Two Purdue Northwest CMEC-affiliated startups earn regional pitch competition investments

Two startups affiliated with Purdue University Northwest's (PNW) Commercialization and Manufacturing Excellence Center (CMEC), including one spearheaded by two PNW staff members, recently received investment agreements from Elevate Ventures' Elevate Nexus regional pitch competitions to help grow and scale their respective entrepreneurial pursuits.

Startups Plantennas and Paradise Spreads collectively earned \$100,000 in the Elevate Nexus Northern Indiana regional competition. Following their applications and business presentations, Plantennas received \$80,000 in seed funding and Paradise Spreads received \$20,000 in pre-seed funding.

The Elevate Nexus regional pitch competitions are tailored to university and community-based entrepreneurship and innovation centers and partners. Accepted applicants for annual regional pitch competitions compete in geographic tiers in Indiana: northern, central and southern. Based on the stage of their startups' development, entrepreneurs can

compete in either the pre-seed or seed categories to demonstrate their products' viability and market outlook.

Elevate Ventures' Elevate Nexus pitch competitions are made possible by funding from the Economic Development Administration and the Indiana Economic Development Corporation.

Plantennas is a Chesterton-based startup under the purview of PNW staff members Alexandra Moran, clinical instructor of Entrepreneurship, and Mont Handley, Entrepreneur in Residence and associate director of CMEC. The concept involves placing sensors in biodegradable pots that give plants unique IDs, documented as a radio-frequency identification (RFID). The startup advertises these sensor-equipped plants, whether grown domestically or shipped to other locations, have far-reaching implications of protecting against plant patent infringement, controlling inventory and monitoring plant health. The startup uses technology and robotics with genome phenotyping

to reimagine horticulture and propagation efficiency.

Paradise Spreads is a product under Schererville-based startup Emily's Foods, LLC, led by Emily Edwards. Paradise Spreads is a collection of organic, gluten-free, plant-based spreads and snacks. Edwards also previously earned second place in the 2021 PNW Big Sell competition.

CMEC is a community-facing resource at PNW, under the auspices of PNW's College of Technology, that serves as a catalyst for economic development and technological transfer in Northwest Indiana. Through consulting, business planning, prototype development and more, CMEC helps local entrepreneurs take their innovations from concept to commercialization. CMEC has helped generate more than 40 patents and more than 20 Simple Agreement for Future Equity (SAFE) agreements with commercial ventures in the last three years.

"CMEC actively helps boost clients' potential by augmenting their entrepreneurial qualification

and concept viability," said Handley. "The CMEC-affiliated entrepreneurs who pitched in this latest Elevate Nexus northern regional competition are going up against other very qualified, prepared entrepreneurs affiliated with other proven large economic incubators in northern Indiana, so we're punching above our weight."

Plantennas and Paradise Spreads can also apply for the Elevate Nexus statewide pitch competition, which takes place in August.

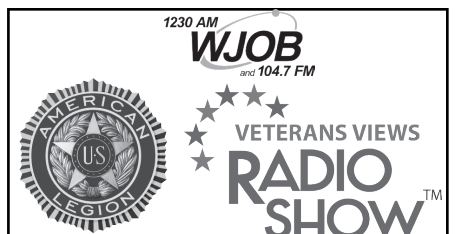

including Ronnie Van Zant and Steve Gaines. Since then, the band tragically lost Allen Collins, Billy Powell, Leon Wilkeson and Hughie Thomasson, yet Lynyrd Skynyrd rocks on with original member Gary Rossington (He was absent from the Fest, but send a message) joined by

Johnny Van Zant, Rickey Medlocke, Mark "Sparky" Matejka, Michael Cartellone, Johnny Colt, Peter Keys, Dale Krantz Rossington and Carol Chase.



The rock and roll powerhouse And so Skynyrd stands, "still unbroken." "People may say, 'they need the money,' well I don't think any of us need the money," Van Zant says. "It's just that we love the music, it's bigger than the money, it's not even about that any more. We have to make a living, sure, but it's about the legacy of Lynyrd Skynyrd, and what it stands for, what the fans are all about. There's nothing like getting

out there playing a great show with Skynyrd and seeing people love this music."

With a catalog of over 60 albums, sales beyond 30 million worldwide and their beloved classic American rock anthem "Sweet Home Alabama" having over two million downloaded ringtones, Rock & Roll Hall of Famers Lynyrd Skynyrd remains a cultural icon that appeals to all generations.

PT-109 sinks; Lieutenant Kennedy is instrumental in saving crew

On August 1, 1943, a Japanese destroyer rams an American PT (patrol torpedo) boat, No. 109, slicing it in two. The destruction is so massive other American PT boats in the area assume the crew is dead. Two crewmen were, in fact, killed, but 11 survived, including Lt. John F. Kennedy.

Japanese aircraft had been on a PT boat hunt in the Solomon Islands, bombing the PT base at Rendova Island. It was essential to the Japanese that several of their destroyers make it to the southern tip of Kolombangara Island to get war supplies to forces there. But the torpedo capacity of the American PTs was a potential threat. Despite the base bombing at Rendova, PTs set out to intercept those Japanese destroyers. In the midst of battle, Japan's Amaqiri hit PT-109, leaving 11 crewmen floundering in the Pacific.

After five hours of clinging to debris from the decimated PT boat, the crew made it to a coral island. Kennedy decided to swim out to sea again, hoping to flag down a passing American boat. None came. Kennedy began to swim back

to shore, but strong currents, and his chronic back condition, made his return difficult. Upon reaching the island again, he fell ill. After he recovered, the PT-109 crew swam to a larger island, what they believed was Nauru Island, but was in fact Cross Island. They met up with two natives from the island, who agreed to take a message south. Kennedy carved the distress message into a coconut shell: "Nauru Is. Native knows posit. He can pilot. 11 alive need small boat."

The message reached Lieutenant Arthur Evans, who was watching the coast of Gomu Island, located next to an island occupied by the Japanese. Kennedy and his crew were paddled to Gomu. A PT boat then took them back to Rendova. Kennedy was ultimately awarded the Navy and Marine Corps Medal, for gallantry in action.

PT-109, a film dramatizing this story, starring Cliff Robertson as Kennedy, opened in 1963.

Organized in 2000, BBB4E serves public, private, parochial, and home school students ages 5-18. Our goal is to provide high quality fine arts experiences during evening hours. Things You Can Do to Save Gas While Driving



- **Drive less**
- **Warm up your car for shorter lengths of time**
Idling your car for anything over a minute wastes fuel and omits large amounts of greenhouse gas.
- **Buy gas early or late in the day**
Gas is cooler earlier in the day, and more dense. As temperatures rise, gas density falls and you get less of it when you pump.
- **Slow down and drive steady**
Speeding increases fuel consumption and decreases fuel economy as a result of tire rolling resistance and air resistance. While vehicles reach optimal fuel economy at different speeds, gas mileage “usually decreases rapidly at speeds above 50 miles per hour.” Reducing speed 5 to 10 mph returns 7% to 14% better mileage.
- **Monitor when and how you brake**
Braking excessively wastes gas.
- **Car Pool**
Americans are much more likely to commute alone these days. The decline in carpooling is “the most significant change in commuting behavior in the past few decades.” In 1980, 20% of Americans carpooled; by 2013 it was

down to 9%. But carpooling and ridesharing can cut your fuel costs in half. Fun fact: Car pooling now, unfortunately, makes the car heavier than a generation ago; the

average American weighs 15 pounds more than in the late 1980s.

- **Don't Carry extra Weight**
Adding 100 pounds lowers fuel economy by 2%. The junk in the trunk—golf clubs from last summer, the overdue library books, the Goodwill donations that never make it to the bin—add up
- **Combine Trips**
Combining trips can save you time and money by avoiding unnecessary stopping and starting of your vehicle, which can be an issue in colder climates where it takes longer for your engine to reach its most fuel-efficient temperature. Shorter trips can use twice as much fuel as one long, multi-purpose trip that covers the same distance, when the engine is warm and at its most fuel-efficient temperature.
- **Turn off the engine**
Turn off your vehicle you are waiting, excess idling is a major waste of gas.
- **Eliminate wind resistance**
Remove unneeded car racks and carriers.
- **Avoid gas stations near the highway**
Gas stations near the highway are usually the most expensive.

- **Don't wait until your tank is almost empty to fill up**
You'll be stuck paying for whatever gas you can find nearby.
- **Monitor your tires**
Under-inflated tires tend to wear out quicker and waste gas.
- **Tune the engine**
A properly tuned engine uses less gas.
- **Change filters**
Clean filters help to keep cars running more fuel efficiently.
- **Use the correct motor oil**
Using the wrong motor oil can cause the engine to work harder and waste gas.
- **Turn off the A/C**
Using you're A/C too much can make your car a gas-guzzler.

- **Manage your speed**
Use cruise control whenever possible to manage your speed and conserve fuel.
- **Choose the best route**
The shortest route isn't always the most fuel-efficient way to go. Use the route with the least stop signs and stop lights.
- **Fill your gas tank near state lines**
Due to different tax rates, you may save a bundle just by crossing into another state.
- **Consider buying a fuel-efficient car**
Even several models of affordable non-hybrids can get 40 miles per gallon.

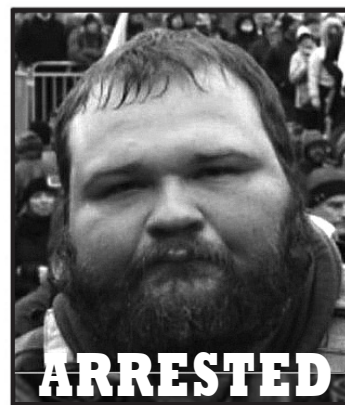

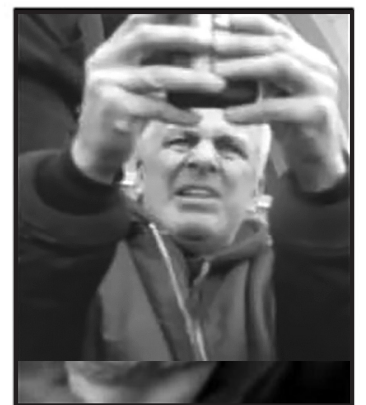
