Gabis Arboretum Railway Garden Opens for Season

The Gabis Arboretum Railway Garden opened for the season on Sunday, May 1 and will remain open from 10 am – 3 pm on Fridays, Saturdays and Sundays through October.

The Gabis Arboretum Railway Garden spans two-acres and tells amazing stories of American railroads in the context of a large display garden. Miniature G-gauge model trains run throughout the exhibit alongside ten dioramas depicting American history.

“Over the winter, volunteers and staff have been preparing the Railway Garden for the 2022 season,” said Stephanie Blackstock, the executive director of the arboretum. “The entire exhibit is made possible by volunteers. They do everything from repairing the dioramas after they’ve been in storage over the winter to cleaning and repairing the locomotives.”

The Railway Garden also showcases plants not often seen in the Midwest. Due to the various elevation changes throughout the

exhibit, ranging from 15-foot mountains to low valleys, various microclimates are created allowing unique plants to thrive. The garden also uses a water collection system that captures rainwater which is then used in the garden’s streams, waterfalls and for irrigation.

“Guests of all ages can truly appreciate this garden, which is what makes it so special,” said Blackstock. “We see grandparents with grandchildren all the time. I think it’s the nostalgia of the exhibit along with the historically accurate dioramas that engage adults, and the excitement of the trains and bridges that entertain the children. We even have a train-themed playground for small children at the back of the garden.”

Admission to the Gabis Arboretum is \$10 per non-member carload. Members are free. The Railway Garden exhibit is included with admission. Visit pnw.edu/gabisarboretum for more information.

Seven new inductees into Hammond Sports Hall of Fame

Five men and two women from Hammond's historic athletic past were inducted into the Hammond Sports Hall of Fame

JERMAINE BOYETTE

This Hammond High basketball standout and 1998 NWI Times & Post-Tribune All-NW Indiana Area Player of the Year went on to star in college at Weber State (Class of '03). A 3-time All-Big Sky point guard, Big Sky Player of the Year ('03) and All-America Honorable Mention, this WS Hall of Famer was voted the school's Player of the Decade for 2000-10. Professionally, he played briefly with the NBA's Utah Jazz, 10 years overseas, and in the former Continental Basketball Association (CBA) and United States Basketball League (USBL).

JOSEPH CASEY FLETCHER "FLETCH"

A standout pitcher at Hammond High, this 1981 alumnus was drafted by the New York Yankees in '82 and pitched for Yankees' and Montreal Expos' farm teams until '85. The St. Joseph's College alumnus went on to become a collegiate pitching coach at St. Joe, Jacksonville (FL) and Michigan State. In '02, he

started a business as a pioneering pitching instructor. Fletch's Pitching Essentials Network earned acclaim for its effective focus on mechanical consistency, body control, recovery, health and nutrition.

PORTIA FULTZ ARCHER

A respected athlete and leader, this 1986 Hammond High alumna excelled as a basketball point guard & volleyball setter. She continued her hoops career at the University of Chicago (Class of '90) where she was a 3-time all-conference selection and active in campus organizations. In addition to serving as COO of the NBA G League and as an Executive Board Member/Trustee of the Women's Sports Federation, she has been recognized by Adweek among the "Most Powerful Women in Sports" and as a "Game Changer" by Sports Business Journal.

GARY HAYES

Wherever he coached—spanning 7 decades (1968-2021) over 102 competitive seasons—this 1964 Clark graduate succeeded. As a 33-year head basketball coach, he led Lake Station HS boys & girls, Griffith HS boys, Purdue Calumet men

& women and Calumet College of St. Joseph men to a combined record of 474-253. He guided Griffith to the Indiana Class 3A 2015 state championship game. His Purdue Calumet teams were 214-116, earned 4 conference titles & an NAIA D-I women's national tourney berth. His boys & girls tennis teams at Lake Station, Portage, Gary West Side & Gary Wirt were 540-215 and won 16 sectional & conference titles.

TERRI MEIER FECH

A versatile, multi-sport Gavit High standout, this 1985 alumna earned 12 varsity letters competing in volleyball (setter/outside hitter), basketball (point guard), cross country and was especially impressive as team MVP in track & field, setting a school record in the long jump and contributing to 2 other school marks in the 400-meter & 800-meter relays. She went on to star in softball at St. Joseph's College (Class of '89, magna cum laude), earning all-conference and team MVP honors as a stolen base and pitching strikeout leader 4 consecutive years.

MARK PETERS

This 2-sport, 1973 Morton graduate starred as a football

quarterback and baseball pitcher/3rd baseman. In football, he earned all-state honorable mention and NWI Times' Region Offensive Player of the Year recognition. For his baseball prowess, he was drafted by the Texas Rangers. Choosing to continue his football & baseball careers at the University of Evansville, on the gridiron he ranked among the top 10 NCAA Division III quarterbacks nationally in passing and total offense as a junior. On the diamond, the '78 alumnus set 5 school pitching records.

JAMES K. WHITAKER (Veterans Category)

This year's initial Veterans category inductee is a 1951 Hammond High alumnus who excelled for the Wildcats in swimming and golf. Competing on 2 state championship swim teams, he broke the state record in the 100-yard backstroke. As a golfer, he won The Post-Tribune Lake & Porter County Junior championship in '51, went on to play for the University of Illinois and continued thereafter to compete & excel in the sport.

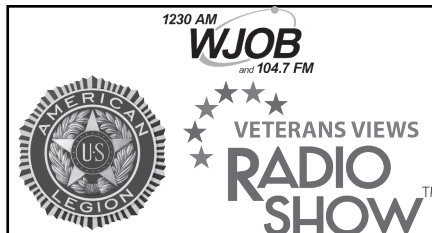

Alabama governor George Wallace shot

During an outdoor rally in Laurel, Maryland, George Wallace, the governor of Alabama and a presidential candidate, is shot by 21-year-old Arthur Bremer. Three others were wounded, and Wallace was permanently paralyzed from the waist down. The next day, while fighting for his life in a hospital, he won major primary victories in Michigan and Maryland. On June 8, Shirley Chisholm, the first Black woman elected to Congress and one of Wallace's opponents for the Democratic nomination, famously visited him in the hospital to wish him well. He remained in the hospital for several months, bringing his third presidential campaign to an irrevocable end.

Wallace, one of the most controversial politicians in U.S. history, was elected governor of Alabama in 1962 under an ultra-segregationist platform. In his 1963 inaugural address, Wallace promised his white followers: "Segregation now! Segregation tomorrow! Segregation forever!" However, the promise lasted only six months. In June 1963, under federal pressure, he was forced to end his blockade of the University of Alabama and allow the enrollment of African American students.

Despite his failures in slowing the accelerating civil rights movement in the South, Wallace became a national spokesman for resistance to racial change and in 1964 entered the race for the U.S. presidency. Although defeated in most Democratic presidential primaries he entered, his modest successes demonstrated the extent of popular backlash against integration. In 1968, he made

another strong run as the candidate of the American Independent Party and managed to get on the ballot in all 50 states. On Election Day, he drew 10 million votes from across the country.

In 1972, Governor Wallace returned to the Democratic Party for his third presidential campaign and, under a slightly more moderate platform, was showing promising returns when Arthur Bremer shot him on May 15, 1972. After his recovery, he faded from national prominence and made a poor showing in his fourth and final presidential campaign in 1976. During the 1980s, Wallace's politics shifted dramatically, especially in regard to race. He contacted civil rights leaders he had so forcibly opposed in the past and asked their forgiveness. In time, he gained the political support of Alabama's growing African American electorate and in 1983 was elected Alabama governor for the last time with their overwhelming support. During the next four years, the man who had promised segregation forever made more African American political appointments than any other figure in Alabama history.

He announced his retirement in 1986, telling the Alabama electorate in a tearful address that "I've climbed my last political mountain, but there are still some personal hills I must climb. But for now, I must pass the rope and the pick to another climber and say climb on, climb on to higher heights. Climb on 'til you reach the very peak. Then look back and wave at me. I, too, will still be climbing." He died in 1998.

School Town of Munster Hires New Munster HS Principal

The Board of Trustees of the School Town of Munster is excited to announce that Mr. Morgan Nolan will be the new principal of Munster High School for the 2022-23 school year. Nolan, a resident of Munster, is currently the principal of Wilbur Wright Middle School in Munster. He will replace Mr. Mike Wells, who announced his retirement from Munster High School after 19 years of service.

Mr. Bret Heller, incoming School Town of Munster Superintendent stated, "Mr. Nolan has demonstrated steadfast dedication and focus to student learning by equipping and empowering staff leaders and building a culture of success for all stakeholders thus making him the right person to lead Munster High School".

The selection process for the new principal was multi-faceted. Surveys were sent out to students, parents and staff to identify leadership characteristics and skills they found to be most important for the next principal to possess. With those characteristics in mind, 8 candidates were chosen to move forward in the selection process. Mr. Heller and Assistant Superintendents - Mr. Tripenfeldas and Mrs. Bergren - conducted virtual screening interviews with the 8 candidates via Microsoft Teams. From the screening interviews, the list was narrowed down to 4 candidates to participate in committee interviews. One of the candidates withdrew from the process prior to the committee interviews taking place. The remaining

candidates met with 3 different committees comprised of MHS staff and the 3 Elementary principals, STM families and community members as well as MHS students. At the end of these sessions, all committee members agreed that each of the 3 candidates should move forward to the final interview

with the STM Administrative Team. The Administrative Team met with each candidate on Thursday, April 14th, where in addition to answering variety of questions each candidate had to prepare a presentation highlighting their entry plan, short-term and long-term vision and goals for the school. After a lengthy discussion, the team decided the best candidate for the position was Morgan Nolan.

Mr. Nolan earned a Bachelor of Science in Political Science from Wabash College and a Masters in Educational Administration and Leadership from Ball State University. Mr. Nolan has spent his entire education career with the School Town of Munster. He began teaching Social Studies at Munster High School in May 2007. In July of 2012, Mr. Nolan became a Dean of Students. He then served as an Assistant Principal at MHS from July 2013 to 2019. He moved over to Wilbur Wright Middle School in July of 2019 to serve as principal, where he continued to show his dedication to the students and staff of our district.

City of Hammond (1847-1984) Chronology *(part 7)*

*A little Hammond's history,
for the young to learn
and the old to remember*

1924 Radio Station WWAE, later to become WJOB, begins broadcasts. Harding School, replacing Gibson School, opens on Cleveland Avenue. Lockwood Laboratories opens. The Technical-Vocational High School building is moved to Russell Street. The Hammond Professionals win a National Football League franchise. Hammond Community Chest is organized. Queen Anne Candy begins operations in the former Betz plant. The city purchases the site of Hessville Park. The city's banking assets pass \$15.5 million. 1 Hammond's population reaches an estimated 55,000. Twelve thousand dwellings are occupied within the city limits.

1925 Hammond's boom peaks with a dozen major buildings

under construction. Alarmed by rumors of Gary's intentions to expand, Hammond attempts to annex Highland and Munster. A truce preserves the two towns from both cities. The 3,165-seat State Theater is opened. Joseph Meyer builds the Indiana Botanical Gardens Building on the city's southern edge. D. C. Stephenson's attacks on a young woman on a Chicago-bound train result in her attempted suicide in the Indiana Hotel in Hammond, and eventually the collapse of the Klan's midwestern empire. H. E. Miner's Calumet Motor Coach Company inaugurates bus service between Michigan Avenue in Hammond and Fifth Avenue in Gary. With the development of Hollywood Manor, the "surburban boom" crosses the new Little Calumet Bridge at Hohman Avenue into Munster.

1926 The partial draining of Lake George is completed.

Hammond's nine city parks exceed 140 acres.

1927 Kaufman and Wolfs Lion Department Store moves to a new building on Hohman Avenue. First United Brethren, later Christ United Methodist Church, is organized. The congregation will build a church on 165th and Van Buren. The State Theater is bombed, perhaps because of a "merchants' war" between businessmen on Hohman Avenue and those on State Street. Wicker Park is dedicated on Flag Day by President Calvin Coolidge. A second Maywood School opens. The city's population supports 49 churches, 9 banks, 6 hospitals, 6,750 retail stores, and 9,405 passenger cars.

1928 Hammond's 116 industries employ 16,207 workers.

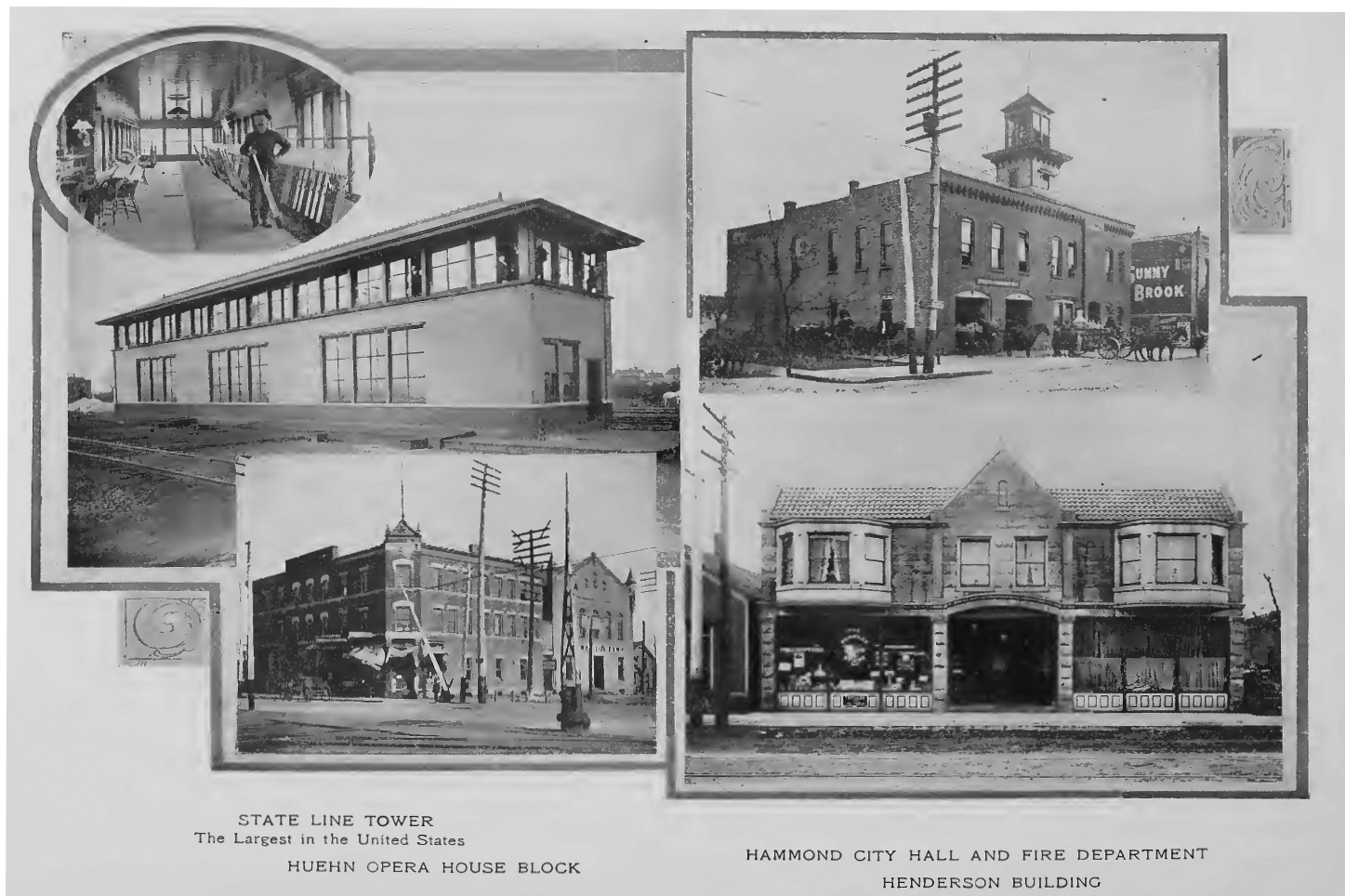
1929 State Line Power Plant, the largest in the world, opens on the lakefront. Porter

School opens on Wicker Avenue. Police Sergeant Leo Fox is killed in the line of duty. Standard Steel Car sells its huge Hammond plant to Pullman, which closes it almost immediately. First United Presbyterian Church, now Covenant Presbyterian Church, is organized. The congregation will later build a church in Hessville. Junior Toy opens a plant in Hammond, and becomes the city's fifth largest employer, before leaving in 1961. An eight-course dinner costs one dollar in the Indiana Hotel dining room.

1930 Hammond's population reaches 64,560, an increase of 79 percent in ten years. Lever Brothers begins operations in Robertsdale. Borden Dairy purchases Hammond Dairy. Goldblatt's Department Store opens on Hohman Avenue in the former Lion Store. Hammond YWCA is founded. The failure of every bank in the city begins with the Northern Trust and Savings, followed by First Polish Savings and Loan, the American Trust and Savings Bank, Maywood Trust and Savings Bank, and the People's Co-Operative Bank.

1931 First Trust and Savings closes, victim of a run, a depression, and overgenerous loan policies. 16,935 families are on relief in North Township. The bankrupt city government pays its debts with "scrip" and postdated checks, or "shinplasters." Saint Nicholas of Myra Byzantine Catholic Church is founded on Merrill Street. The congregation will move to Munster in 1964.

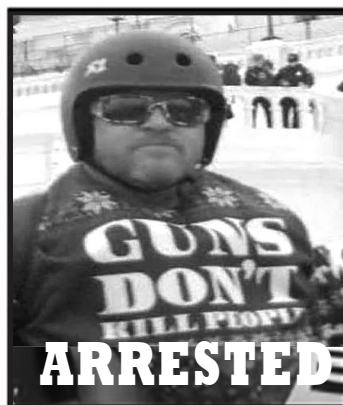
