On January 8, 2020, the Hammond Police Department promoted a new Police Chief as former Chief John Doughty resigned his position. Chief William "Andy" Short, who recently served as the department's Assistant Chief, was promoted to Chief of Police.

Chief Short was hired in 1988 and climbed the ranks serving in many capacities. After serving in Internal Affairs for 5 years, Chief Short was appointed in 2016 to the position of Assistant Chief. Today, William Short was promoted to Chief of Police and also the first African American Chief in the department's history.

Additionally, Jeffery Long was promoted to Assistant Chief of Police. He was hired in 1989 and

Robert Bunner was promoted to Captain of the Patrol Division replacing Asst. Chief Long in that role. Captain Bunner was hired in 1999 and was promoted to Lieutenant in the Patrol Division in 2015. He has coordinated the Field Training Unit since 2017 and is currently a SWAT team leader.

# Bishop Noll's Workshop Club lets students combine STEM skills, imagination



Bishop Noll sophomore Nyree Ruiz is building on her passion for astrology by creating a 3D zodiac sign chart in Workshop Club.

HAMMOND | A Bishop Noll sophomore found a modern way to express her passion for an ancient practice by designing a 3D printed zodiac sign chart. Nyree Ruiz is a member of the school's Workshop Club, which began last fall and meets in the new STREAM Lab. Ruiz began working on the chart in September by drawing her vision on paper.

"My inspirations were the zodiac signs themselves because it is so interesting how unique each one is and it's interesting how they can just sum up a whole person based on a birthday," she said.



These 3D zodiac signs were printed in Bishop Noll's STREAM Lab.

Her chart includes the zodiac symbols, their planets, constellations and names. The pieces are printed using the STREAM Lab's 3D printer.

Sponsored by engineering teacher Brian Lambie and STEM teacher Mary Albrecht, the Workshop Club benefits students by opening the STREAM Lab for them to create personal projects outside of normal class hours. Students can work on projects from their own imaginations and in their own time.

Ruiz, of Hammond, said once she heard about the club forming, she was immediately excited because she enjoyed using Tinkercad, an online 3D modeling program, as a freshman. She had learned to create the designs but was never able to print them on a 3D printer. She was excited to try it.

"I think everyone should try the Workshop Club because it is really fun and it gives you a chance to make imagination come to life. Mr. Lambie and Mrs. Albrecht will help you along the way so there is no worry about needing help either with designing, printing or coming up with ideas."

The STREAM Lab opened for classes in January 2020 and all in-school freshmen students took Project Lead the Way's (PLTW) Intro to Engineering class in the lab. In addition, Bishop Noll offers PLTW Computer Science, Principles Engineering, and Biomedical Science. The lab is also used as a meeting space for other groups such as the Women's Empowerment Club and yearbook. The lab's large space and multiple workspaces make it a perfect place for social distancing.

"What I enjoy most about the STREAM Lab is how beautiful it is and how much effort was put into making it look so beautiful. Just being in there inspires me to

be creative," Ruiz said. In addition to the Workshop Club, Ruiz is involved in the Bishop Noll Band and Art Club.



Those who come to donate blood or platelets this January will be automatically entered to win two tickets to next year's Super Bowl LVI in Los Angeles.\* In addition, those who come to give January 1-20, will also be automatically entered to win the Big Game at Home package for an awesome viewing experience safely at home, with a 65-inch television and a \$500 gift card to put toward food and fun.\*\*

Individuals can schedule an appointment to give blood today with the American Red Cross by visiting RedCrossBlood.org, using the Red Cross Blood Donor App, calling 1-800-RED-CROSS or activating the Blood Scheduling Skill for Amazon Alexa.

"Blood and plasma donors who have recovered from COVID-19 may have the power to help critically ill patients currently battling the virus," said Dr. Erin Goodhue, Red Cross medical director of clinical services. "With hospital distributions

for convalescent plasma increasing about 250% since October, these generous donations are vital in helping to save lives throughout the winter – a time that is often challenging to collect enough blood products for those in need."

As COVID-19 cases have risen across the U.S., so has the need for convalescent plasma – leading to a shortage of this potentially lifesaving blood product. Like "special teams" units on the field, COVID-19 survivors have a unique ability to make a game-changing difference in the lives of COVID-19 patients. Individuals who have recovered from COVID-19 may have antibodies in their plasma that could provide a patient's immune system the boost it needs to beat the virus.

# How those recovered from COVID-19 can help

There are two ways COVID-19 survivors can help – through a convalescent plasma donation or by simply giving whole blood. Plasma from whole blood donations that test positive for COVID-19 antibodies may be used to help COVID-19 patients. Health emergencies don't pause for holidays, game days or a pandemic – blood is needed every two seconds in the U.S. to help patients battling injury and illness.

# Blood donation safety precautions

To protect the health and safety of Red Cross staff and donors, individuals who do not feel well or who believe they may be ill with COVID-19 should postpone their donation.

Each Red Cross blood drive and donation center follows the highest standards of safety and infection control, and additional precautions - including temperature checks, social distancing and face coverings for donors and staff - have been implemented to help protect the health of all those in attendance. Donors are asked to schedule an appointment prior to arriving at the drive and are required to wear a face covering or mask while at the drive, in alignment with Centers for Disease Control and Prevention public guidance.






