HDEM Releases **Testing Results**

The City of Hammond Department of Environmental Management (HDEM) and Hammond Mayor Thomas M. McDermott, Jr., have reviewed the results of the recently gathered X-Ray Fluorescence (XRF) Soil Data samples taken by HDEM at the Lost Marsh Golf Course, and around the North Basin of George Lake. The Mayor ordered the soil testing to determine if city property contained dangerously elevated lead and arsenic levels, and if so, were those levels in any way responsible for the recent avian deaths near that location.

The areas sampled included 27 locations near George Lake, the Lost Marsh Golf Course and in and around the bike path located in the George Lake area. The Mayor is pleased to report that the readings obtained at the Lost Marsh Golf Course were well within EPA acceptable residential lead and arsenic levels. There were two lead. and two arsenic readings, taken along the bike path on the north side of George Lake and adjacent to the former Federated Metals site, which were slightly above the EPA screening levels for residential areas. but were well below current EPA levels requiring a

removal action. Additional testing will be conducted in closer proximity to the former Federated Metals site to determine if lead levels are elevated and require a removal action.

The EPA considers 1200 mg/kg of lead a quantity calling for an immediate removal action (where sensitive populations are present) while 400 mg/ kg and below is considered a level safe for residential areas. The testing results near George Lake show the area is safe for recreation, and these results are far below the 91,100 mg/kg levels discovered in the East Chicago West Calumet Housing Complex area which required residents to vacate the area.

The Mavor and his staff will have an information meeting concerning the testing results and data collection process at Calumet College on Tuesday, January 22, 2019. and concerned citizens are encouraged to attend and speak with the HDEM staff directly. HDEM will continue to perform additional soil testing along the bike trial and will provide the results of that additional testing when complete.



BNI Student Visits Washington DC

Bishop Noll Institute junior Anthony Pizana found himself while at a seminar more than 600 miles away from home.

Pizana, of Hobart, was selected to be a leader at the Washington Youth Leader Seminar, which is run by the League of United Latin American Citizens (LULAC). This annual leadership development program brings together 50+ future Latino leaders from across the U.S. and Puerto Rico to participate in five days of leadership and advocacy training and peer bonding exercises. Pizana felt that these activities were done in hopes of creating a "tight knit group of leaders engaged and energized to make a difference in the Latino community."

"I was alongside 56 other people who are crazily ambitious in what they want to do," Pizana said.

Pizana, who attended elementary school at St. Bridget School in Hobart and St. Mary School in Griffith, was chosen to be a representative for Indiana because he has been involved in LULAC, the nation's oldest Hispanic civil rights organization, since he was young. He currently works with the LULAC Duneland Council

#5016 in Chesterton, Ind., which helps high school students who struggle financially receive college scholarships.

While in Washington, Pizana met new peers and learned about them and their backgrounds. He and his new friends got to do many fun activities such as eating out and visiting the Senate building. They also met with policy and legislative aides from the Missouri and Indiana senators who were receptive to the students' criticisms regarding issues of education.

"The most important thing that I took away from my experience was my sense of self," he said. "I was able to regain and enjoy things that I haven't done in a very long time and it helped boost my selfconfidence. The Washington trip helped me find myself mentally ... I never wanted to leave, and neither did the other people. This trip has made me realize there are a lot more things to life than I simply thought before and the because of this experience, it's helping me flesh out the things that I want to do."

Emergency: Winter Blood Shortage

A donation shortfall over the winter holidays is prompting the American Red Cross to issue an emergency call for blood and platelet donors to give now to prevent a blood shortage from continuing throughout winter and affecting patient care.

The Red Cross collected more than 27,000 fewer blood and platelet donations the weeks of Christmas and New Year's than needed to sustain a sufficient blood supply. During this period, about 1,350 fewer blood drives were hosted by volunteer sponsor groups than required to meet patient needs as busy holiday schedules kept many donors away.

"Many people may not realize that blood products are perishable, and the only source of lifesaving blood for patients is volunteer blood donors," said Rodney Wilson, communications manager for the Red Cross Indiana Ohio Blood Services Region. "When donations decline, lifesaving medical treatments could be delayed, especially if winter weather and flu season further complicate the situation."

Right now, the Red Cross has less than a threeday supply of most blood types on hand, well below the ideal five-day supply needed to respond to emergencies and daily hospital needs. Blood products are currently being distributed to hospitals faster than donations are coming in.

"We hope people can resolve to save lives now when there is an emergency need – as well as throughout the year," added Wilson.

All eligible donors, especially those with type O blood, are urged to make an appointment to give in the coming days to help restock the shelves for hospital patients. Eligible donors can find a blood or platelet donation opportunity and schedule an appointment to donate by using the free Blood Donor App, visiting RedCrossBlood.org or calling 1-800-RED CROSS (1-800-733-2767). Volunteer blood drive hosts are also critically needed to prevent the shortage from worsening this winter.


