

Applications for Funding in Hammond

Applications for 2020 funding through the City's Charitable Gaming Fund are now available from the Mayor's Office at Hammond City Hall.

A fund is available not-for-profit to local organizations who can demonstrate that their project, activities and services provide direct benefit to the citizens of Hammond. The fund and application process is overseen by the Charitable Gaming Advisory Committee, which represents a cross section of Hammond residents and city council members. It is chaired by Phil Taillon, Mayor's Chief of Staff.

According to Mayor McDermott: "The process continues to demonstrate that our approach provides an equitable method of funding for not-for-profit initiatives within the City, along with demonstrating a high level of accountability to Hammond taxpayers and residents. I believed early on in my administration that we needed

to make this process as fair as possible." Prior to Mayor McDermott's establishment of the current process, there were no guidelines or restraints as to how gaming dollars were distributed to charities and not-for-profit organizations.

Applications be received by February 21, 2020 for consideration. Applying organizations will be provided with detailed guidelines that accompany the application. The application process provides the advisory committee with information about the projects and services that local organizations wish to receive funding Applicants may be requested to appear before the committee to further present their proposal.

Hammond Mayor Thomas M. McDermott, Jr. in conjunction with the Hammond Sanitary District is pleased to announce an initiative for a Household Flood Protection Program to assist Hammond homeowners with a plan for remediation of flooding within their homes.

The Hammond Sanitary District has allotted up to \$1,000 to each homeowner who is qualified, to assist them with various measures to reduce flooding in their homes. Implementation of standpipes, shut-off valves and overhead plumbing are a few of the measures being offered to those who have already transmitted a complaint to the Hammond Sewer Department regarding flooding in their home.

Installation of the

backflow prevention devices must be performed by licensed plumbing contractors whom are eligible to work within the City of Hammond. To be eligible for the financial assistance you must be a Hammond homeowner and have experienced backflow problems in the past.

"I know the horrors of experiencing flooding in your home," stated Mayor McDermott. "If we can spare even one homeowner this type of grief, then we've done our jobs."

Oversight of Lake County Jail Ends

Lake County Sheriff Oscar Martinez, Jr. is pleased to announce that "oversight of the Lake County Jail by the U.S. Department of Justice ("DOJ") will soon be coming to a close."

A Joint Motion was filed today by the DOJ, the Lake County Sheriff and Lake County with U.S. District Court Judge Theresa Springmann to dismiss the lawsuit the DOJ filed in 2010 that resulted in a Settlement Agreement and ongoing DOJ oversight of the Lake County Jail.

The 2010 Settlement Agreement contains 92 different compliance targets the jail had to achieve and maintain for 1 year to meet the conditions of the Settlement Agreement. In the motion filed before Judge Springmann, the DOJ confirms that the Lake County Jail has "reached substantial compliance with the terms of the Agreement in its entirety" and asks the judge to enter an order terminating the Settlement Agreement and dismissing the 2010 lawsuit.

Sheriff Martinez stated: "Getting the jail in

full compliance with all provisions of the Settlement Agreement was a major goal of mine since taking office in September of 2017. One of my first initiatives as Sheriff was to perform a nation-wide search and hire a professional corrections administrator to run the day-to-day operations of the jail and work closely with me to implement the reforms required to achieve compliance with the provisions of the DOJ Settlement Agreement."

"I'm very proud of the hard work and long hours Warden Michael Zenk, our corrections officers, medical staff, mental health staff, and the other members of our compliance team put in over the last two years. Their dedication ensured that the Lake County Jail met all 92 provisions of the Settlement Agreement and became a model jail facility that continues to meet all constitutional conditions of confinement."

Society of Innovators Launches Masterclass

Free Winter Events at Gabis Arboretum

Gabis Arboretum at Purdue Northwest remains open for the public's enjoyment and education during the winter months. In fact, the winter "free admission" policy makes this time of year an ideal time to get acquainted with this beautiful local natural habitat.

"Winter offers so many reasons to walk the trails at Gabis," says Education and Outreach Coordinator Deb Way. "Hikers in winter see the openness and connectedness of the full landscape when taking a walk. While summer hikers can enjoy a trail's shady archway, they miss seeing the gorgeous overlook that is just beyond the leafy tree line. Winter hikers see that misty sparkle over the full stretch of the wetland pond as they gaze from a high spot on the prairie. It is a perspective not visible other times of year."

Though the Welcome Center at the Railway Garden's Depot is unmanned in the winter months, the building is open for restroom and vending machine access during the arboretum's open hours. Visit www.pnw. edu/gabis-arboretum to check for current operating hours.

Unless otherwise marked, the trails also are accessible for hiking, dog-walking, birdwatching and photography opportunities.

"A walk in a winter landscape calls us to take a more expansive view, a great reminder when other aspects of the season invite us to hunker down and close in on ourselves," Way said.

Gabis Arboretum at PNW is offering monthly hikes free to the public this winter. Each

hike is followed by a warming time in the Railway Depot with training opportunities for volunteers to finish the day's adventures.

Join the first group of 2020 to have an organized trail walk! Hikers will leave the Depot at 1 p.m. on Saturday, January 4 and return by 2:30 p.m. for hot chocolate.

Also that afternoon, the public is invited to attend a Project Wingspan webinar in the Railway Depot at 3 p.m. Project Wingspan promotes volunteer opportunities specifically designed for those interested in helping with pollinator partnerships.

The next public hike will be held Sunday, February 2. Hikers will trek the trails to see what area groundhogs have to predict about winter's duration.

Gabis Arboretum at Purdue Northwest is a 300acre, oak preserve of formal gardens, woodlands, wetlands, prairies and hiking trails located near Valparaiso, Indiana. Open year round, the Arboretum offers a wide variety of events and classes for all ages. 
