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

Bioscience Innovation Building Groundbreaking at Purdue Northwest



Hammond Mayor Thomas M. McDermott, Jr. joined other local and state representatives and officials from Purdue University Northwest for a Groundbreaking Ceremony for the Bioscience Innovation Building at Purdue University Northwest, Hammond campus.

With a dig of 12 ceremonial shovels, Purdue University Northwest (PNW) officially broke ground on its \$40 million Bioscience Innovation Building Thursday (Aug. 23). University officials, along with local and state representatives, celebrated the monumental moment with students, faculty and staff as the fall semester began this week.

State Rep. Hal Slager (R-Schererville), who made education one of his priorities since elected to the Indiana General Assembly in 2012, was one of the guest speakers. Slager championed the project at the statehouse, marshalling support of other lawmakers that eventually led to an appropriation of \$35 million in state funds, making the building a reality.

"This institution, this campus, has become an

anchor for northwest Indiana," said Slager. "Our campaign to educate my colleagues in the legislature was not only that Purdue Northwest was an anchor institution, but truly a gateway to northwest Indiana."

"What we are witnessing today is a transformational project for not only this campus, but all of northwest Indiana," said Slager.

The 68,000 square foot, state-of-the-art facility will house Purdue Northwest's College of Nursing and the Biological Sciences department, which is within the College of Engineering and Sciences. The melding of students and faculty from both disciplines was deliberate; designed to encourage collaborative cutting-edge research and advanced STEM educational opportunities across a broad range of areas in the growing healthcare and bioscience industries.

"Health care is the number two economic driver in northwest Indiana," said Chancellor Thomas L. Keon. "There are many opportunities for Purdue Northwest to impact our students and faculty with this new building, and that flows over to all of northwest Indiana. We are truly grateful for the tremendous support for this project from our legislative delegation, donors and alumni, as well as faculty and staff."

Senior Tiffany Coffey recognizes what the facility will mean to future PNW nursing students. Coffey, who graduates this December and plans to work in pediatric nursing, said nursing students currently utilize space in different buildings across campus. "With the new building, it will be really great to have a place we can claim as our own for nursing," she said.

Coffey's sentiment was echoed by Dean Lisa Hopp, whose College of Nursing just earned a second consecutive "Center of Excellence" recognition from the National League for Nursing.

"This will advance clinical simulation and lab space for our continually expanding program," said Hopp. "We also were really focused on the vibrancy of our community initiatives, keeping our partners in mind when planning the space." A biologist himself, College of Engineering and Sciences Dean Kenneth (Chris) Holford said the Bioscience Innovation Building will enhance research and teaching in the high-demand, high-paying bioscience sector.

"Included is an upgrade of our instrumentation to give our students and faculty researchers access to the latest technology, putting them on the forefront of fast evolving fields like microbiology, biotechnology and cellular physiology," said Holford.

Pre-veterinary studies honors student, and goalkeeper for PNW's women's soccer team, Kelley Sharp credits the smaller class sizes and opportunities for student research at Purdue Northwest for preparing her well in her dream of becoming a zoo veterinarian.

"The Bioscience Innovation Building will benefit students with updated lab equipment and provide them the opportunity to get involved in research allowing them to make a difference in a field they are truly passionate about," said Sharp.

Construction of the building on the Hammond Campus began in July and is expected to finish by spring 2020.

Red Cross Urges Blood Donors

In the two years since her diagnosis, Wren has received 16 blood and platelet transfusions, which she calls "unicorn juice," thanks to a crafty nurse who used the term to calm her fears during treatment. These "magic" gifts from generous donors have helped restore Wren's strength and spirit so she can be a normal 5-year-old and fight back against cancer.

In December, Wren and her family hope to mark a special milestone – the end of treatment and the battle with cancer won.

Blood and platelet donors of all blood types, especially type O negative and O positive, are urgently needed to replenish the blood supply following a critical summer blood shortage. As a thank-you, those who come to give blood or platelets Aug. 31-Sept. 4 will receive a Red Cross aluminum water bottle, while supplies last. Make an appointment to donate by downloading the free American Red Cross Blood Donor App, visiting RedCrossBlood.org or calling 1-800-RED CROSS (1-800-733-2767).

A blood donor card or driver's license or two other forms of identification are required at check-in. Individuals who are 17 years of age in most states (16 with parental consent where allowed by state law), weigh at least 110 pounds and are in generally good health may be eligible to donate blood. High school students and other donors 18 years of age and younger also have to meet certain height and weight requirements.

Blood and platelet donors can save time at their next donation by using RapidPass® to complete their pre-donation reading and health history questionnaire online, on the day of their donation, before arriving at the blood drive. Lakeshore PBS Remains Off Air

A violent storm damaged its TV transmitter on Monday, July 16 forcing Lakeshore PBS off the air, and a month later it is still not broadcasting. The station maintains service on Comcast/Xfinity systems across Chicagoland as the cable provider has a back-up fiber connection in place.

After a week of testing and repeated attempts to repair the existing system following the storm, it was determined that the 15-year-old transmitter was damaged beyond repair. Lakeshore PBS then moved forward with purchasing a new transmitter.

TV transmitters are in high demand as stations all across the country have orders in for new equipment due to the FCC spectrum auction and station repack. Lakeshore PBS' fullpower transmitter is scheduled to take 6-8 weeks to build, with an anticipated delivery date of Sept. 26.

In the meantime, a temporary low-power transmitter was delivered to the Cedar Lake site on Aug. 3. Installation started that evening but was halted as a communication error kept the new transmitter from working with the current system. The next day, the lead engineer worked with the Quincy, Ill. manufacturer to resolve the error.

After further inspection, the engineering team from Chicago – contracted by Lakeshore Public Media only 10 days before the storm – discovered what appeared to be multiple faults in the transmission lines preventing the temporary transmitter from operating properly. Station officials are working with local authorities to investigate the damage, which is believed to have been caused by vandalism that occurred on the overnight of Aug. 3.

Vice President of TV

Operations for Lakeshore PBS Matt Franklin stated his frustration with this "perfect storm of unfortunate circumstances."

As engineers continue to work on repairing the faults throughout the 950-foot tower, special testing equipment has been ordered to aid in the process. Once the temporary transmitter is broadcasting, the station will determine what options are available to extend the low-power signal to as many satellite and cable systems as possible. They are also increasing security measures at the site.

"We are very appreciative of the many viewers and members who've reached out to us during our outage, letting us know that they miss their programming and their PBS station," said James Muhammad, president and CEO of Lakeshore Public Media. "Their biggest concern is that we are going dark permanently. Believe us, we will be back as soon as possible. We want to be up and operating more than anyone."

Lakeshore PBS signed on the air November 1987 as WYIN Channel 56, a communitylicensed public television station. The nonprofit organization continued to upgrade the quality of station production and broadcast equipment over the years, and added a sub-channel that airs NHK World on 56.2, offering an Englishlanguage global network presented from an Asian perspective.
