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THIS DAY IN HISTORY May 1, 1931

Empire State Building dedicated



On May 1, 1931, President Herbert Hoover officially dedicates New York City's Empire State Building, pressing a button from the White House that turns on the building's lights. Hoover's gesture, of course, was symbolic; while the president remained in Washington, D.C., someone else flicked the switches in New York.

The idea for the Empire State Building is said to have been born of a competition between Walter Chrysler of the Chrysler Corporation and John Jakob Raskob of General Motors, to see who could erect the taller building. Chrysler had already begun work on the famous Chrysler Building, the gleaming 1,046-foot skyscraper in midtown Manhattan. Not to be bested, Raskob assembled a group of well-known investors, including former New York Governor Alfred E. Smith. The group chose the architecture firm Shreve, Lamb and Harmon Associates to design the building. The Art-Deco plans, said to have been based in large part on the look of a pencil, were also builder-friendly: The entire building went up in just over a year, under budget (at \$40 million) and well ahead of schedule. During certain periods of building, the frame grew an astonishing four-and-a-half stories a week.

At the time of its completion, the Empire State Building, at 102 stories and 1,250 feet

high (1,454 feet to the top of the lightning rod), was the world's tallest skyscraper. The Depression-era construction employed as many as 3,400 workers on any single day, most of whom received an excellent pay rate, especially given the economic conditions of the time. The new building imbued New York City with a deep sense of pride, desperately needed in the depths of the Great Depression, when many city residents were unemployed and prospects looked bleak. The grip of the Depression on New York's economy was still evident a year later, however, when only 25 percent of the Empire State's offices had been rented.

In 1972, the Empire State Building lost its title as world's tallest building to New York's World Trade Center, which itself was the tallest skyscraper for but a year. Today the honor belongs to Dubai's Burj Khalifa tower, which soars 2,716 feet into the sky.

Deputy Prosecuting Attorney Edgar Rodriguez to Head-Up High Tech Crime Unit



Lake County's first ever High Tech Crime Unit (HTCU) will be led by the department's long time Deputy Prosecuting Attorney Edgar Rodriguez. "We received many resumes from some very qualified individuals all vying for the position," said Lake County Prosecutor Bernard A. Carter. "However after careful consideration, we knew that DPA Rodriguez was the best candidate to spearhead the High Tech Crime Unit," said Carter. "His understanding of what we do as prosecutors, coupled with his innate ability to excel in all that he does makes him the ideal choice moving forward," stated Carter.

Rodriguez started his career with the Lake County Prosecutor's Office as an intern, while attending law school at Indiana University School of Law in Bloomington Indiana. Shortly after the completion of his law degree in 1998, Rodriguez joined the Lake County Prosecutor's Office full time working in many different areas and divisions to include the Lake Superior Courts Criminal Division, the Hammond City Court and finally his most recent role as Drug Intake Deputy Prosecuting Attorney assigned with the Lake County Drug Task Force and Lake County Metro Homicide Unit.

His extensive background working with law enforcement and investigations sets Rodriguez apart from others. "For this particular role with the High Tech Crime Unit, we believe it is critical

that we continue to forge a solid partnership with law enforcement and Rodriguez will continue to do just that," added Carter. The HTCU is a partnership between the Office of the Lake County Prosecutor and Purdue Northwest (PNW) and will assist in investigations involving murder, robbery, drug distribution and other crimes of violence. The HTCU, under the supervision of the Prosecutor's Office, will be tasked with developing specialized operations and processing digital evidence from computers, cameras, laptops, tablets, cell phones and other electronic devices and will reduce turnaround times in the collection of this type of evidence. "This is a unique opportunity that will change the landscape for how we retrieve and analyze digital evidence," said Carter.

The HTCU, which will be housed at PNW's Hammond location, will also give PNW students hands on experience in law enforcement investigations. "As well as hands on experiences for students, faculty, and staff, PNW has significant expertise in a number of areas needed to do thorough investigations and to probe new directions in research and investigations with the Prosecutor's Office". "We look forward to availing the expertise of our faculty in this endeavor and having our students assist in developing new avenues of research," said PNW Chancellor Thomas Keon. Within their intricate studies and with the guidance of professors, the Forensic Program students will learn and develop a high level of lab and research skills. "This hands-on training will enhance the student's education, while helping to solve actual crimes in Lake County," said Prosecutor Carter.

Lake Station Boys & Girls Club's Jamie Cruz Named Indiana Youth of the Year

Boys & Girls Clubs of Greater Northwest Indiana's Jamie Cruz was named Indiana's State Youth of the Year on Friday during an annual ceremony with participants from Clubs across the state. Cruz, who's attended Lake Station Boys & Girls Club since she was six, accepted the award during an in-person event in Indianapolis.

As staff congratulated Cruz after the ceremony, Boys & Girls Clubs president and CEO Ryan Smiley applauded her for her dedication to serving as a role model to younger Club members. Smiley noted that Cruz, 17, participated in the Junior Staff workplace learning program and created the Code Blue Dance Team for girls at the Lake Station Club.

"Jamie's positive attitude and ability to lead others is admirable," said Smiley. "She really does embody the characteristics we hope to inspire in our youth."

Cruz, a junior at River Forest High School, was selected from six candidates from Indiana as part of Boys & Girls Clubs of America's Youth of the Year program. To get to State, Cruz first had to be chosen as Boys & Girls Clubs of Greater Northwest Indiana's organizational Youth of the Year, a feat she accomplished in March. In total, Cruz competed against teens from 146 Clubs across 31 organizations in 56 counties.

Cruz is Boys & Girls Clubs of Greater Northwest Indiana's fourth straight State Youth of the Year winner, following Gary's Marcus Steele Jr., Merrillville's Azariah Avery, and Portage's Sanja Kirova.

Cruz's journey continues to the regional contest, which will take place in early summer and consist of Club members from around the Midwest. For being named the State Youth of the Year, Cruz will receive a \$2,500 scholarship from Boys & Girls Clubs of America, as well as a \$5,000 scholarship for being named Boys & Girls Clubs of Greater Northwest Indiana's Youth of the Year.

City of Hammond (1847-1984) Chronology (part 6)

A little Hammond's history, for the young to learn and the old to remember

1913 Maywood Park site is purchased by the city. Wanner Malleable Iron (later Castings) Company is formed. First Polish Savings and Northern Trust and Savings Banks open their doors. James Bereolos establishes the Jersey Maid Ice Cream Company on Hohman Avenue. Nine German-American singing and cultural societies are active in the city, and the local chapter of the National German-American Alliance has twelve hundred members. World War I will decimate most of these groups. Hammond's school population reaches 6,825.

1914 S. G. Taylor Chain Company (founded in 1873) purchases a Maxwell, Indiana, chain manufactory, and moves to Hammond.

1915 The Carmelite Home for Boys opens. Columbia School opens at Michigan and Columbia.

1916 Hammond Industrial School (later Hammond High School) is erected at Calumet and Highland. The Hammond American Red Cross chapter is organized.

1917 The Village of Hessville, still resisting annexation by Hammond, annexes Saxony. Concordia Lutheran Church is built on Marshall Avenue; in 1972 it moved to Grand Avenue. Anton Tapper opens the Bank of Hammond. Beatty Machine and Manufacturing Company opens on 150th Street. The Christian Science Society becomes First Church of Christ, Scientist, and moves into the former Presbyterian Church building on Hohman Avenue.

1918 A major accident kills eighty-six per formers and other employees on the Hagenbeck-Wallace circus train. Hundreds of volunteer tradesmen build Liberty Hall, a 106-by-70.foot structure, on April 7, at the comer of Hohman and Fayette. Trinity English Lutheran Church is dedicated. Influenza

ravages the city. Maywood School opens at Tapper and Merrill Streets.

1919 The Standard Steel Car Strike leads to a riot in which four workers are killed and sixty are wounded. Hammond Technical-Vocational High School opens in the former Central School Building on Hohman Avenue. Kenwood School opens on Moraine Avenue. Saint Margaret's School of Nursing is founded. Brooks Settlement House opens; it served its neighborhood until 1977.

1920 Hammond's population reaches 36,004. Hessville's is 1,480. People's Co-operative Bank is chartered, as the city's banking assets reach \$10.5 million. Edison School opens on Spruce Street. Hammond Rotary Club is organized by twenty-one members. LaSalle Steel opens. Saint Nicholas' Byzantine Catholic Church is dedicated. South Side Christian Church is organized in a tent at 165th and Madison. Hammond's first

Girl Scout troop is organized by Mrs. Charles R. Tweedle.

1921 Morton Elementary School joins the Hammond System. Roscoe E. Woods organizes the Hammond Board of Realtors. The Parthenon Theater opens. Hammond Kiwanis Club is chartered. Indiana University first offers courses in the city.

1922 Four new companies open in one week on the

former packinghouse site. New York Car and Wheel begins producing railroad equipment. A Ku Klux Klan rally in Harrison Park attracts a huge crowd. Catholic Central School, later Bishop Noll, opens. Gibson and West Park schools open. Lee L. Caldwell becomes Superintendent of Schools, and will retain the post for thirty-seven years. Turner Recreation Field opens.

1923 I. H. B. employees George Hannauer, E. M. Wilcox, Garner Grills, and John Marsh develop an automatic freight car retarder that is adopted nationwide. Hessville, with Saxony and Gibson, is formally annexed by Hammond. "Suburban" development accelerates in the area south of 165th Street. Woodmar, the largest subdivision, is a thousandacre venture of realtors Frank Martin and Roscoe Woods. Hammond purchases a thirtyseven acre annex to Lake Front Park. The Hammond Lions Club is organized, and will evolve into Hammond Central Lions Club. Danceland opens at Five Points. Six years later this popular spot becomes Mike Madura's Danceland, and burned in 1967. Dick Hoyt Typewriter Sales and Service opens. The Camel Plant, later Youngstown Steel Door, opens. The First Trust and Savings Building and the Lloyd Building become Hammond's first "skyscrapers." Standard Railway Equipment Company replaces the Keith Car Company. A second Lincoln School opens at Towle and 142nd Street to replace the first, which had burned.






