Though Angela and Johnnett were hired from outside the organization, they both boast long careers in social work. For Johnnett, her passion for social services has spanned across nearly two decades. Having received her Masters of Social Work from Indiana University Northwest, Johnnett went on to gain 19 years of experience in social services. Angela also received her Masters of Social Work from Indiana University Northwest. She later went on to continue her career through multiple capacities of social work, serving youth within our community in a variety of ways, including support services within public schools. "We are very excited to add Angela and Johnnett to our administrative staff," Ellis Dumas, Boys & Girls Clubs of Greater Northwest Indiana's Vice President of Programs and Outcomes, said. "We recognize how truly valuable their combined experience can be for this organization, and I'm looking forward to the seeing the positive impact they can have on our families."

The new position, Director(s) of Social and Emotional Wellness, has a wide variety of responsibilities as both Directors will work within Clubs to facilitate Social, Emotional and Wellness (SEW) learning. This trauma-informed care fosters a positive foundation upon which members can learn about themselves and others in a safe, nurturing environment through focusing on the development of self-awareness, self-management, social awareness, relationship skills, and responsible decisionmaking skills.

In Indiana, it is reported that 21% of children under 18 reported having experienced two or more adverse experiences, compared to 18% nationally according the Indiana Youth Institute. Couple this with the fact that more than one quarter (26%) of Indiana's children (ages 3-17) have one or more emotional, behavioral, or developmental conditions compared to 22% nationally, the need for youth mental and emotional intervention is apparent.



# Re-dedication of Windrich Park at Jacobs Square

Named for a local war hero killed in the Korean War, the park is located near the city's downtown at 5553 Claude Ave., between the Second and Third council districts. Local officials are touting the park as a means of boosting the neighborhood and spurring continued area revitalization. Marine Staff Sgt. William G. Windrich died Dec. 1, 1950, while leading his platoon into action near Yudam-ni, Korea. Despite suffering head

and leg injuries, Windrich fought and returned for the wounded. The Hammond resident received the Congressional Medal of Honor on Feb. 8, 1952, for "valiant leadership, fortitude, and courageous fighting spirit."

The park includes a Kompan playground and a swing set, both on a cushion-like surface, along with a covered area with tables and seating

# First African American graduate of West Point



Henry Ossian Flipper, born into slavery in Thomasville, Georgia, in 1856, becomes the first African American cadet to graduate from the United States Military Academy at West Point, New York on June 14, 1877.

The United States Military Academy—the first military school in America—was founded by Congress in 1802 for the purpose of educating and training young men in the theory and practice of military science. Established at West Point, New York, the U.S. Military Academy is often simply known as West Point.

In 1870, the first African American cadet, James Webster Smith, was admitted to West Point but never reached the graduation ceremonies. It was not until 1877 that Henry Ossian Flipper became the first Black cadet to graduate.

Flipper was born to enslaved parents but came of age in Atlanta during Reconstruction. He was educated at American Missionary Association schools and Atlanta University (now Clark Atlanta University). In 1873, he was appointed to West Point. As he later wrote in his 1878 autobiography, The Colored Cadet at West Point, he

was socially ostracized by white peers and professors during his four years there.

After graduation, Flipper was appointed to serve as second lieutenant in the all-African American 10th Cavalry and stationed at Fort Sill in Oklahoma. The Ninth and 10th Cavalry were regiments of Black enlisted men who became known as the Buffalo Soldiers.


While at Fort Sill, Flipper negotiated with local Native American tribes and supervised several engineering projects, including the building of roads and telegraph lines. A drainage system he designed became known as "Flipper's Ditch" and is listed as a National Historic Landmark.

In 1881, he was accused of stealing over \$3,000 in commissary funds and relieved of duty. Though a courtmartial found him not guilty of embezzlement, he was dishonorably discharged for "unbecoming conduct" in 1882.

Flipper went on to a distinguished career as a civilian engineer and surveyor, and later served in Washington, D.C. as a consultant on Mexican relations. Flipper maintained his innocence throughout his later years and fought to clear his name. He died on May 3, 1940, in Atlanta, Georgia.

In 1976, the Army upgraded his discharge to honorable. And in 1999, President Bill Clinton granted Flipper a posthumous pardon, saying, "Henry Flipper did all his country asked him to do."

# The Names: 19 Children, 2 Teachers Killed in Uvalde School

As the United States lamented the nation's latest mass school shooting, in which a gunman killed 19 children and two adults after storming into an elementary school in Uvalde, Texas. A law enforcement official said all victims were in the same fourth-grade classroom.

Nineteen children were looking forward to a summer filled with Girl Scouts and soccer and video games. Two teachers were closing out a school year that they started with joy and that had held such promise. They're the 21 people who were killed Tuesday when an 18-year-old gunman barricaded himself in a fourth-grade classroom at Robb Elementary School in the southwestern Texas town of Uvalde. Some families have been willing to share their stories with The Associated Press and other media. Others asked for privacy.

One of the 10-year-olds aspired to be a lawyer someday. Another loved video games and anything with wheels.

And another was saving up for a trip to Disney World.

# Purdue University Northwest to honor David A. Roberts as first PNW Alumni Hall of Fame inductee



Purdue University Northwest (PNW) will honor David A. Roberts, retired chairman of Carlisle Companies and a 1974 graduate of PNW, as the first inductee to the PNW Alumni Hall of Fame.

Purdue University Northwest (PNW) has selected David A. Roberts as the first honoree to the university's new PNW Alumni Hall of Fame.

Roberts, a 1974 graduate, will be inducted into the Alumni Hall of Fame during PNW's Roaring Ahead Scholarship Gala on June 10. The gala event for nearly 600 people at the Hard Rock Casino Northern Indiana is the culmination of PNW's yearlong 5-75 Roaring Ahead anniversary celebration of the fifth year of Purdue Northwest, and the 75th year of its legacy institutions, Purdue Calumet and Purdue North Central. Proceeds from the gala will go toward scholarships for PNW students.

PNW is establishing the Alumni Hall of Fame to honor alumni who are high-achieving leaders in their fields, involved members of their community, and those who have engaged with PNW well beyond their time as students. The university

plans to issue a callout for nominations and induct a class into the Hall of Fame annually.

"Dave Roberts epitomizes the many ways alumni carry on PNW's mission to transform students' lives and our metropolitan region. He achieved great success in his career and he champions the advancement of education, technology and manufacturing jobs," stated PNW Chancellor Thomas L. Keon. "The nomination process demonstrated the expansive impact of PNW alumni in their work and in their communities. We are proud to recognize Dave for his accomplishments, which show current students just how far their aspirations can take them."

Roberts has been instrumental in supporting STEM education at PNW and developments that benefit the greater Northwest Indiana community. He recently committed \$3 million to establish the PNW Impact Lab, which will provide opportunities for economic development, fostering innovation and entrepreneurship. significant support led to the establishment of the David Roberts Center for Innovation and Design near the PNW campus in Hammond, which offers students a location to work as interdisciplinary teams within various engineering technology fields. He also provided significant support for PNW's Commercialization and Manufacturing Excellence Center (CMEC) and has faculty established student internships as well as employment opportunities.

During his extensive career, Roberts held engineering, manufacturing, management and leadership roles across a variety of industries including automotive, office equipment, printing and management services. He retired in 2020 as CEO and chairman of the board of Carlisle Companies in Charlotte, N.C., a publicly held leading supplier of innovative building products and energy-efficient solutions to create sustainable buildings.

A Marine Corps veteran and native of Steger, Illinois, he earned his bachelor's degree in Technology with distinction from the PNW Hammond campus, and his MBA from Indiana University.

"I am overwhelmed by the honor being bestowed on me by the leadership team of Purdue Northwest. When I graduated nearly 50 years ago, I had no idea how many doors my Purdue Northwest and Indiana University educations would open for me," Roberts said. "I began my working career first as a tool and die apprentice and then as welder before joining

the Marine Corps. When I was honorably discharged from the Corps, I realized that I could put the leadership skills that the Marines taught me to use in industry but knew I needed a formal education.

"Purdue Northwest's reputation for a quality education was ideal, and its location allowed me to attend school full-time while holding a full-time job," he added. "The decision to attend Purdue Northwest was one of the best decisions of my life. It has been a fantastic ride for a blue-collar kid from Steger, Illinois."

Roberts was selected from among many talented alumni who were nominated by fellow alumni, PNW faculty and staff, and community members. A selection committee reviewed all nominations based on individuals' leadership in their fields, community involvement and engagement with the university.

PNW will issue the next callout for nominees to its Alumni Hall of Fame in fall 2022.

# City of Hammond (1847-1984) Chronology (part 9)

A little Hammond's history, for the young to learn and the old to remember

1949 John Wilhelm opens the Hoosier State Bank on State Street. Over the years it will expand to nearly a dozen locations.

**1945** Peace brings the veterans home, but also causes renewed fears of the return of depression and mass unemployment.

1946 Prosperity brings an amazing building boom to the Region, and construction temporarily becomes Hammond's largest industry. War-related technical training courses given locally lead to the establishment of Purdue University Calumet Campus.

1947 Quonset huts are built south of 175th Street between Chestnut and Columbia to alleviate the city's housing crisis. Hessville celebrates its centennial. Police officers John

Gurka and Donald Cook are killed during an investigation.

1948 Swift & Company opens a plant on 165th Street to produce industrial oils and gelatins. Rand McNally purchases W. B. Conkey Printing Company. Keyes Fibre opens a paper processing plant on Indianapolis Boulevard at 167th Street. Hammond Altrusa Club is formed.

1949 Construction begins on the Indiana portion of the Tri-State Expressway between Chicago and Detroit, and proceeds at the rate of one mile a year.

1950 The city's population reaches 87,594, a ten year increase of 25 percent. Hammond Tech moves into a new building on Sohl Avenue.

1951 Hammond celebrates its "Settlement Centennial." Construction begins on a building for Purdue University Calumet Campus on a 167-acre site in Woodmar. The structure was later named in honor of

Campus Director Millard Gyte. A new Porter School Building opens on 171 st Street. Nick Van Til's grocery store opens on Indianapolis Boulevard at 171st Street.

1952 Caldwell School is constructed. Christ Lutheran congregation builds a church at 171st and Indianapolis. Saint Demetrios' Greek Orthodox Church is built on Hohman Avenue. Woodmar Methodist (now Wodmar United Methodist) Church is organized, and meets in Hessville American Legion Hall. The cornerstone of its church was laid in 1953.

1954 The Little Calumet floods much of south Hammond after ten days of steady rain. Riley School opens on River Drive.

1955 The Woodmar Shopping Center, Hammond's first "suburban mall," opens. The Great Lakes Warehouse burns, again ravaging the site of the packinghouse. Jefferson School opens on Northcote Avenue. Jones & Laughlin purchases the W.W. J. Holliday Steel Plant.

1956 NIPSCO builds a Cosby Bernard designed corporate headquarters on Hohman and Russell. Harbison-Walker opens an industrial brick factory in Hessville. LaFayette School opens.

1957 A special census of the city counts 108,000 residents, an increase of 21,000 in seven years. American Can builds a million-dollar plant of 165th Street in Hessville. Wolf Lake Park is added to the city's recreational facilities. A new Morton School opens on Marshall Avenue.

**1958** The Hammond YMCA is organized. Howard Johnson

opens the city's first modern highway motel on Calumet Avenue at 141st Street. Hammond Brass becomes Hammond Valve. Saint Josephat Ukrainian Church is founded.

**1959** A 116-day steel strike and an oil refinery strike paralyze the Region's economy.

1960 Hammond's population reaches 111,698, a 28 percent gain since 1950. Gavit Junior-Senior High School opens. Annie L. Burns Hicks becomes Hammond's first black schoolteacher. The Hammond Historical Society is formed.

1961 A J. C. Penney store opens on Hohman Avenue in the downtown area. Officer Frank H. Dunn.Jr., dies in the line of duty.

**1962** A new Riverside School opens on Michigan Avenue.

**1963** A million-dollar fire burns several downtown stores. Columbia Avenue overpass and Cline Avenue Expressway open.

1964 Saint Margaret Hospital constructs a seven million dollar, eight-story addition, which adds 280 beds at a cost of seven million dollars. Calumet Flexicore begins producing precast concrete building products. Dowling Park opens.

1965 Sergeant Donald Vinson, USMC, becomes the first Hammond citizen to die in the Vietnam War. Hammond hires Donald Rowe, its first black policeman. Miller School opens on New Hampshire Avenue. Mercantile National Bank builds a new corporate headquarters on Hohman Avenue. A Holiday Inn opens on Calumet Avenue at the Toll Road.



Line from Hammond to Sixty-third Street


