/cji/files/Highway_Safety_Occupant_Protection_2016.pdf. National statistics are at www.nhtsa.gov/risky-driving/seat-belts.

What is the best way to reduce your chances of injury or death? Buckle up! Below are tips for proper seat-belt use:

- Secure the lap belt across your hips and pelvis, below your stomach.
- Place the shoulder belt across the middle of your chest and rib cage, away from your neck.
- Never put the shoulder belt behind your back or under an arm.
- If your seat belt doesn't fit you, or you have an older car with lap belts only, ask your dealer or vehicle manufacturer about seat-belt adjusters, extenders or retrofits.

Have friends or family that are men under age 45? They are the majority of those killed, because they don't take 3 seconds to buckle up.

Don't just buckle up for yourself, do it for the kids. During a crash, unrestrained passengers can become projectiles that injure or kill others in the car.
