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

Residents Receive Flood Relief Insurance

Mayor Thomas M. McDermott, Jr. is thrilled to announce that the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) granted flood insurance relief for additional residents in the Forest Avenue and Stateline Avenue sections in southwest Hammond. Residents will receive flood insurance relief on November 14, 2018 after FEMA approved the Letter of Map Revision prepared by the US Army Corps of Engineers in cooperation with the Little Calumet River Basin Development Commission and the City of Hammond. This means that the remaining 25 residential homes and their secondary structures, like garages, will be removed from the Special Flood Hazard Area.

"For the second time this year, I'm excited to announce more flood relief for our residents," said


Mayor McDermott. "This has not come easy and has taken a long time to achieve this goal."

On May 4, 2018, 227 structures were removed from the Special Flood Hazard Area in the Robertsdale section of Hammond as a result of engineering studies proved structures were not at risk. In January 2012, Hammond received flood insurance relief to 1,700 structures also in Robertsdale as a result of a revised lake level elevation for Lake Michigan at Calumet Harbor.

In all, Hammond has removed over 4,896 homes and 4,310 secondary structures during Mayor McDermott's 15 years in office resulting in over \$6.2M in savings to Hammond residents.

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Hammond Interest in Gary Gaming License

Hammond Mayor Thomas M. McDermott, Jr. announced his support for the relocation of a casino license that is currently held by the Majestic Star Casino in the City of Gary to a location in the City of Hammond. "Today a legislative study committee recommended relocating the two licenses held by Majestic Star in Buffington Harbor. We want the legislature to relocate one of Majestic Star's licenses to Hammond," said Mayor McDermott.

With the State's largest grossing casino located in Hammond at the border with Chicago, Hammond has been a success story in the gaming industry. "Month after month and year after year, Hammond's Horseshoe Casino leads the way in gaming revenue and taxes generated for the State of Indiana. There isn't any reason the city can't continue to make even more money for the state by taking advantage of its border with Illinois," said the mavor.

The City Council is currently considering a resolution that would indicate the City's desire to have one of the licenses currently held by the Majestic Star be relocated by the State to Hammond, Lake County's largest city. "In 1994 part of the rationale was two licenses in Gary because it was the largest city in Lake County. Now we are, and we have a track record of success in gaming," said Dave Woerpel, Hammond's 5th District Councilman and sponsor of the resolution.

In 1994, the Indiana Gaming Commission issued

two gaming licenses for casinos to be located in the City of Gary. Two years later, two "riverboats" opened in Buffington Harbor, Trump Casino and Majestic Star. The law was later expanded to allow for ten "Riverboat" Casinos, including successful Horseshoe Casino in Hammond, the successor to the Empress Casino that opened in 1998. In 2015, the Indiana General Assembly allowed for further gaming expansion and permitted land based casinos to be located in the State of Indiana.

Due to a transfer of ownership from Trump casino, Majestic Star now holds both gaming licenses, one of which cannot be transferred or sold without a change in Indiana law. The City of Hammond supports the transfer of a single license from Buffington Harbor to a land-based location. "If the State wants to move the licenses to land-based locations, I'm fine with that, I support that as it hopefully will help Gary pursue other economic development opportunities. I just want to make sure that one of the licenses comes to Hammond where it belongs and where revenue can be increased for the city, county, and state. With sports book gaming around the corner and all the competitive advantages we have in Hammond, it is a nobrainer to put another casino in Hammond. As a state we have a tremendous opportunity here" said Mayor McDermott.

Give Thanks By Giving Blood

The American Red Cross is facing a severe blood shortage and urgently needs blood donors to give now to avoid delays in lifesaving medical care for patients. Volunteer blood drive hosts are also critically needed to prevent the shortage from worsening this winter.

During September and October, the Red Cross collected over 21,000 fewer blood and platelet donations than what hospitals needed. Blood donors of all blood types, especially type O, and platelet donors are urged to make an appointment to donate at RedCrossBlood.org or by calling 1-800-RED CROSS (1-800-733-2767).

Fewer blood drives in September and October coupled with hurricanes Michael and Florence, which caused thousands of blood and platelet donations to go uncollected, were key contributing factors to the current blood shortage.

"This time of year, as many give thanks for family, friends and good health, it's important to remember that patients across the country cannot survive without your generosity," said Rodney Wilson, communications mananger for the Red Cross Indiana Ohio Blood Services Region. "From traumas to ongoing cancer treatments, the need for blood doesn't stop for the holidays. People can give back – and help those in need – by making a lifesaving blood or platelet donation now and hosting a blood drive in the weeks to come."

An additional 4,300 blood drives nationally - and approximately 120 blood drives locally in the Indiana Ohio Region - are needed in December, January and February to help stop the shortage from continuing throughout winter. Donations often decline during the winter holidays when many groups postpone blood drives while regular donors are busy with holiday activities and travel. Severe winter weather may also cause blood drive cancellations contributing to fewer donations than needed.

To encourage donations around the Thanksgiving holiday, those who come to donate blood or platelets with the Red Cross Nov. 21-24 will receive a long-sleeved Red Cross T-shirt, while supplies last.

The American Red Cross shelters, feeds and provides emotional support to victims of disasters; supplies about 40 percent of the nation's blood; teaches skills that save lives; provides international humanitarian aid; and supports military members and their families. Novel Discussions Group at HPL

The story in Emma Donoghue's Room unfolds through the eyes of five-yearold Jack, who (along with his young Ma) has been kidnapped and held prisoner in a supersecret, secure place by a sex pervert whom Jack and Ma call Old Nick. To survive, Ma requires Jack to live by strict rules, follow daily rituals, play games and tell stories. The first half of the novel focuses on Ma's single-minded goal to protect Jack from their wacko captor, whom Jack knows only as a demonic presence whom he sometimes observes from the wardrobe where he sleeps.

Necessary spoiler alert: Ma works out a successful escape plan; and the second half of the story shifts to the world beyond the room and the problems and terrors that await Ma and Jack when they confront their newfound liberation.

I was deeply touched by Room's tribute to human resourcefulness and its insights into how a mother and child might think and interact in an extreme situation like this. Room has also been made into a movie.

We're going to be discussing this book at the Hammond Public Library at 6:30 on Monday evening, Dec. 3. Come join us! The library is at 564 State St., at the corner of Sibley and Sohl.

We discuss a different novel on the first Monday of each month, with some minor exceptions. (For example, if the first Monday of the month is Memorial Day, the discussion is moved to the second Monday). The meetings are usually held in the Lois Bell room, which is at the back of the library's audio

CD and DVD room, next to the checkout counter. If there are too many participants, the meeting may move to another room; so ask at the checkout counter. The movie is largely faithful to the book; and if you've already seen the movie, you can probably discuss the book competently.

In October, there were seven of us in attendance for a lively discussion of John Boyne's The Boy in the Striped Pajamas. In September, we discussed Kristin Hannah's The Nightingale. Meetings start at 6:30 in the evening and last about an hour or an hour and a half.

In January, we're tentatively scheduled to discuss Theodore Dreiser's American Tragedy. The books to be discussed are selected from a lengthy list of books of which we can easily obtain multiple copies. Participants have input into the selection process.

The discussion is free to anyone who wants to participate. While supplies last, persons who have a Hammond Library card can borrow a copy of the book from the HPL. Others can also attend, but it is up to them to obtain their own copy of the book - for example, from another library or from Audible or Ebay.

No registration or sign-up is necessary. Just show up and be ready for a lively discussion. Participants sometimes bring a snack to share, but that's not mandatory. Students, parents, and teachers from surrounding schools (as well as local residents) are welcome!

Bishop Noll Institute junior Giovanni Komyatte has a passion for medicine and joined other high school students from around the country who aspire to become the next generation of leaders in the medical field.

Komyatte represented Bishop Noll and Indiana at the National Leadership Academies' Congress of Future Medical Leaders, which took place in Boston, Massachusetts.

The Highland resident was taught by some of the greatest minds in medicine including winners of international prizes, prominent medical school academic leaders and prodigies who are leading the future of medicine.

"It was a great experience to be with so many people who share a passion for science and medicine," said Komyatte, who attended elementary school at Our Lady of Grace School. "It was amazing to hear from not only the people who know about current scientific advances, but are actually making the advances."

He was nominated for the congress his freshman year at Noll but was unable to attend. As a sophomore, he was able to take advantage of the opportunity. The congress is one of many ways attending Bishop Noll is helping him prepare for a career in the medical field. Another is the advanced science classes he takes.

"Many schools don't give students the opportunity to take college level biology and chemistry, and Bishop Noll's offering of them has helped me know that science is the right field for me," Komyatte said. "Biology Club has also been extremely helpful because it offers the opportunity to learn even more about biology and how it can be pursued through college and life after."

Rebecca Dostatni, Komyatte's biology teacher and Biology Club sponsor, is one of his inspirations because of her passion for science.

"Her love for biology is infectious and she really helped me to discover my interest in medicine," he said.

"Giovanni is an incredible science student," Dostatni said. "He has a great deal of natural ability but is also a diligent worker. He enjoys taking advantage of any opportunity he can for himself by joining various science related activities like Biology Club and Science Olympiad.

"The Biology Club has made several visits to the University of Chicago's Human Genetics labs and Giovanni is always optimistic about these experiences. He has even read a scientific journal article and discussed it with its author before it was published. Giovanni is curious about science and medicine, and has already taken the initiative to immerse himself in experiences that enhance his knowledge of these subjects while preparing him for the challenges of a career in medicine."

His education at Bishop Noll and attending the congress helped Komyatte realize who he is and what he can do. "Before going to the congress, I was not as confident in my abilities and future as I am now. It showed me that I was downplaying my strengths and overplaying my fears."



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City Files Suit Over Copper Theft

Mayor Thomas M. McDermott, Jr. made good on a promise this week when the City of Hammond filed a lawsuit against two men accused of vandalizing the city over the summer. The lawsuit alleges that Jossean M. Echevarria of Becker Street in Hammond and Diquan N. Ray of Burnham, Illinois spent over three months stealing copper wire from city lights including those at schools, parks, ball fields, and streets. "I want these guys to know that Hammond isn't going to just stand by and let this happen. They will pay the price criminally I hope, but these two and people like them will also pay the heavy price of a civil money judgment hanging over their heads when they get out," said Mayor McDermott.

Both Echeverria and Ray have been charged with federal crimes of transporting stolen property across state lines. They were caught on September 24th by Hammond police after allegedly committing a theft of wire from a Calumet City park. They await trial on these federal criminal charges. "The United States attorney's office in Hammond has done an outstanding job in ensuring these two will face stiff penalties if convicted. I appreciate United States Attorney Thomas Kirsch's partnership and willingness to help our city," said the mayor.

The civil suit requests \$1,500,000 in damages as Indiana law allows the tripling of damages when a crime has been committed. The suit contends that the amount of copper wire stolen is estimated at 50,000 linear foot. "These two spent their summer harming the City of Hammond. Anyone who does that needs to know the city will hunt them down and make sure they pay the price. This lawsuit should send a very strong message," said Mayor McDermott. The suit is currently pending in the Lake County Superior Court.
