Hammond Education Foundation Awards College Scholarships





Blood donors needed now to help prevent a seasonal blood shortage

Chance at gas for a year for those who come to give in August, plus \$10 e-gift card

Just as most cars need to be refueled constantly, so does the nation's blood supply. The American Red Cross has faced a concerning drop in blood donations this summer. Donors are needed to make an appointment to give in August to help prevent a blood shortage.

The decline in donations has caused the Red Cross blood supply to shrink nearly 20% in recent weeks. The availability of blood products will continue to decline if donations do not increase. People should not wait until they hear there is a blood shortage to give. Type O negative blood donors especially needed now.

"This is a concerning trend that may soon make it tougher to keep blood products stocked on hospital shelves," said Paul Sullivan, Red Cross senior vice president of donor services. "By choosing a time to give now, donors can help pump up the blood supply for those in immediate need of lifesaving care and those who rely on transfusions for treatment."

Donors can schedule an appointment to donate using the Red Cross Blood Donor App, by visiting RedCrossBlood.org or by calling 1-800-RED CROSS (1-800-733-2767).

Fuel up on us

As blood donations drop, gas prices have reached all-time highs in the U.S. As a thankyou, all who come to give Aug. 1-31 will be automatically entered for a chance to win gas for a year, a \$6,000 value. There will be three lucky winners. Everyone who comes to give blood in August will also receive a \$10 e-gift card to a merchant of choice.*

Blood drive safety

The Red Cross follows a high standard of safety and infection control. The Red Cross will continue to socially distance wherever possible at blood drives, donation centers and facilities. While donors are no longer required to wear a face

mask, individuals may choose to continue to wear a mask for any reason. The Red Cross will also adhere to more stringent face mask requirements per state and/or local guidance, or at the request of blood drive sponsors. Donors are asked to schedule an appointment prior to arriving at a drive.

How to donate blood

Simply download the American Red Cross Blood Donor App, visit RedCrossBlood.org, call 1-800-RED CROSS (1-800-733-2767) or enable the Blood Donor Skill on any Alexa Echo device to make an appointment or for more information. All blood types are needed to ensure a reliable supply for patients. A blood donor card or driver's license or two other forms of identification are required at



check-in. Individuals who are 17 years of age in most states (16 with parental consent where allowed by state law), weigh at least 110 pounds and are in generally good health may be eligible to donate blood. High school students and other donors 18 years of age and younger also have to meet certain height and weight requirements.

Blood and platelet donors can save time at their next donation by using RapidPass® to complete their pre-donation reading and health history questionnaire online, on the day of their donation, before arriving at the blood drive. To get started, follow the instructions at RedCrossBlood. org/RapidPass or use the Blood Donor App.

Woodstock festival opens in Bethel, New York



On August 15, 1969, the Woodstock music festival opens on a patch of farmland in White Lake, a hamlet in the upstate New York town of Bethel.

What unfolded over the next three days from August 15-18, 1969 became legendary—as a music event and as a generational moment. As a long-haired man identified as "Speed" told the New York Times on August 18, 1969, "The whole thing is a gas. I dig it all, the mud, the rain, the music, the hassles."

Promoters John Roberts. Joel Rosenman, Artie Kornfield and Michael Lang originally envisioned the festival as a way to raise funds to build a recording studio and rock-and-roll retreat near the town of Woodstock, New York. The longtime artists' colony was already a home base for Bob Dylan and other musicians. Despite their relative inexperience, the young promoters managed to sign a roster of top acts, including the Jefferson Airplane, the Who, the Grateful Dead, Sly and the Family Stone, Janis Joplin, Jimi Hendrix, Creedence Clearwater Revival and many more.

Plans for the festival were on the verge of foundering, however, after both Woodstock and the nearby town of Wallkill denied permission to hold the event. Dairy farmer Max Yasgur came to the rescue at the last minute, giving the promoters access to his 600 acres of land in Bethel, some 50 miles from Woodstock.

Early estimates of attendance increased from 50,000 to around 200,000, but by the time the gates opened on Friday, August 15, more than 400,000 people were clamoring to get in. Those without tickets simply walked through gaps in the fences, and the organizers were eventually forced to make the event free of charge. Folk singer and guitarist Richie Havens kicked off the event with a long set, and Joan Baez and Arlo Guthrie also performed on Friday night.

Though Woodstock had left its promoters nearly bankrupt, their ownership of the film and recording rights more than compensated for the losses after the release of a hit documentary film in 1970. Later music festivals inspired by Woodstock's success failed to live up to its standard, and the festival still stands for many as an example of America's 1960s youth counterculture at its best.

Woodstock through my 8 years old eyes

August 13, 1969. I had just become 8 years old. Cake, candles and of course, my gift. A bicycle with training wheels. I quickly grabbed it and started making rounds around the block until it got dark. Some kids from the neighborhood made fun of my bike's training wheels, so I decided that I would learn to bike without them as soon as possible, and I kept biking. What can be better for an 8 year old boy?

In the night, while I was tired and lying in my bed, my parents came to wish me once again happy birthday, and to tell me that one more gift was waiting for me. We would go on a trip together and the destination was a surprise. My parents would frequently leave for a day or two, and never would they tell me where for. This was the first time that they would take me with them. We would depart the following day in the afternoon and we would travel through the night. Excited, I fell asleep and dream about myself biking without my training wheels.

We loaded our sleeping bags and my bike, there was no chance of anyone complaining about my bike, and we started. On the way, we stopped and picked up some hitchhikers who signaled us that they were going at the same place. The next day, we arrived at a hugegrass field, perfect for making rounds with a bike, and there were people. There where people everywhere. Happy people dressed colorfully, singing and dancing. Far away, on a hillside, there was a huge stage. There, my parents told me, various people would go and they would start playing music for the rest of us.

I didn't really care about music that much, back then. I had my bike and I was cycling inside the crowd, which was getting bigger and bigger as time passed. Soon, I took of the training wheels and continued like I was unstoppable. The people would clap their hands, and I would think that they were clapping for me. Every time I would fell down, smiling people, strangers to me, would come and help me get up and I would just keep making my rides. Someone even gave me a flower halo for my head. In the night, I slept in the grass, while surrounded by people. I slept while keeping my hand on my bike.

In the next day, the music kept playing tirelessly, and so was the crowd. At some point, it started raining, but nothing changed. The volume of the music did not drop, the crowd would dance, and I would make rounds. I would fell in the mud, I would get up and I would just keep going. At some point, my parents saw me and I thought I was going to get punished since I was full of mud, but to my great surprise, my father picked me up in his hands so that he would also get mud on himself, and asked me if I was having fun. I thought that my birthday this year where the best of my life.

At some point, while I was making my rounds with my bicycle, the people started yelling, or at least I thought they did, "Hey Joe", and I would wonder why they would call me that while my name is George. So I would keep bicycling while humming the various songs I had heard those days. On the last day, my bicycle was in pieces. The tires had broken and it wouldn't move anymore. Necessarily, when we were leaving, we had to leave it behind, because we had a lot of walking to do. My parents told me with no grief "after all you enjoyed it and you will remember it forever", and I just shook my head, without being sure about that. The crowd kept on dancing and singing, even though there was no music anymore. We walked quit a distance until we finally found our car. On the way back to our car, a lot of people, I didn't know, gave me a ride on their shoulders and cover me with flowers, while I was thinking of my bike.

Fifteen years later. The times had changed. Different location, different place, different interests. Less biking and more music now, that's what I thought. Spring of 1984. I was in a concert in the grounds of the university in Patra Greece. With my friends and our band on the stage this time. The crowd was dancing and singing and clapping. I was playing the bass and singing the chorus from Jimi Hendrix's "Hey Joe" with my eyes closed while imagining of that bike, forgotten in that grass field in Woodstock. My parents had been right. I never forgot about it.

half From way around the world, the Ukrainian National wrestling team is now training in Northwest Indiana Hammond at Central High School.

Zahn Beleniuk, a Ukrainian wrestler, said it was about 4 or 5 a.m. on Feb. 24 when he heard Russian bombs dropping in Kyiv.

"We did not invade Russia," said

Beleniuk. "Russia came to us on our land and everyday they kill our children, destroy our infrastructure and do a lot of bad things in this war."

No one on this team has not felt Putin's war of aggression.

Anna Krysenko is the team's translator and married to the head coach, Volodymyr Shatskykh.

His mom, dad, brother, and sister are part of the resistance, too. But his best friend is gone.

"Until it happened, nobody believes that it would happen because they used to say the Russians and Ukrainians are really close," he said. "Now we see that they are our enemies."

Occasionally, they head to the city and Ukrainian Village to the camaraderie of their fellow countrymen and women who are in Chicago. Those times are good for their hearts and souls while they train their bodies for the competition in September.

When that time is over, they will head back home to join the fight again in one form or another. They say winning is what they'll do the Russians will held accountable for war crimes.




