## Hammond Tests Soil **Around Lost Marsh**

Hammond Mayor Thomas M. McDermott, Jr. has announced that with the sudden death of over 12 swans around the George Lake area, he has instructed the Hammond Department of Environmental Management (HDEM) to begin testing the area around the Lost Marsh Golf Course for the presence of abnormal amounts of lead in the soil.

Ron Novak and his HDEM team will use a recently purchased Olympus Vanta C Series analyzer to test the soil. This analyzer is a handheld x-ray fluorescence (XRF) device that provides rapid, accurate element analysis and alloy identification with laboratory-quality results in the field. XRF analyzers can measure the following metals in soli: antimony, arsenic, barium, cadmium, chromium, cobalt, copper, gold, iron, lead, mercury, nickel, selenium, silver, thallium, tin, uranium and about 17 other metals. This type of incident

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is obviously unusual, and we think the high lead levels found in the swans carcasses came from a recent fire at Whiting Metals on September 20, 2018. That fire started in the bag house and had to be put out by the Hammond Firefighters, resulting in the escape of lead particles meant to be captured in Whiting Metals bag house.

"I want the residents of this section of Hammond to know that we are taking this situation seriously," stated Mayor McDermott. "The area around the Lost Marsh Golf Course was the area the prevailing winds on September 20th would have carried the discharge from the Whiting Metals fire. We will obviously keep everyone in the loop as we receive the results from these soil tests."

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## Purdue Receives Arcelor Mittal Grant

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## Free Program Pairs Mothers with Nurses

In mid-December, ten mothers became the first class to graduate from Goodwill's Nurse-Family Partnership in Lake County — a two-and-ahalf year maternal-child health program that's proven to reduce infant deaths, child abuse and injuries, youth substance abuse and youth arrests.

Goodwill's Nurse-Family Partnership — available in 30 Indiana counties — is an evidence-based, home visitation program that pairs low-income, first-time moms with personal nurses. Registered nurses meet with expectant moms early in their pregnancies to encourage healthy lifestyle choices that can have a direct impact on infant mortality — this includes good nutrition, stress management, nicotine cessation, and avoiding legal and illegal substances that can harm their children. Nurses continue to meet with families until children turn age 2, closely monitoring developmental milestones and teaching parenting skills. The program is free and voluntary.

A team of registered nurses are currently working with 153 mothers in Lake County, and 25% of those reside in the county's top three zip codes for infant mortality. The zip code with the largest number of Nurse-Family Partnership mothers is East Chicago (46312 with 22 moms). East Chicago has the highest rate for infant mortality in the state. Other high risk Lake County zip codes being served are both in Hammond (46324 with 12 moms and 46320 with five moms). Seven out of every 1,000 babies born in Indiana

die before their first birthday — about 600 infants each year.

Research shows that early intervention through home visiting programs yields a lifetime of benefits. Specifically, Nurse-Family Partnership is backed by 40 years of research proving better maternal health and birth outcomes. Children are more prepared to enter school and less likely to be abused. And they're even less likely to commit juvenile crimes. One study estimates a return of \$7.10 for every dollar invested in Indiana children through the program.

December's Lake County graduation brings the total number of Indiana moms successfully completing the program to 639 with nearly 3,200 families receiving some kind of service from Goodwill's Nurse-Family Partnership. Goodwill was the first agency to implement Nurse-Family Partnership in Indiana, beginning in Marion County only in late 2011. Services for Lake County - made possible through Indiana State Department of Health funding — began in January 2016 in collaboration with Goodwill Industries of Michiana.

## Emergencies Don't Take Holidays

Now is an important time to give blood. A seasonal decline in donations occurs from Thanksgiving to New Year's Day when donors become busy with family gatherings and travel. In addition, severe winter weather can cause blood drive cancellations and negatively affect the blood supply. Patients like McMahon can't afford for there to be a shortage of blood.



## Purdue Alumni Fulfills Father's Wish

When Heather Zivkovich completed her academic journey at Purdue University Northwest (PNW) 12 years ago, she never could have guessed that someday she would publish a children's Christmas book.

"I took a lot of communications classes and it gave me more confidence in myself. I was a pretty shy student at first," said Zivkovich, who earned a bachelor's degree in Liberal Arts at PNW's Westville Campus.

"I also had professors that gave me confidence in myself," she said, crediting among others her academic advisor, Beth Rudnick.

"Heather was a bright star at Purdue Northwest. It's completely fitting of her nature to finish her dad's book as a tribute to his love," said Rudnick, referring to Zivkovich's book published last November, "Is My Grandpa Santa's Elf?"

The book, though born of tragic circumstances, carries a message of love and kindness related with the spirit of Christmas. The co-author is Bob Morgan, Zivkovich's father, who passed away in April 2017.

Only hours before his death, Morgan shared a secret with his daughter—that for years he had been writing a Christmas book. His last wish was for her to pick up where he left off; a bequest Zivkovich did not take lightly. "It became my mission to finish it," she said.

"I assured him to not worry, that I would finish it for him. Six hours later, he peacefully passed away with my mom, siblings, and me by his side," said Zivkovich.

The next day, finding everything on her father's computer, Zivkovich started putting the pieces of the story together. She lovingly mused at her father's writing style, "He liked run-on sentences, so there was a tiny bit of cleaning up to do."

The story is about Kay Rose, a young girl inspired by Zivkovich's niece, and her inquisitiveness into whether her jolly, Christmas-loving grandfather is, indeed, one of Santa Claus' elves.

Mary Jane Eisenhauer, associate professor of Early Childhood Education at Purdue Northwest, said the colorful illustrations take young readers through a magical story capturing the essence of family and the holidays.

"Children will be drawn to the fun storyline and the beautiful artistry. Adults will recognize the importance of tradition and reminders of enduring love," said Eisenhauer.

It's a heartfelt sentiment drawn directly from Zivkovich's connection with her father.

"We'll have this bond forever; our relationship lives on in this book. Long after I'm gone, this book will still be out there bringing families together," said Zivkovich.

"Is My Grandpa Santa's Elf?" is published by Mascot books and available at most retailers, including Amazon. A page of the same title can be found on Facebook.

Zivkovich will have the opportunity to employ her communication skills in an upcoming Christmas Eve appearance on Chicago's WGN Channel 9.

## PNW Closed on Poetic Chapter in 2018

Regarding new years, Nobel Prize winning poet T.S. Eliot was quoted saying, "To make an end is to make a beginning."

Purdue University Northwest (PNW) entered 2018 and wrote an exciting chapter in its history, filled with several firsts, shattered records and new beginnings. In years to come, 2018 will be remembered as a momentous one for PNW.

Here are some highlights of 2018 at PNW:

Purdue Northwest grew to three destinations through the \$12 million gift by the Gabis family of the former Taltree Arboretum & Gardens near Valparaiso. The site is now the Gabis Arboretum at Purdue Northwest and remains one of the country's most vital arboretums, open to the public.

Pulitzer Prize winning author Edward Humes enlightened students in March about our wasteful ways as he hosted a panel discussion on his book, "Garbology: Our dirty love affair with trash—and the way back."

PNW brought together community leaders and advocates working on the front lines of the opioid crisis in northwest Indiana for a day-long conference at the Westville Campus.

PNW's College of Business received a prestigious recognition from AACSB International for its pilot partnership with Junior Achievement of Chicago-Northwest Indiana. PNW was among only 30 institutions recognized globally.

Supporters of PNW raised a record \$1,058,979 in 24 hours in April during Purdue Northwest's Day of Giving.

In July, the NCAA approved Purdue University Northwest athletics for its third and final provisional year to becoming a full member of NCAA Division II.

For the second consecutive time, PNW's College of Nursing was named as one of 16 "Centers of Excellence" by the National League of Nursing.

PNW began a new collaboration with the Society of Innovators of Northwest Indiana, further enhancing its role as the Region's gateway for creators, innovators and entrepreneurs.

The ground at PNW's Hammond Campus shook in August for the ceremonial groundbreaking on the new \$40.5 million Bioscience Innovation Building.

Purdue Northwest shared the national spotlight as the Sinai Forum kicked off its 65th season with Former FBI Director James Comey. Other noted speakers for the year included Washington Post reporter Robert Costa and legendary college football coach Lou Holtz.

In October, PNW's Westville Campus hosted the university's first nationallytelevised political debate in Indiana's hotly contested race for the U.S. Senate.

The Purdue Northwest Counseling Center on Indianapolis Boulevard in Hammond, housing PNW's Marriage and Family Therapy Center, and Community Counseling Center, officially opened.

Men's soccer became PNW's first NCAA Division II team ever to host a postseason conference match.

Purdue Northwest awarded its first applied doctoral degrees in the College of Nursing—a poetic ending to the year.

This leads us back to Eliot, who also said, "For last year's words belong to last year's language. And next year's words await another voice."

Just a voice? At PNW, 2019 will hear us ROAR. Happy New Year, to all, and thank you for supporting Purdue University Northwest!

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## HFD Reminds Residents of Ice Safety




The suspect is pictured above: Lisa Marie Rodriguez of Hammond.

On December 4th, at approximately 12:45 PM, the Hammond police department was dispatched to Saint Margaret's Hospital in the 5400 block of Homan Avenue in reference to an unresponsive 4-month-old child brought into the emergency room.

The infant was pronounced dead at 12:28 pm. Detectives immediately began an investigation and learned of multiple injuries to the infant. After a thorough investigation, the mother of the infant was charged with Murder, Neglect of a Dependent Resulting in Death, and Battery of a person under the age of 14-years-old.
