

Hammond Unveils New Green Fleet



Hammond Mayor Thomas M. McDermott, Jr. unveiled the City's new fleet of vehicles on April 26th at a ribbon cutting ceremony held at the Hammond Civic Center.

As part of a multi-phased energy conservation program aimed at helping the City go green, Hammond converted much of its existing gas-burning fleet to bi-fuel propane systems and will add 76 new vehicles for its police, inspections, and public works departments, including first response, K-9, and detective vehicles, as well as plow, garbage, and dump trucks in phase I of the program. An additional I 75 vehicles will be replaced in the next three phases.

Savings generated by lower energy, fuel, and maintenance costs will be used to pay for the \$13.5 million in improvements, and will result in an additional \$16 million in savings over the 20 year guarantee period.

A criterium cycling race, also known as a crit, is a bike race consisting of multiple laps around a closed circuit, the length of each lap or circuit ranging from 800 meters to 5 km. The Riot course is 2 km (1.3 miles). Events often have prizes called primes (pronounced /pri:mz/) for winning specific intermediate laps. An announcer broadcast tells the riders that whoever wins the next lap, wins the prime. Spectators are welcome to watch the cyclists compete at designated spots along the Since these races are known to be extremely competitive, sometimes there is bumping and crashes in the pack.



Red Cross Urges **Blood Donations**

This May, the American Red Cross is calling for donors to give blood regularly to be prepared to meet the needs of patients in emergency situations.

According to the National Trauma Institute, trauma accounts for approximately 41 million emergency department visits and 2 million hospital admissions each year.

In March 2015, Kevin Frame suffered life-threatening injuries in a head-on collision during spring break. He received blood products to treat internal injuries immediately after the accident and during multiple surgeries while recovering.

"Without the blood and plasma products made available from donations, I would not be alive today to continue my rehabilitation journey," said Frame, who had to relearn to swallow, speak and walk after the accident.

Regular blood, platelet and plasma donations help ensure that blood is available at a moment's notice. In fact, it is the blood on the shelves that is used to help save lives at the time of an accident or sudden illness.

In trauma situations, when there's no time to check a patient's blood type, emergency personnel reach for type O negative red

type. Less than 7 percent of the population has type O negative blood, and only about 4 percent of the population has type AB blood.

Platelets may also be needed to help with clotting in cases of massive bleeding. Because platelets must be transfused within five days of donation, there is a constant – often critical – need to keep up with hospital demand.





AACSB International Recognizes Purdue

Heartworm Survivor Seeks Forever Home

Lakeshore PAWS animal rescue specializes in assisting and taking care of dogs who are struggling to live a prosperous life.

Carlotta is a one and a half year old female Terrier Mix and has been in LSP's care since November 1, 2017. "Carlotta is one of our longest residents. She has been with us for about six months now," said Kelcey Jonas.

When Carlotta found her way into LSP, her medical examination revealed she contracted heartworms.

Heartworms are parasites which are spread by mosquitoes from one dog to the next. The infant worms begin their journey through the bloodstream and then find their way into the heart and lungs of their host.

Adult heartworms can reach up to several inches in length and cause a strong inflammatory response and a tendency for blood to clot. In severe cases, heartworms plug arteries and restrict blood flow to the dog's heart.

While under LSP's care, the medical staff took it

upon themselves to treat her. "She took her treatment like a champ, you wouldn't even know she had gone through it" said Jonas.


Carlotta has since completed her treatment, is currently heartworm free, and is searching for a forever home to complete her long journey.

"[Carlotta] is extremely scared in the kennels, of the dogs and people walking through so it scares some potential owners away. They don't know that when you get her out she is the most loving and playful dog. She loves any kind of toy you give her and will happily spend all day playing with it," Said Jonas.

Police Chief Nearly Struck by Suspect

Hammond Police Chief John Doughty narrowly missed being struck by a fleeing vehicle on a traffic stop in the early evening of March 12, and the suspect, a 28-year-old Chicagoan Garrick Turner is still at large.

It started at approximately 6:30 PM as Chief Doughty observed a silver Hyundai run a red light in South Hammond. The in-car camera captured the traffic offense on video and the Chief performed a traffic stop. When he approached the vehicle, his body-worn camera captured the driver of the vehicle perfectly.

That would turn out to be very helpful as the driver fled the scene of the traffic stop and nearly struck the Chief before he was able to move out of the way. Turner fled at a high speed through streets and alleys in South Hammond and attempts by the Chief and other patrol officers to locate the vehicle were unsuccessful at that time. Armed with the vehicle registration information, Officer Tim Schultz entered the plate into the new license plate reader (LPR) system and was able to locate the vehicle the next day parked in front of a residence in Hammond.

Detectives investigated and identified a possible driver of the vehicle. Using the images captured on Chief Doughty's body-worn camera, they were able to positively identify Mr. Garrick Turner as the fleeing driver. Mr. Turner is on parole through the State of Illinois for Aggravated Robbery and Attempted Unlawful Use of a Weapon. Charges have been filed by Captain Zeke Hinojosa

for two counts of resisting law enforcement.

"This is the perfect blend of our current technology in use" stated Chief Doughty. "Our officers have completely embraced these new tools and are sending a clear message to criminals. If you come to our city and commit a crime, you will be caught."

Here's how it worked. The in-car camera proved the violation by catching the crime on video, the body-worn camera positively identified the driver of the vehicle by capturing his image, and the license plate reader system (Also known as Hammond's Blue Net sponsored by Hammond Mayor Thomas McDermott Jr.) helped police locate the vehicle in a different part of the city. If you add in a batch of dedicated police officers, you have an unstoppable team effort.

"There is still one price if this puzzle missing that has been very effective for us in the past. Community involvement." stated Hammond Police Spokesman Lt. Steve Kellogg. "Mr. Turner is on the run from the police. A parole violator with two warrants and that makes for a dangerous combination. Mr. Turner needs to be found and we need the community help to find him."
