



Purdue Offers Banking Concentration This Fall

This fall, Purdue University Northwest's (PNW) College of Business launches a new banking concentration for undergraduate students majoring in Finance. Through a partnership with the Indiana Bankers Association (IBA), the concentration is the first of its kind in Indiana.

PNW and IBA leaders worked for nearly a year on the initiative, which culminated in a \$135,000 donation from the IBA. The donation supports a three-year startup of the concentration beginning Fall 2019; at the end of which PNW leaders project the concentration will be selfsustaining.

College of Business Dean Jane Mutchler said with over 100 students already majoring in Finance, the banking concentration will make PNW's business college a standout statewide.

"Of the 23 institutions in Indiana that offer a bachelor's degree in finance, none provide students with the option to study banking through a major concentration or a minor. Purdue Northwest will be the first," said Mutchler.

The new concentration times well with growing workforce demand. Employment projections for banking professionals statewide is forecast to grow by 10.7 percent from 2016 to 2026, faster than the average growth rate for all occupations in Indiana. Curriculum for the banking concentration, developed with input from the Indiana banking community, adds courses in risk management, bank management, financial reporting and compliance, along with an internship requirement.

"Purdue Northwest students studying banking will have an advantage with our strong ties to Northwest Indiana and Indianapolis, along with our close proximity to Chicago," said Matt Wells, executive director of Career Management in the College of Business. "The new program is another visible example of our ongoing cultivation of a responsive talent pipeline to meet the needs of critical industries and employers in the regional economy."

The educational partnership with PNW is part of the IBA's strategic plan to develop and retain top banking talent in the state for future generations.

"We are thankful for the leadership and generosity of the IBA and member banks, both intellectually and financially. This partnership exemplifies the progress and far-reaching impact that can be achieved when institutions and industries come together. This initiative will benefit our students, our region and our state," said Mutchler.



Reminder to Residents of Firework Laws

The Hammond Fire Department would like to remind Hammond residents of Indiana fireworks laws during the July 4th holiday season.

Fireworks can be purchased only by persons 18 years of age or older.

Locations where fireworks may be discharged:

On the user's property; On the property of someone who has consented to the use of fireworks on that property;

At a special discharge location. (NOT IN THE MIDDLE OF THE STREET OR VACANT LOTS)

The use of fireworks is prohibited within the Hammond city limits except as follows:

Between the hours of 5:00 p.m. and 2 hours after sunset on June 29, June 30, July 1, July 2, July 3, July 5, July 6, July 7, July 8 and July 9. Between the hours of 10:00 a.m. and midnight on July 4.

Between the hours of 10:00 a.m. on December 31 and 1:00 a.m. on January 1.

Violators of this ordinance can be cited by the Hammond Police Department. If you would like to report a violation of this ordinance, please call 911 and an officer will respond to the area. Please provide the location of the potential violation to the dispatcher.

When discharging fireworks it is always a good idea to keep a garden hose or bucket of water nearby to extinguish any accidental fires.

Missing Donor Type Campaign for RedCross

During June, the American Red Cross launched the Missing Types campaign to raise awareness for lifesaving blood donations and urge the public to make an appointment to give blood or platelets this summer.

During the Missing Types campaign, the letters A, B and O – the letters representing the main blood groups – are disappearing from brands, social media pages, signs and websites to illustrate the critical role blood donors play in helping patients. When the letters A, B and O vanish from everyday life, the gaps are striking. And when A, B, O and AB blood types go missing from hospital shelves, patient care and medical treatments are affected.

Blood transfusion is the fourth most common inpatient hospital procedure in the U.S. Blood can only come from volunteer blood donors, yet only 3 out of 100 people in the U.S. give blood. That's simply not enough to help patients who need transfusions.

Donors can help fill the missing types by making an appointment to give by visiting RedCrossBlood.org/ MissingTypes, using the Red Cross Blood Donor App or calling 1-800-RED CROSS (1-800-733-2767).

A 2019 national survey, conducted on behalf of the Red Cross, revealed a troubling disconnect between the public's perception of blood donations and the realities of patient transfusion needs.

A third (33%) of the public has never considered that blood may not be available when a loved one needs it.* Just last month, the Red Cross had only six units of type O blood available for every 100,000 people, but more than twice that is needed every day.

Clothes (69%), money (63%) and food (53%) are the

primary ways that the public has donated to help others in the past year.* Only 3% of people in the U.S. give blood.

Blood transfusion is one of the most common hospital procedures in the U.S. Yet, "Never really thought about it" was the primary reason (26%) that people do not give blood among those who haven't given recently.*

More than half (54%) the public believes it is necessary to know their blood type in order to donate blood—this is simply not true. Potential blood donors do not need to know their blood type before giving blood. After individuals give blood, the Red Cross provides each donor their blood type.

More donors, and new donors in particular, are needed to maintain a sufficient blood supply for patients like Troy Stemen. Donating blood is a simple process and only takes about an hour from start to finish.

Registration: Sign in, show ID and read required information.

Health check: Answer questions and receive a miniphysical.

Donation: Giving a pint of blood only takes about eight to 10 minutes.

Refreshments: Donors enjoy snacks and relax before resuming their day.

Donation appointments and completion of a RapidPass are encouraged to help speed up the donation process. RapidPass lets donors complete the pre-donation reading and answer the health history questionnaire online, on the day of their donation, by visiting RedCrossBlood.org/RapidPass from the convenience of a mobile device or computer, or through the Blood Donor App.

Lakeshore PBS Honored for Programs

On June 7, Lakeshore Public Media was honored by two groups for its local programming and community involvement, one by a regional partner and the other by a statewide organization.

On Friday night, South Shore Arts recognized Lakeshore Public Media as Arts Partner of the Year. "Every year at our Beaux Arts Ball, we honor individuals or companies or organizations that have provided extraordinary support to the arts in one way or another," said John Cain, the executive director of South Shore Arts. "This year, we are honoring Lakeshore Public Media for its many years of regional arts promotion on television and radio through Eye on the Arts."

Eye on the Arts is a television series designed to showcase the high level of artistic talent in NW Indiana. Lakeshore PBS produces video segments that take viewers out of the studio to a variety of local artists and artistic organizations, demonstrating how art inspires and improves the quality of life for our community. 'Eye on the Arts' is also a weekly segment on Lakeshore Public Radio with local members of the artistic community having a conversation about their work.

The TV show producers aspire to feature art and artists that are representative of our diverse NW Indiana region. Producer Tony Santucci and his team works with the Regional Arts Council, South Shore Arts and others to find these stories.

Matt Franklin, the show's executive producer and Vice President of TV Operations for Lakeshore Public Media, sees the arts as a core to the organization's mission. "For over 15 years, our goal has been to advance regional arts through exposure to our large and diverse TV audience, a reach that covers over 320,000 Indiana households and beyond," Franklin stated. "The stories are out there, and we enjoy sharing them with people who often feel that the arts are inaccessible."

Also that week, the Indiana Broadcasters Association announced that Lakeshore PBS was a finalist in Region 1 for a Cardinal Community Service The IBA recognizes Award. TV and radio stations for the impactful work done in their local Lakeshore PBS communities. was acknowledged for producing a series of short videos promoting women in STEM careers, providing role models for young women to see themselves in these challenging careers.

The IBA Cardinal Community Service Award will be given to Lakeshore PBS on August 14 in Fort Wayne. This marks the third year in a row that Lakeshore PBS has been recognized with this award. In 2018, Lakeshore PBS partnered with the Legacy Foundation to produce a televised program and supporting online elements for On the Table, an engagement effort that brought together groups of community members to have a meal and conversation.

In 2017, Lakeshore PBS partnered with the City of Gary and the Urban League of Northwest Indiana to host its first town hall event titled Race, Justice, Community and Policing. The public forum explored the role of race in policing efforts across the diverse Northwest Indiana communities. Lakeshore PBS would go on to win the statewide Spectrum Award for Local Community Involvement and was also runner-up for Station of the Year in Market 2 (outside Indianapolis), with the honors going to WPTA in Fort Wayne.

Purdue Professor Recognized

Purdue University Northwest (PNW) Professor of Mathematics David Feikes is the recipient of the 2019 Purdue University Christian J. Foster Award.

The Christian J. Foster Award, named for the former first gentleman of Purdue, annually recognizes one faculty member within the Purdue family who has made demonstrable contributions to improving teaching and learning for K-12 students in science, technology, engineering and math (STEM) education in Indiana.

Feikes, a leader in mathematics education, has been transforming the teaching of mathematics in Indiana, nationally and internationally, for more than 25 years. As a recipient of more than \$3,000,000 in grant funding, he has mentored thousands of teachers and served tens of thousands of students to enhance STEM teaching and learning throughout the state.

"The College of Engineering and Sciences is very proud of Dr. David Feikes, this year's recipient of the Christian J. Foster Award," said Associate Dean Daniel Suson. "Dr. Feikes has spent his career working to improve math education in our K-12 schools and this award is recognition of his outstanding achievements in this area."

Feikes' focus on children's mathematical reasoning provides a unique perspective to teachers to understand and incorporate that thinking into their own teaching. He emphasizes the role of student responsibility to validate and justify their own understanding of mathematics. Feikes challenges students and teachers alike with this paradigmatic shift. As a dedicated educator, he passionately advocates for reform.

"Dr. Feikes is the first recipient outside of the West Lafayette campus and exemplifies the high level of commitment to excellence found among our faculty at PNW," said Suson. "We congratulate him on this important award and its recognition of his dedication to improving mathematical competency throughout the state."
