Girls on the Run Looks to Empower

Girls on the Run, GOTR, of Northwest Indiana is looking for girls third to eighth grade to be a part of their spring season.

Online registration for the two programs recently opened and will be available until March 15. GOTR is the program for third to fifth grade, and Heart & Sole is for sixth to eighth grade, which both start March 4.

GOTR is a 10-week program which meets two times a week. The meetings focus on not just running though; there is an activity that has to do with social and emotional learning during every session.

Carrie Raudonis, a GOTR parent, said, "Great program for the girls' selfesteem and learned health. All three of my girls participated. My oldest in high school still talks about her experience."

The season ends with a non-competitive 5K and end of season party. Girls of any financial background are welcome with 65 percent of the girls last year receiving financial assistance.

This council of GOTR has programs in seven counties including Jasper, Lake, LaPorte, Newton, Porter, Pulaski and Strake. The organization works with local elementary and middle schools, but the girls do not have to go to the school to join that group.

GOTR of NWI impacted 2,300 girls in 2018. The teams completed over 140 projects to contribute to their communities.

Girls on the Run is a non-profit organization whose mission is to inspire girls to be joyful, healthy and confident using a fun, experience-based curriculum which creatively integrates running.

Girls on the Run of Northwest Indiana



Black History Program at the Hammond Library

The Hammond Public Library's Black History Month program on Tues., Feb. 19 features internationally known genealogist, Tony Burroughs, in back-to-back presentations. His first presentation is "From Census to Slavery." Most African American researchers try to leap from census records to slave research, bypassing records in between. A broad foundation between now and the Civil war will increase the probabilities of success during the slavery period. His second presentation, "Did Your Ancestor Serve in the Civil War?" will explain how to determine if an ancestor served in the Civil War, how to verify oral history of their service, and how to investigate their Civil War experiences.

Tony Burroughs is founder and CEO of the Center for Black Genealogy. He taught genealogy at Chicago State University for fifteen years. Burroughs researched Olympic Gold Medal sprint champion Michael Johnson's family history and consulted on the genealogies of notables such as Smokey Robinson, Oprah Winfrey, and Rev. Al Sharpton. Burroughs has also appeared on Who Do You Think You Are, African American Lives with Henry Louis Gates, and several other television programs.

Burroughs' book, Black Roots: A Beginners Guide to Tracing the African American Family Tree (Simon & Schuster, 2001) is now in its fifth printing, and he has contributed to several other books. His honors include the Distinguished Service Award from the National Genealogical Society, the Rabbi Malcolm H. Stern Humanitarian Award from the Federation of Genealogical Societies, the Volkel Medal of Honor from the Illinois State Genealogical Society, and Fellow of the Utah Genealogical Association.

His research on the index to the Census led to discovering the original instructions and correcting a forty year omission from National Archives' instructions. His research on the Underground Railroad in 2001 enabled the Kimsey Crossing home in Tamarora, Illinois to be recognized by the National Park Service's Network to Freedom. His testimony before Congress in 2000 helped preserve 135-year-old records from the Freedmen's Bureau.

The free program starts at 6 p.m. Refreshments are served, and space is limited. After the program, Burroughs will sign copies of his book, Black Roots, which will be available for purchase. Thanks to the Friends of the Library for their support. Recording the program in any manner is prohibited. The library is at 564 State St., at the intersection of Sibley and Sohl streets. More information is at (219) 931-5100, ext. 310.

New Pedestrian Bridge Construction Begins

Mayor Thomas M. McDermott, Jr. and the City of Hammond are excited to announce construction of the new pedestrian bridge over Calumet Avenue and Conkey Street beginning today. Funding for the majority of the project comes through the Northern Indiana Regional Planning Commission's (NIRPC) access to Federal Transportation Enhancement The local match funding. comes from the City. The bridge connecting the Erie-Lackawanna Trail through Hammond greatly improves the crossing at highly traveled US41/Calumet Avenue.

The new bridge is the fifth pedestrian-roadway overpass, and the seventh multi-use trail structure completed by the City since 2011, the most recent being the Marquette Greenway trail bridge over Calumet Avenue at Wolf Lake completed last year. Hammond has over 22.5 miles of dedicated multi-use trails including the Marquette Greenway, Erie-Lackawanna, Wolf Lake, Monon and Little Calumet River trails.

Hammond continues working on significant upgrades to Martin Luther King and Hessville Parks on the heels of recently upgraded Edison Park.

Construction of the fivespan, 600-foot-long bridge is expected to be completed in August 2019.



BNI Swimmer Inducted to Hall of Fame

Berta (Fotschky) Rogers, who set multiple state swimming records during her time at Bishop Noll, has been selected for April induction into the Indiana High School Swimming and Diving Hall of Fame.

Rogers, who now lives in Florida, swam at Bishop Noll her sophomore '77 and junior '78 years and was the first IHSAA individual swimming state gold medalist in Bishop Noll history.

Her sophomore year record-setting season earned her hall of fame status. She was a standout at the fourth annual IHSAA girls state swim and diving championships, held Dec. 16-17, 1977, at Ball State University.

Rogers outdistanced previous champions to win and establish state records in both the 200-yard individual medley (2:12.540) and the 500-freestyle (5:11.847), and was part of Noll's championship and record-setting 200-medley relay (1:56.949) Rogers shared the medley relay state title with team members Denise Bercik '81, Maureen Brown '80 and Wendy Ruddy '78.

Rogers' record-setting performances led Bishop Noll to a fifth-place team finish at state. She also won each of those same events at the Merrillville sectional, and was the sectional's top individual point-getter (40 points).

As a junior, she was sectional champion in the 100-free and 200-IM, and finished fourth and third, respectively, in those events at state. Her 200-medley relay team placed second.

Before her senior year, Rogers' family moved to New Zealand where she swam with members of the New Zealand National team. Still, she considers Bishop Noll her official high school. The hall of fame typically inducts two or three coaches and five or six athletes at each ceremony, which is only done every fourth year.

In just her two years of swimming at Noll, Rogers had more than enough points to qualify for hall of fame status, Jim Tonkovich, her coach, said.

Rogers said she was honored to receive the honor.

Her BNI teammates also cheered her on and made her feel like she belonged.

She said the most important thing Coach Tonkovich taught her was not to expect her times to improve every time she raced.

Her time at Bishop Noll left her with happy memories.

Post high school, Rogers graduated from The Medical College of Georgia with a BS in nursing ('85). In 2005, she graduated from the University of St. Francis in Joliet, Ill. (satellite program in Tennessee) with a master's degree in health service administration ('05). She is currently the director of nursing at The Center for Specialized Surgery in Fort Myers, Fla.

Rogers met her husband, Bruce, in 2001 and they will celebrate their 15th wedding anniversary in April. Her other family members include Bruce's two daughters: Kimberlee and Kristen; Kimberlee's husband, Ivan; and two grandchildren, Holden, 13, and Kyndal, 11. In addition, she has six brothers and sisters (Paul, 69; Art, 67; Joe, 53; Meg, 65; Fran, 59; and Kathy, 52.)

The hall of fame induction is scheduled for April 14, 2019. Rogers is unable to attend but has asked Tonkovich to accept her award on her behalf.
