Famous Marilyn Monroe "skirt" scene filmed



The famous picture of Marilyn Monroe, laughing as her skirt is blown up by the blast from a subway vent, is shot on September 15, 1954 during the filming of The Seven Year Itch. The scene infuriated her husband, Joe DiMaggio, who felt it was exhibitionist, and the couple divorced shortly afterward.

Monroe, born Norma Jean Mortensen and also known as Norma Jean Baker. At age 16, she quit high school and married a 21-year-old aircraft plant worker named Joe Dougherty. In 1944, her husband was sent overseas with the military, and Monroe worked as a paint sprayer in a defense plant. A photographer spotted her there, and she soon became a popular pin-up girl. She began working as a model and divorced her husband two years later. In 1946, 20th Century Fox signed her for \$125 a week but dropped her after one film, from which her scenes were cut. Columbia signed her but also dropped her after one film. Unemployed, she posed nude for a calendar for \$50; the calendar sold a million copies and made \$750,000.

Monroe played a series of small film roles until 1950, when Fox signed her again. This time,

they touted her as a star and began giving her feature roles in the early 1950s. In 1953, she starred with Jane Russell in Gentlemen Prefer Blondes, playing fortune hunter Lorelei Lee. Her tremendous sex appeal and little-girl mannerisms made her enormously popular.

After her divorce from baseball legend Joe DiMaggio, Monroe searched for more serious roles and announced she would found her own studio. She began studying acting with the famous Lee Strasberg at the Actors Studio in New York. She gave an impressive comic performance in Bus Stop in 1955. The following year, she married intellectual playwright Arthur Miller. She appeared in the hit Some Like It Hot in 1959.

Monroe made her last picture in 1961, The Misfits, which Miller wrote especially for her. She divorced him a week before the film opened. She attempted one more film, Something's Got to Give, but was fired for her frequent illnesses and absences from the set, which many believed to be related to drug addiction. In August 1962, she died from an overdose of sleeping pills. Her death was ruled a possible suicide. Since her death, her popularity and mystique have endured, with numerous biographies published after her death. Her ex-husband Joe DiMaggio continued to send flowers to her grave every week for the rest of his life.


Hammond NAACP Freedom Fund Luncheon

Lakeshore PBS combats national decline in charitable giving

Lakeshore PBS battles a harsh economic landscape as donations are down nation-wide while many individuals face economic hardships due to rising inflation. The station has launched multifaceted fundraising campaigns in attempts to raise the \$150,000 needed to offset a fundraising shortfall before the station's fiscal year ends on Sept. 30.

As a community-licensed, viewer-supported public television station, individual donors provide the largest portion of the station's revenue, and overall community support accounts for roughly half of the station's annual budget. Membership manager, Riley Egan, said that support from community members is what determines the livelihood of a public broadcasting station.

"Though we are extremely thankful for all the support we have received to-date, we can't overlook the level of uncertainty that comes with being below our fundraising goals. With the current economic landscape and numerous other stations across the nation facing similar situations, we find this final fundraising push to be imperative. We're increasing our communication efforts through mail, email, and on-air

messaging to let members know how important their support really is," Egan said.

In an effort to garner viewer participation in closing the fundraising gap, Lakeshore PBS has scheduled a special pledge event they are calling "Sounds of the '60s." This collection of special musical programs will air between Sept. 18-25 and feature rare, archival performances from the likes of Roy Orbison, Kenny Rogers, Burt Bacharach, James Taylor, and The Carpenters. Other fan-favorite programs like "Concert for George," "Country Pop Legends," and "'60s Pop, Rock & Soul" will also be included as part of this special event.

Another source of community support for Lakeshore PBS comes from local businesses that support the station's mission through corporate sponsorships and underwriting. These businesses receive on-air announcements acknowledging their financial support to viewers. While this is different from traditional advertising, Lakeshore's Vice President of Development Carl Kurek says businesses can potentially benefit from a "halo effect" as viewers associate underwriters with the quality

local, statewide and national programming broadcast by Lakeshore PBS.

"The quality and uniqueness of our local programming is a major draw to viewers here in the Region, but we also strive to broadcast Indiana-specific content as this is typically lacking in the Chicagoland market. Then all of that is complimented by excellent programs from our national partners like PBS and American Public Television." Kurek said. "Our goal is to offer trusted, exceptional programming that keeps our audience informed, inspired and entertained. So when businesses invest in us, they are supporting something much bigger."

Lakeshore Public Radio's programming manager, Jose Rodriguez, records the voiceover for many of the station's underwriting messages. He said underwriting messages are crucial for the station's sustainability and reflect the level of impact the station has on the surrounding communities.

"As I voice more and more of the promos for underwriting here at Lakeshore Public Media, it's interesting to see the wide variety of businesses from around the area that support local, grass roots broadcasting. Our goal is to connect and educate communities. It's a clear indication we are reaching that goal when other organizations recognize our station for having a mission worth collaborating with," Rodriguez said.

Cultivated from the previous community support, Lakeshore Public Media has produced hundreds of locally-focused segments throughout the past year. This resulted in a multitude of recognitions including two Awards of Dsitinction from the 28th Annual Communicator Awards, eight Silver Telly Awards from the 43rd Annual Telly Awards, and an Emmy at the 63rd Annual Chicago/Midwest Emmy Awards.

Red Cross urges preparedness as climate disasters increase

Climate change is affecting people across the country as the U.S. faces more frequent and intense weather events. **During National Preparedness** Month in September, the American Red Cross urges everyone to prepare now for these emergencies.

"Every day, we see firsthand how families and communities are suffering and depending on us for help," said Jennifer Pipa, vice president of Disaster Programs for the Red Cross. "Our volunteers are continuously on the ground, setting up shelters, arranging for hot meals and offering comfort to people forced from their homes. Please take some time during National Preparedness Month to get your family ready."

In 2021 more than 40% of Americans — some 130 million people — were living in a county struck by a climate disaster. Just this summer, deadly flooding in Kentucky and Missouri, fastmoving wildfires in California and multiple heat waves

nationwide are clear examples of how more intense climaterelated disasters are happening more often and devastating communities.

HOW TO GET READY FOR A DISASTER

It takes just three simple steps to help prepare your household for potential disasters — 1) Get a Kit. 2) Make a Plan. 3) Be Informed.

- 1. First, build your emergency kit with a gallon of water per person, per day, nonperishable food, a flashlight and a battery-powered radio. Also include a first aid kit, medications, supplies for infants or pets, a multi-purpose tool and personal hygiene items. And don't forget to add copies of important papers, cell phone chargers, blankets, maps of the area and emergency contact information.
- 2. Next, plan what to do in case you are separated from your family during an emergency and what to

do if you have to evacuate. Make sure to coordinate your plan with your child's school, your work and your community's emergency plans. Include your pets in your emergency plans. Remember, if you and your family need to evacuate, so does your pet.

3. Finally, stay informed by finding out what emergency situations may occur where you live, work and go to school, how local officials will contact you during a disaster and how you will get important information, such as evacuation orders.

Depending on the people in your household, there might be additional considerations to take into account as part of your emergency planning. Older adults or people with mobility, hearing, learning or seeing disabilities may need to create a support network of people that can help during an emergency. Create a plan tailored to their capabilities, any help they may need and who can provide it, especially if they need to evacuate or if the power goes out for several days.

Disasters can be scary for children. Take time to talk with your kids about preparing for common emergencies, how to stay safe and what to expect. The Red Cross has free programs and tools to help, visit redcross.org/YouthPrep for more information.


