Hammond Education Foundation Announces College Scholarship Applications are Open

The Hammond Education Foundation (HEF) is excited to announce that their 2023-2024 college scholarship applications are through December 16, 2022. The Hammond Education Foundation Scholarship Fund was established to assist graduating seniors from the School City of Hammond with some of the costs associated with the first year of post-secondary education. With the generosity of our donors, HEF is able to fund scholarships valued at \$1,000 to \$2,500 to students.

For the 2022-2023 academic year, seventeen School City of Hammond graduates were awarded scholarships from the Hammond Education Foundation. These scholarships included the Mark Biel Memorial Scholarships, the Draskovich-Brundidge Scholarships, the Hammond Education Foundation Legacy Scholarship, the James Hornak Memorial Scholarship, and the Dr. Gary Jones Memorial Scholarship.

New in 2023-2024 is the Keltner Future Teacher Scholarship which offers up to \$10,000 per year, for four consecutive years, to a graduate of a Hammond public high school to help a future teacher enter today's most rewarding, critical, and challenging profession. The recipient must attend full-time at an accredited college or university, major in education and maintain a 2.5 or higher grade point average. While not a requirement, upon completion of the undergraduate program, the graduate is encouraged to teach in an Indiana public school.Other terms and conditions may apply.

The Keltner Future Teacher Scholarship is funded by Jess & Margie Keltner retired School City of Hammond administrators and teachers to encourage the continuation of the teaching profession.



Bette Midler is born in Honolulu, Hawaii



By the time she appeared as the final guest of Johnny Carson's 30-year career on The Tonight Show and brought tears to the unflappable host's eyes with an emotional performance of "One For My Baby (And One More For The Road)," she was an established star of stage and screen—a Tony winner, an Oscar nominee, a Grammy winner and a multimillionselling recording artist. It would be difficult, however, to imagine a more unorthodox path to mainstream stardom than the one followed by Bette Midler— "The Divine Miss M"—who was born in Honolulu, Hawaii, on December 1, 1945.

Equal parts Judy Garland and Ethel Merman, Bette Midler early on set her sights on making it in New York City. Arriving in New York in 1965, Midler soon tried out for the national touring company of Fiddler On The Roof only to land the role of Tzeitel (and the job of singing "Matchmaker" eight times a week) in the Broadway production instead. After several years of singing in various Manhattan nightclubs on the side, she got what would prove to be the most important gig of her career, singing poolside

nightly at the fabled Continental Baths, a gay bathhouse/cabaret in the basement of the Ansonia building on West 72nd Street Manhattan. was there, in collaboration with a young pianist named Barry Manilow, that she fully developed

her "Divine Miss M" stage persona—a brash, campy interpreter of numbers ranging from "Chattanooga Choo Choo" and "Leader Of The Pack" to "Superstar" and "Delta Dawn." It was at the Continental Baths that Atlantic Records chief Ahmet Ertegun discovered Midler and signed her to record the album that made her a star: The Divine Miss M (1972). That album, which made an unlikely pop hit out of "Boogie Woogie Bugle Boy" (Billboard #8, June 1973), earned Midler the Best New Artist award at the 1973 Grammy Awards.

Though she would remain a beloved favorite of a significant fan base over the next decade or so, her only pop hit during that period was the theme song from the 1979 movie The Rose. In 1986, however, her flagging Hollywood career was revived by a comic turn in Paul Mazursky's Down And Out In Beverly Hills. Two years later, she would earn a Record of the Year Grammy and her first and only #1 pop hit with "Wind Beneath My Wings," from the 1988 movie Beaches, in which Midler co-starred alongside Barbara Hershey.

Red Cross Response in 2022

2022 has been a year of crisis for families and communities — from extreme climate disasters to global emergencies like the conflict in Ukraine to the first-ever national American Red Cross blood crisis.

"This year's crises overwhelmed the most vulnerable, who have relied on generous support to cope with dire needs," American Red Cross President & CEO Gail J. McGovern said. "It takes all of us to help ensure no one faces an emergency alone, whether it's felt by millions of people or a single person. Join us during the holidays to give hope to those in need facing future crises by making a financial donation or a lifesaving donation of blood. Your support makes all the difference."

Responding to Extreme Climate-Driven Disasters This year's extreme disasters in the U.S. are clear examples of the increasing frequency and intensity

of the climate crisis — which continues to disproportionately affect the most vulnerable, especially those already struggling to pay the bills and dealing with health and disability needs.

Red Cross volunteers have worked 24/7 to deliver shelter, food and care for tens of thousands of disasters across the country this year, including 15 billion-dollar disasters — more than twice the number that struck annually just two decades ago.

What's more, while Red Cross emergency shelters are meant to be temporary, some shelters have operated for over a month to help people in need. A lack of affordable housing is driving this demand for shelter following disasters such as Hurricane Ian, severe floods in Kentucky and wildfires out West — where Red Cross volunteers responded non-stop for six months to ongoing blazes. Across the country, volunteers

have also secured a safe place for people to stay after home fires, which comprise most Red Cross annual disaster responses.

Helping Millions affected Global **Emergencies** Internationally, the conflict in Ukraine has forced millions of people to flee for their lives. With such vast needs, the American Red Cross has provided financial donations and international crisis responders to support the global Red Cross network's response on the ground, which spans more than a dozen neighboring countries to deliver food, shelter, medical care, emotional support and other critical aid for displaced families. Meanwhile, the American Red Cross has also provided financial support to the ongoing hunger crisis in Africa. Overall this year, as part of the world's largest humanitarian network, the American Red Cross has provided humanitarian aid in more than 108 countries, including water

sanitation programs in Guatemala and the delivery of relief supplies in the Philippines.

Overcoming the First-ever Red Cross Blood Crisis In January 2022, the Red Cross experienced its worst national blood shortage in over a decade, due to ongoing collection challenges and varied hospital demand during the pandemic. Patients in need of lifesaving blood transfusions relied on an outpouring of support from hundreds of thousands of generous blood donors to overcome the crisis.

Beyond national headlines, the need for blood is constant, as one in seven patients entering a hospital will need a blood transfusion. Every day, Red Cross blood donors are the lifeline for car accident victims, parents with complicated childbirths, individuals battling cancer and people with sickle cell disease.
