

On Wednesday April 24th, officers from Hammond Police Department and community members will come together in an informal, neutral space to discuss community issues, build relationships, and drink coffee.

All community members are invited to attend. The event begins at 5:00pm to 7:00pm at Hammond Public Library 564 State Street. Please contact Sgt. Scott Holbrook with questions: (219)852-6376.

Coffee with a Cop provides a unique opportunity for community members to ask questions and learn more about the department's work in Hammond's neighborhoods.

The majority of contacts law enforcement has with the public happen during emergencies, or emotional situations. Those situations are not always the most effective times for relationship building with the community, and some community members may feel that officers are unapproachable on the street. Coffee with a Cop breaks

down barriers and allows for a relaxed, one-on-one interaction.

"We hope that community members will feel comfortable to ask questions, bring concerns, or simply get to know our officers," said Captain Alcox Hammond Police Department. "These interactions are the foundation of community partnerships."

Coffee with a Cop is a national initiative supported by The United States Department of Justice, Office of Community Oriented Policing Services. Similar events are being held across the county, as local police departments strive to make lasting connections with the communities they serve.

The program aims to advance the practice of community policing through improving relationships between police officers and community members one cup of coffee at a time.





Hammond Hosts NFL Draft Pick

When the Hammond Pros took the field as one of the original NFL Teams, not many people knew what the NFL would become over the next 100 years. Now, nearly 100 years after the National Football League was born in Canton, Ohio, the NFL is celebrating the 13 communities, including Hammond, that were home to the teams in its inaugural season. The initiative is part of 'NFL100,' a year-long commemoration of its centennial season bringing together generations of football fans, players, communities and all 32 clubs for a unique line-up of programming and activities.

During the 2019 NFL Draft, selections from Hammond and 7 of the league's "Original Towns" will be made live in the draft telecast. Hammond's draft day event will take place at the Hammond Sportsplex 6630 Indianapolis Boulevard with Mayor Thomas M. McDermott, Jr. making the draft announcements at the podium. Gatorade will be sponsoring a kids combine on the indoor soccer field, food and other fun activities during the free and open to the public event from 1-5 p.m on April 27th at the Hammond Sportsplex.

"There's no better way to bring the League's hundred years of history full circle than to partner with these communities and recognize their important place in history as part of the NFL's centennial celebration," said NFL Commissioner Roger Goodell.

"Hammond has a rich sports history and being an original NFL city is something no other city or town in Northwest Indiana can claim. We're very excited to be partnering with the NFL and bringing this event to the Sportsplex on April 27th," said Mayor McDermott.

The Hammond Pros were owned by local boxing promoter Dr. Alva Young, who was well known in Hammond and Chicago athletic circles for boxing, horse racing, and football. The Pros predecessor, the Hammond All-Stars played for a few years against other professional teams when Dr. Young was invited to the now famous meeting in Canton, Ohio and given a charter for the Hammond Pros to be part of the new National Football League. The Pros original game in Canton drew over 10,000 fans and convinced the owners there that the league could be viable.

The Pros first team featured George Halas at wide receiver before he left the next season for the Deacatur Staleys, soon to become the Chicago Bears. The Pros also had the NFL's first African-American coach Fritz Pollard as well as six of the nine African-American players in the original league and was an example of diversity and inclusion in a time when other teams and sports had not been integrated. The Pros lasted for seven years before the NFL scaled down to 12 teams. The original team charter can be viewed at the Hammond Sports Hall of Fame at the Hammond Civic Center.

Hammond's draft pick will have Mayor McDermott selecting the Los Angeles Chargers 6th round pick with Hammond native and Chargers radio play-by-play announcer Matt "Money" Smith. The draft event is open and free to the public. More information will be available on gohammond.com

Fair Haven Breaks the Silence

Fair Haven Rape Crisis Center brought its clothesline project to the campuses of Purdue University Northwest. The Clothesline Project gives a visual voice to survivors of sexual assault and violence.

The project is made up oft-shirts designed by survivors. Each shirt reveals a personal journey of pain and healing.

"Everytime I hang it up it's powerful, they are showing their pain. It's profound. You can tell when they are angry or when they have more healing and hope," said Melissa Bellar, Fair Haven program manager.

April is sexual assault awareness month. This is the second year Fair Haven has partnered with PNW to bring the Clothesline Project on the campuses.

"It's about planting seeds of awareness and outreach. The project is a real eye opener of the need for prevention and involvement," said Jennie Garcia-Pruitt, assistant director of student support and advocacy.

The Clothesline Project started in 1990 at a Take Back the Night rally in Hyannis, Mass. It quickly caught on and it is now an international campaign. The shirts are color coded and each color is used to identify a different form of abuse. White represents people who have died due to violence. Yellow or Beige represents people who were battered or assaulted. Red, Pink, or Orange represents survivors of rape or sexual assault. Blue or Green represents survivors of incest or child sexual violence. Purple or Lavender represents people who were attacked due to their sexual orientation or gender identity.

Black represents people who were attacked for political reasons, those who were disabled as a result of an attack or those who were attacked as a result of a disability.

The Clothesline had a profound impact on most of the students who saw it. It acted as a reminder that violence is not just a statistic.

PNW student Chris Mundell said," You don't hear about it much until there is some big news story. It's bigger than I thought and I never thought about all of the diffrent forms violence could take."


