Purdue Northwest students, faculty off to a strong start for fall 2020

HAMMOND and **WESTVILLE, Ind.** — Purdue University Northwest (PNW) continues to enroll one of the most diverse and persistent student bodies in the state of Indiana as students, faculty and staff address the new challenges presented by the global pandemic.

Hispanic students represent 24% of this year's full-time, undergraduate students. The freshman class is comprised of 38.9% underrepresented minority groups. The percentage of students attending PNW fulltime increased to 81% of core undergraduate students. Firsttime, full-time students who enrolled in fall 2019 returned at a rate of 70.6%.

"Everyone has worked collaboratively to achieve a safe, engaging start to the semester. Students are attending classes in virtual, hybrid and fully inperson formats, with increased safety and health protocols for on-campus experiences and innovative learning opportunities for remote courses," Chancellor Thomas L. Keon said. "Fall-to-fall retention is at its highest level in PNW's fiveyear history," he added. "Many academic programs including nursing, business and engineering saw increases in enrollment. PNW offers a transformative experience and resources to support students as they power onward toward their goals."

Keon noted that fall enrollment met projections made previous to the pandemic, which were adjusted due to the impact of COVID-19 on an already challenging higher education environment. PNW reported fall 2020 total enrollment of 9,363, representing a 6.4 percent decline from fall 2019. Total enrollment is comprised of students new to college, continuing students, transfers, others enrolled in online degree programs, and high school concurrent/dual credit enrollees.

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

Red Cross blood donors have new opportunity to help patients fighting COVID-19

Donors needed this fall to maintain blood supply amid ongoing pandemic

FORT WAYNE, Ind. (Sept. 23, 2020) — Plasma from whole blood donations made through the American Red Cross that test positive for COVID-19 antibodies may now help current coronavirus patients in need of convalescent plasma transfusions. Donors are encouraged to make an appointment to give blood now to help ensure coronavirus patients and others who depend on transfusions have needed blood products this fall.

In April, the Red Cross began collecting COVID-19 convalescent plasma from previously diagnosed individuals, who could only give at one of approximately 170 Red Cross blood donation centers across the country. Convalescent plasma contains COVID-19 antibodies that may help the most critical patients actively fighting this virus. Now, whole blood donations made at any Red Cross blood drive or blood donation center could be helpful in this effort.

"Donations that come back positive for COVID-19 antibodies now undergo secondary testing to confirm antibody results, and that enables the Red Cross to then potentially use the plasma from those donations for COVID-19 patients," said Rodney Wilson, communications manager for the Red Cross Indiana Ohio Region. "With approximately 2% of the U.S. population testing positive for COVID-19 antibodies, every donation is important to ensure patients with coronavirus have access to every treatment option available to them."

The Red Cross encourages eligible individuals to schedule an appointment, download the free Blood Donor App, visit RedCrossBlood.org, call 1-800-RED CROSS (1-800-733-2767) or enable the Blood Donor Skill on any Alexa Echo device.

About antibody testing

Antibody testing may indicate if the donor's immune system has produced antibodies to this coronavirus, regardless of whether an individual experienced COVID-19 symptoms. Donations are tested using samples pulled at the time of donation and sent to a testing laboratory where they will also undergo routine infectious disease testing.

COVID-19 antibody test results will be available within

one to two weeks in the Red Cross Blood Donor App or donor portal at RedCrossBlood.org. A positive antibody test result does not confirm infection or immunity. The Red Cross is not testing donors to diagnose illness, referred to as a diagnostic test.

Important COVID-19 information for donors

Each Red Cross blood drive and donation center follows the highest standards of safety and infection control, and additional precautions – including temperature checks, social distancing and face coverings for donors and staff – have been implemented to help protect the health of all those in attendance. Donors are asked to schedule an appointment prior to arriving at the drive and are required to wear a face covering or mask while at the drive, in alignment with Centers for Disease Control and Prevention public guidance.

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Salvation Army Calls On Community To Help Rescue Christmas

Launches Christmas Campaign earliest in history



Lake County, Ind. – The Salvation Army is announcing a change to the iconic Red Kettle fundraising campaign for the first time in the organization's 135-year history. On Monday, Sept. 14, The Salvation Army launched Rescue Christmas with a series of events. The organization is beginning its annual fundraising campaign nearly two months earlier than in a typical year, in order to meet an unprecedented need.

On September 14, the East Chicago location held early bellringing opportunities and distributed snacks from the iconic canteen (mobile feeding unit). On September 16, the three Salvation Army corps community centers in Lake County (East Chicago, Gary-Merrillville, Hammond-Munster) lit up the night sky with a spotlight to shine a light on the community's need and serve as a beacon of hope.

The Army provides hope for people like Charles, a single father of two children, who lost his job when his employer shut down because of the pandemic. He was three months behind on rent and fearful his family would soon be homeless. The Salvation Army provided half of the back rent and provided referrals to other service organizations who were able to provide additional help.

"The need for assistance in our communities that is COVID-19 related has not diminished, and we anticipate a greater demand for help during this Christmas season," said Capt. Brian Clark, Lake County Coordinator. "It will take a team effort that is vital to having a successful fundraising campaign with donors, volunteers and businesses stepping up to help their fellow neighbors."

The Salvation Army Lake County saw a fivefold increase in need during the height of the pandemic in the spring. Requests for emergency assistance jumped 67 percent. Based on the increase in services already provided in response to COVID-19, the organization could serve up to 155 percent more people in 2020 with requests for food, emergency assistance, and Christmas assistance – assuming the resources are available.

At the same time, due to the closing of retail stores, consumers carrying less cash and coins, and the decline in foot traffic, The Salvation Army could see up to a 50 percent decrease in funds raised nationally through the Red Kettles, which would limit their capability to provide services for the most vulnerable. Almost 70% of The Salvation Army's donations are made during the Red Kettle Campaign.

The Red Kettles won't hit the streets until November, but The Salvation Army is asking for donations online now to help Rescue Christmas, at www. salarmychristmas.org. Every donation provides help and hope to those in need, and all gifts stay within the community in which they are given. 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Ivy Tech Community College awards Munster High School students a record-setting number of college credits

Munster, IN, September 16, 2020 — According to Ivy Tech Community College, the number of college credits earned by Munster High School students increased by 300% from the academic year 2018-2019 to 2019-2020.

The Statewide Transfer General Education Core (STGEC) is a block of 30 credit hours in general education coursework that is guaranteed by Indiana state law to transfer to all public four-year schools in Indiana. Ivy Tech Community College awarded 11 total STGEC Ivy Tech Technical Certificates to Munster High School students during the 2018-2019 academic year. That number jumped to a total of 44 STGEC credentials for Munster students during the Fall 2019, Spring 2020, and Summer 2020 semesters. 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Creighton T. Kooy also earned an Ivy Tech Certificate in Basic Emergency Medical Studies, bringing the grand total to 45 Ivy Tech credentials awarded to Munster students over the past academic year.

"Munster students, administration, and faculty have put in a tremendous amount of effort to make this increase in the number of completers occur," said Caleb Westberg, the director of K-14 Initiatives at Ivy Tech Community College. "We couldn't be more delighted to see these results, are very proud to recognize these student accomplishments, and hope to continue to work with Munster High School in the future to offer opportunities to earn the STGEC and other Ivy Tech credentials!"

Brad Docter, Munster High School's Career & Technical Education coordinator, noted that STGEC credentials can save parents thousands of dollars in college tuition.

"The 30 credit hours in one STGEC is a year's worth of college," he added. "Considering that the tuition at most state schools is around \$25,000 per year, the potential savings are considerable."

Hammond Education Foundation grant incentivizes remediation learning

HAMMOND, Ind. – Thanks to a \$2,000 grant awarded by the Hammond Education Foundation, School City of Hammond students benefited academically and personally from a recent summer learning program intended to fill achievement gaps.

The grant funded 87 incentives of Air Pods and food and beverage gift cards for which students who completed remediation lessons in language arts and mathematics could qualify to receive via bi-weekly drawings.

Though typically federal and public school funding may not be used to purchase learning incentives, the HEF grant provided motivation for struggling students who may have been disadvantaged by the unusual learning gap they experienced last spring due to coronavirus-induced school closures, according to HEF Interim Executive Director Ed Schoenfelt. "Enabling this grant, we believe, provided a valuable shot in the arm of encouraging those Hammond students who could benefit from a virtual summer learning program to complete important course work and build a foundation of proficiency for standardized exams," Schoenfelt said.

The program was free and open to all School City of Hammond middle and high school students. The Hammond Education Foundation, established in 1983, is a 501(c) (3) nonprofit organization committed to a mission of supporting extraordinary learning experiences to help School City of Hammond students succeed.

Purdue Northwest College of Technology awarded nearly \$6 million from National Security Agency

HAMMOND a n d WESTVILLE, Ind. – The Purdue University Northwest (PNW) College of Technology has been awarded a grant of \$5,971,053 for Cybersecurity Workforce Development from the National Security Agency (NSA). Since 2014, Purdue University Northwest has been a National Center of Academic Excellence in Cyber Defense Education (CAE-CDE 4Y) designated jointly by the NSA and the U.S. Department of Homeland Security (DHS).

PNW Professor of Computer Information Technology and Director of the Center for Cybersecurity Michael Tu is the lead principal investigator for the grant, while Professor and Chair of the Department of Computer Information Technology and Graphics Keyuan Jiang, and College of Technology Director of Industrial Relations and Experiential Learning, Deborah Blades, are co-principal investigators.

"Receiving this highly competitive grant award of cybersecurity workforce development is a strong indication of cybersecurity education at PNW and expertise of our computer information technology faculty. This award will help fill the gap of shortage of cybersecurity workforce in this country," Jiang said.

Beginning in September 2020, the two-year grant will allow Purdue University Northwest as the lead institution to collaborate with Ivy Tech Community College, University of North Carolina at Charlotte (UNCC), and University of Tennessee at Chattanooga (UTC), to develop a pilot artificial intelligence (AI)-Cybersecurity certificationbased national training program for more than 425 transitioning military, first responders, and other adult trainees. The training program will be offered online and free of charge to the trainees.

During the first year of the grant, this coalition will develop a hands-on based AI-Cybersecurity curriculum that contains 12 courses divided into three tracks. Topics include Windows and Linux computer technologies, cloud technology, network, python programming, cybersecurity fundamentals, ethical hacking, hardware security, computer and mobile forensics, artificial intelligence and machine learning. The training curriculum is expected to be mapped to existing courses in the cybersecurity programs at each participating institution. This will allow pathways to be created for trainees to pursue degree programs at PNW and other participating institutions.

During the second year of the grant, the three training tracks with 12 courses will be offered online to trainees who were recruited in Year 1 and Year 2 and each of them is expected to take six courses. Trainees are expected to take certification exams and to earn industry and government recognized certifications. "As a Center of Academic Excellence, our bachelor of science degree in Computer Information Technology and its Cybersecurity concentration is recognized as one of the best cybersecurity programs in the nation," Tu said. "We are looking forward to introducing highly capable professionals into the workforce to assist with cyber infrastructure on a nationwide level."

"This project will provide further opportunities for workforce development in this specialized area of cybersecurity," Blades added.

With the funded projects, PNW will be able to contribute significantly to national workforce development in the field of AI and cybersecurity. The U.S. Department of Labor reports that the need for IT and cybersecurity professionals is projected to grow 12 percent from 2018 to 2028 with multimillion shortages. According to the Gartner 2019 CIO Survey, the number of companies implementing AI, including machine learning and deep learning, "grew 270% in the past four years and tripled in the past year," and "37% of the companies surveyed implemented AI." Through the establishment of this national training program, a large number of qualified professionals will be trained to join the highly demanded workforce in the field of AI and cybersecurity.

Niaz Latif, dean of the College of Technology, stated, "This grant recognizes our faculty expertise and endorses PNW's proven track record in the area of cybersecurity by the National Security Agency."
