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Have a Safe July 4th

The Hammond Fire Department would like to remind Hammond residents of Indiana fireworks laws during the July 4th holiday season.

Fireworks can be purchased only by persons 18 years of age or older.

Locations where fireworks may be discharged:

- On the user's property;
- On the property of someone who has consented to the use of fireworks on that property;
- At a special discharge location. (NOT IN THE MIDDLE OF THE STREET OR VACANT LOTS)

The use of fireworks is prohibited within the Hammond city limits except as follows:

- Between the hours of 5:00 p.m. and 2 hours after sunset

on June 29, June 30, July 1, July 2, July 3, July 5, July 6, July 7, July 8 and July 9.

- Between the hours of 10:00 a.m. and midnight on July 4.
- Between the hours of 10:00 a.m. on December 31 and 1:00 a.m. on January 1.

Violators of this ordinance can be cited by the Hammond Police Department. If you would like to report a violation of this ordinance, please call 911 and an officer will respond to the area. Please provide the location of the potential violation to the dispatcher.

When discharging fireworks it is always a good idea to keep a garden hose or bucket of water nearby to extinguish any accidental fires.

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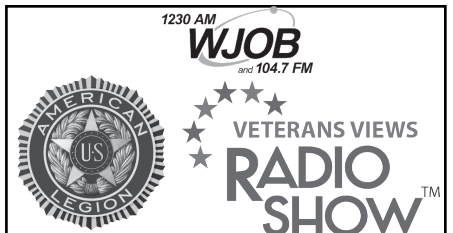
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Mayor's Gold Cup Roadie Run 5K along Wolf Lake

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Huhtamaki breaks ground for Expansion

Huhtamaki, a key global advanced manufacturer of sustainable packaging solutions, announced plans to expand its molded fiber product manufacturing unit in the city of Hammond, Indiana, as part of its investment in Fiber Solutions. The investment, which is expected to start ramping up towards the end of 2023, will enable Huhtamaki to better serve existing and new customers in North America with a broad range of sustainable, fully recyclable and compostable, fiber-based packaging solutions, manufactured from 100% recycled North American raw material.

“The investment in this new manufacturing capacity, adjacent to our existing site in Hammond represents our strong belief in the future development of the region and in the continued success of our customers – both current and new. The expansion will introduce new sustainable fiber-based products such as egg cartons and cup carriers – manufactured on state-of-the-art machinery developed by Huhtamaki – to our portfolio in the region and drive production efficiency. Our know-how in key packaging technologies and our strong track record in sustainability make us extremely well positioned to support our customers and deliver on their sustainability agendas and goals with innovative solutions”, says Charles Héaulmé, President and CEO of Huhtamaki.

Amounting to a total investment of almost USD 100 million, the expanded facility covers circa 23,000 square

meters and will be built adjacent to Huhtamaki’s existing Hammond manufacturing unit. Huhtamaki has operated in Hammond, Indiana, since 1948 and currently has approximately 140 employees. It expects to employ a further 100 new employees when fully operational.

“We have a 75-year history in the great community of Hammond. Our new investment builds on our existing technological expertise and will expand our manufacturing capacity, further leveraging the success of earlier expansions of other Huhtamaki units across North America and harnessing our global expertise in molded fiber technology. This investment will enable us to better serve our customers in the growing North American consumer goods and retail markets”, says Ann O’Hara, President, North America.

“The City of Hammond is very excited about the expansion of one of our core companies in Hammond. We worked hard with Huhtamaki’s team to keep them here and will continue to assist them as they grow into an even stronger facility. We are thrilled with their re-investment in Hammond, their growth of jobs and their continued commitment to the city”, says Mayor Thomas M. McDermott Jr.

Huhtamaki currently employs approximately 4,400 people across 18 manufacturing units in North America – 17 in the United States and 1 in Mexico – and is an industry-leading manufacturer of packaging for consumer-packaged goods,

The Battle of Gettysburg begins



One of the largest military conflicts in North American history begins on July 1, 1863, when Union and Confederate forces collide at Gettysburg, Pennsylvania. The epic battle lasted three days and resulted in a retreat to Virginia by Robert E. Lee's Army of Northern Virginia.

Two months prior to Gettysburg, Lee had dealt a stunning defeat to the Army of the Potomac at Chancellorsville, Virginia. He then made plans for a Northern invasion in order to relieve pressure on war-weary Virginia and to seize the initiative from the Yankees. His army, numbering about 80,000, began moving on June 3. The Army of the Potomac, commanded by Joseph Hooker and numbering just under 100,000, began moving shortly thereafter, staying between Lee and Washington, D.C. But on June 28, frustrated by the Lincoln administration's restrictions on his autonomy as commander, Hooker resigned and was replaced by George G. Meade.

Meade took command of the Army of the Potomac as Lee's army moved into Pennsylvania. On the morning of July 1,

advance units of the forces came into contact with one another just outside of Gettysburg. The sound of battle attracted other units, and by noon the conflict was raging. During the first hours of battle, Union General John Reynolds was killed, and the Yankees found that they were outnumbered. The battle lines ran around the northwestern rim of Gettysburg. The Confederates applied pressure all along the Union front, and they slowly drove the Yankees through the town.

By evening, the Federal troops rallied on high ground on the southeastern edge of Gettysburg. As more troops arrived, Meade's army formed a three-mile long, fishhook-shaped line running from Culp's Hill on the right flank, along Cemetery Hill and Cemetery Ridge, to the base of Little Round Top. The Confederates held Gettysburg, and stretched along a six-mile arc around the Union position. Lee's forces would continue to batter each end of the Union position, before launching the infamous Pickett's Charge against the Union center on July 3.

NIRPC to hold public comment period on amendments to the 2020-2024 and the 2022-2026 Transportation Improvement Programs

The Northwestern Indiana Regional Planning Commission (NIRPC) will hold a 21-day public comment period on two amendments to the 2020-2024 and 2022-2026 Transportation Improvement Programs (TIPs). The comment period begins today and will end on July 5, 2022. Amendment #20-22.05 contains surface infrastructure (roads, streets, bridges, trails, etc.) projects for Indiana Department of Transportation (INDOT) and several municipalities in Northwestern Indiana. Amendment 20-22.06 contains transit projects for Northern Indiana Commuter Transportation District (NICTD) and LaPorte TransPorte.

NIRPC's TIP is a short-range financial and spending plan for the utilization of federal transportation funding and for regionally significant projects. These federal funds can be used for highway, transit, and non-motorized transportation projects. NIRPC's TIP includes projects undertaken by municipalities, counties, transit operators, and the State of Indiana. Federal planning regulations guide the preparation and development of the TIP documents.

All comments received during the 21-day public comment period will be

compiled into a public comment report and responded to. This report will be made available to the public and distributed to the relevant NIRPC committees prior to any action on these items. It is anticipated that action will be taken at the July 12th, 2022 meeting of the Technical Planning Committee, followed by the July 21st, 2022 meeting of the NIRPC Commission.

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PNW designates new Center for High Energy Physics

Purdue University Northwest (PNW) has designated a new Center for High Energy Physics (CHEP) that will include the university's particle and high energy physics research and community outreach programs.

High energy physics is a subfield of physics that seeks to better understand the fundamental particles and forces of nature. The center will leverage its existing programs and promote PNW's unique status as a member in several circles of world-class physics research.

The center will operate under the leadership of Dr. Neeti Parashar, professor of Physics and the center's founder and director. Joining her will be Dr. James Dolen, associate professor of Physics, and PNW students to observe and participate in research funded by the National Science Foundation (NSF) at Fermi National Accelerator Laboratory (Fermilab) in Batavia, Illinois, and the European Organization for Nuclear Research (CERN) in Switzerland. High school students participating with PNW's QuarkNet Center are also able to analyze research from these laboratories using external sources. "Research conducted under the auspices of the center is at the forefront of the high energy physics community world-wide," says Parashar. "It places PNW on a global map of fundamental discoveries. We are also in a very unique situation, since PNW is the only high energy physics institution in Northwest Indiana. The creation of the center will provide more leverage for funding opportunities, inviting researchers of recognition and relevance, and aggressively recruiting Physics students into our program."

Parashar was a part of the research team, comprised of several thousand scientists, who in

2012 discovered the Higgs boson particle, at CERN. The Higgs boson responsible for the origin of mass is dubbed as "the God particle" for the non-scientific audience, in an attempt to explain the genesis of our existence. The scientists' discovery helped Peter Higgs and Francois Englert earn the 2013 Nobel prize for their predictions of the existence of the Higgs boson particle.

"Research opportunities for undergraduate students at PNW and master class sessions for local high school students will foster exposure to cutting-edge scientific discovery typically only available to post-graduate and doctoral students and other well-established researchers and scientists," says Parashar. "High energy physics helps us better understand the very nature of life by focusing on the smallest fundamental building blocks," says Kenneth C. Holford, provost and vice chancellor for Academic Affairs. "Purdue Northwest is home to two nationally recognized scientists that work in this area. In addition to identifying this as a priority research area, the launch of the Center for High Energy Physics will make these topics accessible and relevant to our community. As a premier metropolitan institution, our goal is to provide cutting edge educational outreach and training for high school students and instructors in the region."

"The Center for High Energy Physics at PNW will allow us to highlight the world-class research our faculty are doing in this field, and provide a framework to reach out and train students and teachers at the leading edge of science," says Dietmar Rempfer, interim dean of the College of Engineering and Sciences. "By offering opportunities for students and teachers in Northwest Indiana to study at international laboratory

facilities such as Fermilab and CERN, CHEP will expose our students and communities to modern science and facilitate knowledge transfer via several impactful modes of experiential learning." Others joining Parashar and Dolen as inaugural faculty members in research, outreach, and teaching through CHEP include Aaron Warren, associate professor of Physics, Gokarna Aryal, professor of Statistics, and Atanu Pathak, postdoctoral researcher of the high energy physics group.

Research at Fermilab and CERN

The CHEP's core research program involves collaboration on particle physics experiments at CERN and Fermilab.

Parashar is the principal investigator while Dr. Dolen serves as the co-principal investigator on their federally funded research via NSF. Parashar's group is responsible for contributing to the discovery of new particles in proton-proton collisions at CERN's Large Hadron Collider (LHC). The LHC is a 27-kilometer ring accelerating protons to higher energies producing colliding data in the search for new particles, and what might have happened at the origin of the universe.

One of PNW's specific tasks and responsibilities is building new silicon-based particle detectors with other collaborators. Since 2005, the group has contributed to a silicon pixel detector currently operating at the Compact Muon Solenoid (CMS) experiment at CERN. PNW students have also analyzed data collected by CMS and contributed to particle property measurements and searches.

CHEP collaborates with other experiments at Fermilab and collaborates with scientists, researchers, and academics.

QuarkNet Program

QuarkNet is a nonprofit, federally funded program that

addresses the education and outreach element nationally, internationally, and of CHEP. The program, which has centers at several universities in the U.S., offers classes and programming by college faculty for high school students and teachers in high energy physics. PNW, the University of Notre Dame, and Purdue West Lafayette are home to the state's three QuarkNet Centers.

Parashar leads PNW's QuarkNet program, which hosts a CMS Masterclass each year for local Northwest Indiana high school students. The students participate in hands-on activities analyzing data from the CMS experiment at CERN, and present their results to CERN and Fermilab scientists via videoconferencing.

PNW's QuarkNet program also hosts a workshop for local high school teachers dedicated to concepts of modern research and particle physics in the classroom.

In December 2021, Parashar was appointed to the U.S. QuarkNet advisory board for a five-year term, which oversees particle physics education and dissemination. Parashar is one of the ten professors appointed to the advisory board.

City of Hammond (1847-1984) Chronology (part 10)

*A little Hammond's history,

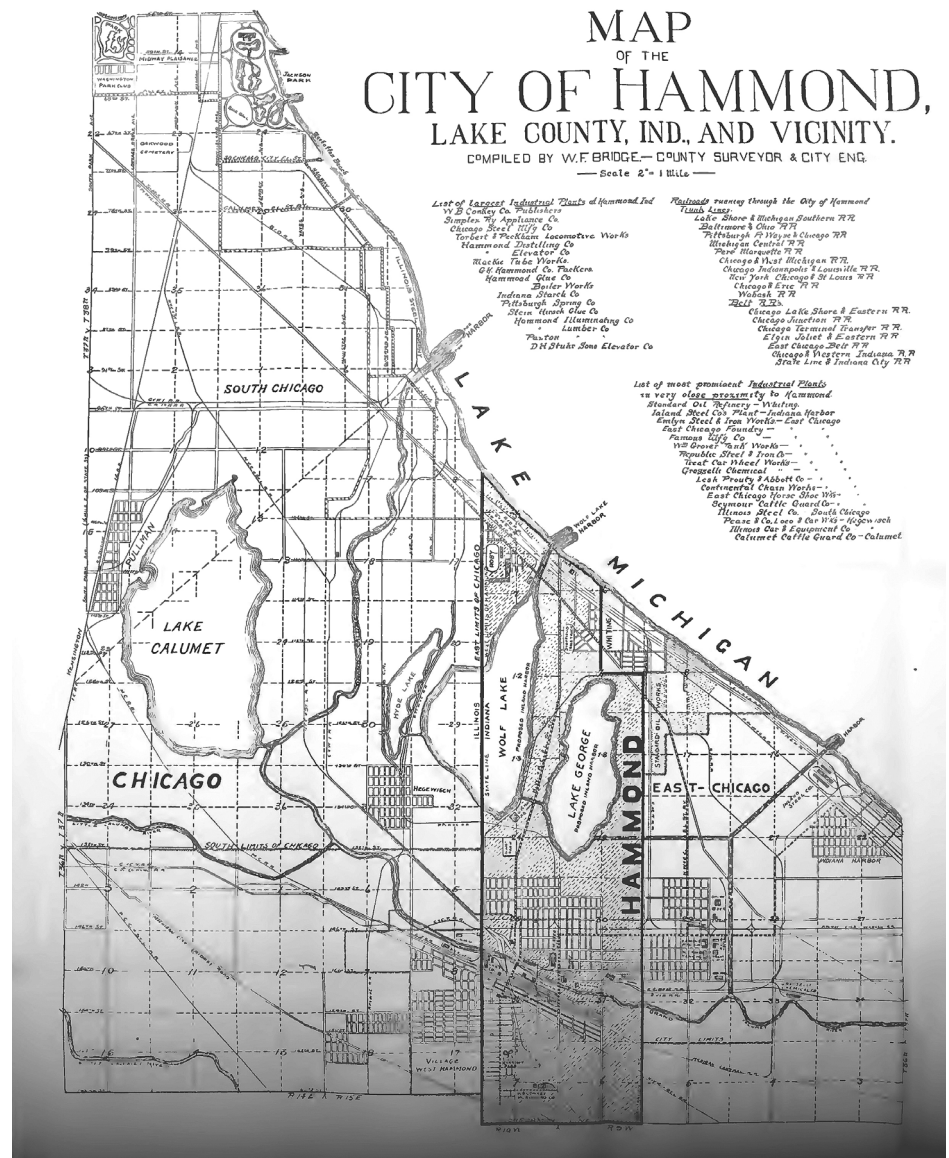
1965 A new Hammond Public Library opens on the downtown site once occupied by the State Theater. Orchard Drive School opens.

1967 Decentralization of the commercial district accelerates with the construction of a Zayre store in a mall on Columbia Avenue at 165th Street, and a K-Mart in another Indianapolis Boulevard south of the expressway. A new Morton School opens on Grand Avenue. Spohn Middle School opens on Sohl Avenue. A twenty-six inch snowfall paralyzes the area during late January and early February.

1968 The Briar East complex of apartments, shopping mall and an industrial park is announced. Howard Johnson's motel-restaurant opens on Indianapolis Boulevard at the expressway. The baby boom peaks in the city, with 23,830 students enrolled in the public schools.

1970 The census counts 107,983 residents of the city, the first population decline ever recorded in Hammond. All passenger runs to Chicago by main line railroad ends. The Erie is the last to terminate service. The school system hires Milford Miller, its first black principal, and Ernest Smith, its first black counselor.

1971 Middle School opens on 173rd Street. Turner Park Apartments for senior citizens

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open. A long and bitter strike closes the Swift plant in Woodmar.

1972 A new Superior Court House is dedicated. The former Borden Dairy plant is razed. The Erie Railroad closes its Hammond facilities.

1973 Eggers Middle School introduces the "open classroom" concept. Ashland Chemical reopens the former Swift Plant. American Steel terminates its forging operations and releases most of its workers. Bus service is terminated in the city. The 1903 Superior Court House is demolished.

1974 Calumet College moves from East Chicago to Hammond, and occupies the former Standard Oil Research Laboratories. The Federal

government agrees to fund a \$14 million Rail Relocation project, and supplies \$1.4 million to "study the problem." The Calumet Avenue Bridge over the rail yards opens. Rita Spitzer becomes the first woman member of the city Park Board. She will serve for eight years, including a term as Board President.

1975 The "Little Red School House" is moved, refurbished, and opened as a museum. Hammond Baptist Church operates "the world's largest Sunday School," with twenty thousand in weekly attendance. Youngstown Steel Door closes after a lengthy and bitter strike. Allied Structural Steel closes, and another 250 jobs disappear.

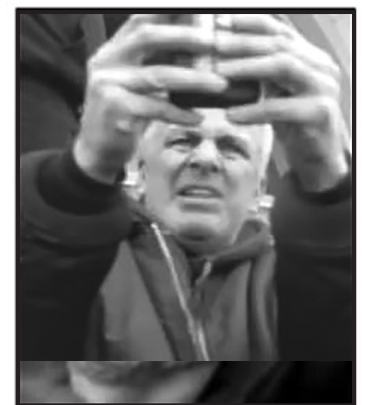
