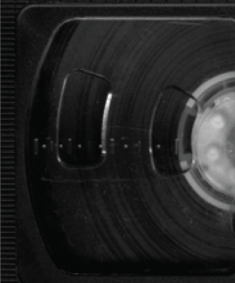

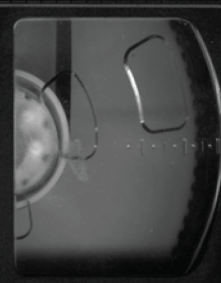

IMPACT Digital Study Underway

The developers of the future Digital Crossroads of America Data Center in Hammond have begun the first inventory of the Northwest Indiana region's public wireless and optical communications systems in more than five years and have hired a Wiesbaden, Germany-based technology engineering service firm that specializes in 5G planning and other network planning strategies to start the process.

"Every community's economic future requires reliable and uniform mobile and broadband data coverage. "When we started an inventory about five years ago, the state of Indiana's systems were just being developed and the larger carriers viewed their networks as proprietary. It was very difficult to get people to share information. The whole world has changed so much and Digital Crossroads has the contacts and the resources to create a meaningful inventory of available assets."

Today, each individual city and town has its own cell and radio towers, fiber optic cables, and small cell coverage (which are cellular systems that cover a smaller radius). The state of Indiana has a different system. There are also private systems owned by large companies and several abandoned systems. Most of these systems are currently not aligned with one another.

Some areas have no coverage, other areas have one type of coverage, and other areas may have as many as 11 different types of digital services.

"This inefficiency happens in most areas of the country," stated Peter Feldman, CEO of Digital Crossroads. "Tom Dakich and I are committed to creating the inventory of coverages and assets as a first step to making a comprehensive plan for NWI

fiber and tower management as a serious part of the creation of jobs and opportunities in NWI."

"Continuing to identify these technological assets in the region is paramount to attracting investment for the jobs of the future," stated Heather Ennis, President and CEO of the Northwest Indiana Forum. "The assets of one municipality benefit the neighboring municipalities and thus creates a more robust, united infrastructure."

As an example, autonomous vehicles require seamless GPS and data connectivity. Cities and towns that can prove to GPS-based technology companies that it has small cell, fiber, and tower assets in place will have an advantage when trying to bring business here.

To accomplish this, Digital Crossroads has brought in seim & partner, an engineering company that specializes in network deployment and planning for companies and municipalities throughout the world.

"Kai Siem and his team have begun their initial analysis" said Tom Dakich, managing member of Digital Crossroads. "More companies would consider locating here if we could show them a demonstrable plan for expanding our broadband and cellular data systems. The first step in this process would be to inventory where we're currently at and then review what our region needs."

The Real ID Law: View from the Bench

About eight months ago, we started to notice it: the court was suddenly being flooded with filings from people seeking to change their names, correct their marriage certificates, and correct their birth certificates. The cause of this sudden deluge soon became clear: the new "Real ID" law.

The Real ID law is not actually new. Signed into law in 2005, this federal law requires states to comply with increased identification standards in an effort to combat terrorism. By October, 2020, you will not be able to board an airplane or enter a federal building without a Real ID (or a valid passport). How can you tell if your Indiana license or ID card is already compliant? If you don't see a star in the upper right hand corner of your license or ID card, you will need to prove your identity to the BMV next time you renew.

It may not be as easy to prove your identity as you think. From what we in the courts have seen, those having the most difficulty are the elderly (born when births may not have been as carefully documented), women (who often have changed names with marriages and divorces), and those born in foreign countries or Puerto Rico (who may have originally been given surnames from both mother and father.)

Problems arise when the identifying documents don't line up. For example, a name on a social security card and current driver's license may not exactly match. Or a birthdate on a marriage certificate may not be the same as the one on a birth certificate. These discrepancies are somewhat common but, until now, have not kept citizens from getting social security cards, driver's licenses, and even passports. With the Real ID law, that has changed, and so people are looking to fix these discrepancies with the help of the courts.

If you find yourself forced to file in court to fix your

documents, the best thing to do is to get help from a lawyer. First, a lawyer can advise exactly what type of petition you should file: name change, birth certificate correction, or marriage record correction. And depending on the proper type of petition, a lawyer can explain other requirements, such as where the petition should be filed (where you live versus where you were born) and whether the notice of hearing needs to be published in a newspaper. Do not rely on legal advice from anyone who is not an attorney.

If you decide to file the petition and appear in court on your own, you should follow these pointers: (1) look up the state law dealing with your type of petition (all state laws can be found online) and review the requirements for filing and proving your petition; (2) arrive to court early to check in with court staff and provide copies of your supporting documents; and (3) bring your birth certificate or naturalization paper to prove your citizenship. It also may help to bring proof of your state residency.

Don't panic if your petition is denied or if it's not set for hearing until after your license expires. People who currently hold an Indiana driver's license can usually still renew them without the heightened Real ID requirements. And you won't need a Real ID to board a plane, etc. until October, 2020. But if the past eight months have been any indication, the number of people coming to court to fix their records will only increase between now and 2020, so it's better not to wait too long to review your documents. Mistakes and discrepancies are more common than you think and fixing them may not be as easy as you'd hoped.

Volunteer to Help Plant Trees

Join the Student Conservation Association (SCA) Calumet Tree Conservation Corps this fall as they plant hundreds of trees in local parks and schools!

The Calumet Tree Conservation Corps is an SCA team of five young adults from the Calumet Region. Lakeshore PBS Back on Air

After more than two months off the air, Lakeshore PBS is broadcasting again after a tower crew was able to make the necessary transmission line repairs on the station's 950' transmission tower.

Lakeshore PBS returned to the airwaves Monday evening, providing service to viewers over the air and on DirecTV, Dish Network and AT&T. Over the air viewers may still be affected by a signal outage, as the lower power temporary transmitter has a smaller coverage area than the original full power transmitter.

Throughout the outage, the station maintained service on Comcast/Xfinity systems across Chicagoland as the station has a back-up fiber connection to the cable provider in place.

A violent storm damaged the station's TV transmitter on Monday, July 16 knocking Lakeshore PBS off the air. After testing and repeated attempts to repair the existing system following the storm, it was determined that the 15-year-old transmitter was damaged beyond repair. Lakeshore PBS then moved forward with purchasing a new transmitter – a more than \$250,000 investment.

TV transmitters are in high demand as stations all across the country have orders in for new equipment due to the FCC spectrum auction and station repack. Lakeshore PBS' full-power transmitter took eight weeks to build and test.

A temporary low-power transmitter was delivered to the Cedar Lake site on August 3. Installation started that evening but was halted as a communication error kept the new transmitter from working with the current system. The next day, the lead engineer worked with the Quincy, Ill. manufacturer to resolve the error.

It was at this time that multiple faults were discovered in the transmission lines, preventing

the temporary transmitter from operating properly. After further investigation, the damage was found which was believed to have been caused by vandalism that occurred on the overnight of August 3.

The station worked throughout September to find an available tower crew that was licensed to work on the TV tower of that height. Vice President of TV Operations for Lakeshore PBS, Matt Franklin described the challenge as a worst case supply and demand issue.

Small windows of crew availability would close when high winds or threatening weather cancelled climbs.

The new full power transmitter is in transit, and the engineers expect to install and transition to the new system by October 16. Viewers may experience short outages as the engineering team works to power up the new transmitter, but the hope is to limit any service outage to the overnight hours.

Lakeshore PBS signed on the air November 1987 as WYIN Channel 56, a community-licensed public television station. The nonprofit organization continued to upgrade the quality of station production and broadcast equipment over the years, and added a sub-channel that airs NHK World on 56.2, offering an English-language global network presented from an Asian perspective. The station, which operates out of its studios in Merrillville, Ind., seeks to be the recognized media resource for citizens of all ages to experience lifelong learning, celebrate human diversity, and engage in civic concerns – all to enrich the lives in communities we serve. Host a Blood Drive American Red Cross

Every two seconds someone in the U.S. needs blood. To help meet the constant demand for lifesaving blood donations and prevent blood shortages this winter, the American Red Cross is urging individuals and organizations to be winter heroes by hosting a blood drive.

Right now, the Red Cross needs about 6,500 additional groups across the country to host blood drives in December, January and February to ensure blood will be there for patients who rely on blood products. "When someone hosts a blood drive, they give donors a chance to donate lifesaving blood, in turn helping to save dozens or even hundreds of lives," said Cliff Numark, senior vice president, Biomedical Services. "Blood shortages are not uncommon during the winter months, and these shortages could cause delays in patient care. But with the help of volunteer blood drive partners, the Red Cross can be better prepared to meet patient needs all winter long."

Blood drive partners who host a drive between Dec. 20 and Jan. 6 will receive long-sleeved Red Cross T-shirts for all who come to give, and if the partner achieves its donation goal, it will be recognized in a national newspaper highlighting its lifesaving work.

Because more than 80 percent of blood donations are made at blood drives hosted by volunteers, blood drive partners play a vital role in helping ensure

a sufficient blood supply for patients in need. In addition to helping save lives, organizations that host blood drives can also build goodwill in their community, bringing people together around a central cause.

Organizing a blood drive is easier than many expect, and blood drive coordinator Joe Turner agrees. Since 2016, Turner has hosted an annual blood drive at his church in memory of his father, Woody, who battled cancer for many years and needed platelets during treatment.

"Hosting a blood drive with Red Cross is pretty simple," said Turner. "The donor recruitment manager takes care of the drive logistics, and I help by asking my friends and family to schedule an appointment to give blood at the drive."

A Red Cross representative works with the host every step of the way, providing planning assistance, tools to recruit blood donors, equipment and supplies, and the trained staff needed to screen donors and collect donations. Blood drive hosts provide a large, open location, identify volunteers to support donor recruitment, and recruit and schedule blood donors. Turner actively recruits blood donors for the drive using social media, flyers and a SleevesUp campaign.

"I would encourage those who are thinking about hosting a blood drive to simply do it. Help your community. Everybody knows somebody who has needed blood, or may need blood at some point," said Turner. "When you think of how many people can benefit from the blood donations given at one drive, that's most rewarding to me."

New Book by Purdue Professor

The effects of miscommunication within organizational communications is the focus of a new book by Purdue University Northwest Professor of English Carolyn Boiarsky, Ph.D.

In her book titled, "Risk Communication and Miscommunication: Case Studies in Science, Technology, Engineering, Government and Community Organizations," published by University Press of Colorado, Boiarsky analyzes models of good communications by Enbridge Pipeline Company in Griffith, Indiana, as well as the Kansas Army Corps of Engineers.

Boiarsky also cites examples of miscommunication between engineers and managers at other organizations prior to the 1992 Chicago flood and the Deepwater Horizon oil spill. Her insights provide help to writers, scientists and engineers who need to inform their leadership and the community about a potential problem.

The author of several textbooks and articles related to writing in technological and engineering fields, Boiarsky was formerly the co-founder of Effective Communication, a consulting firm assisting companies in writing for and responding to regulatory agencies. She has been a member of the Purdue University Northwest faculty since 1995. In addition to her professorship, she is director of the Northwest Indiana Writing Project at Purdue Northwest.

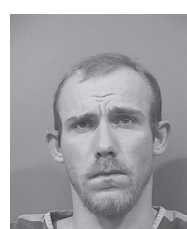

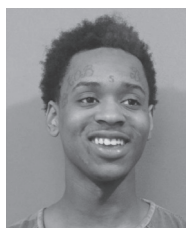
