



Governor's Parkway Railroad Overpass Project Receives NEPA Approval

Mayor Thomas McDermott, Jr. and the City of Hammond are pleased to announce that the Governor's Parkway Railroad Overpass Project has received approval under the National Environmental Policy Act (NEPA), marking a significant milestone in the effort to alleviate long-standing traffic disruptions caused by blocked railroad crossings in the Hessville neighborhood. Two years following the public hearing, the much-anticipated approval allows the project to begin the property acquisition phase.

"The rigorous environmental review process is complete," said Mayor McDermott. "We have mitigated for all environmental aspects of the project including tree replacement, wetland mitigation, identification and protection of Endangered Species, among others. I'm happy to finally move forward with improving safety response for our residents and solving the decades old problem of stopped trains in Hessville."

The project was awarded a \$7,029,392 grant from the U.S. Department of Transportation's Federal Railroad Administration (FRA) through the Railroad Crossing Elimination (RCE) Grant Program. The funding will support the construction of a grade-separated overpass over the Norfolk Southern line east of Parrish Avenue, eliminating two at-grade crossings at

Parrish and Arizona Avenues. The new overpass will be integrated into the Governor's Parkway corridor, enhancing traffic flow and safety for motorists, pedestrians, and emergency responders.

In 2018, the project received \$5.45M from Indiana's Local Trax program, which provides state matching funds for rail crossing safety improvements. The Local Trax program is part of the Indiana's commitment to enhancing transportation infrastructure and safety across Indiana.

The Governor's Parkway Railroad Overpass Project is expected to commence construction in Summer 2026, with completion anticipated in late 2027. This project is part of a broader initiative to improve rail crossing safety and efficiency in Northwest Indiana, addressing concerns raised by residents and first responders regarding blocked crossings and delayed emergency response times.

INDOT will be seeking public comment on the approved Environmental Assessment for 45 days anticipated to begin on Monday, May 5, 2025 following the publication of the statutory legal notice. Comments can be made by email to GovernorsParkwayProject@cmtengr.com. Comments cannot be received prior to publication of the legal notice.

Madeleine Albright, America's first female secretary of state, is born

Madeleine Albright, America's first female secretary of state, is born Marie Jana Korbelova on May 15, 1937, in Prague, Czechoslovakia (now the Czech Republic).

The daughter of Czech diplomat Josef Korbel, Albright fled to England with her family after the Nazis occupied Czechoslovakia in 1939. Though Albright long believed they had fled for political reasons, she learned as an adult that her family was Jewish and that three of her grandparents had died in Nazi concentration camps. The family returned home after World War II ended but immigrated to the United States in 1948 after a Soviet-sponsored Communist coup seized power in Prague. Josef Korbel became dean of the school of international relations at the University of Denver (where he would later train another female secretary of state, Condoleeza Rice). After graduating from Wellesley College in 1959, Albright married Joseph Medill Patterson Albright of the prominent Medill newspaperpublishing family. With an MA and PhD from Columbia University under her belt, Albright headed to Washington, D.C., where she worked for Maine's Senator Edmund S. Muskie and served on the National Security Council in the administration of President Jimmy Carter. She and Joseph Albright divorced in 1982. During the Republican presidencies of Ronald Reagan and George H.W. Bush, Albright worked for several nonprofit organizations and taught at Georgetown University's School of Foreign Service.

With a Democrat—Bill Clinton—in the White House again in 1992, Albright found herself at the center

of Washington's most powerful circle. In 1993, Clinton appointed her ambassador to the United Nations. In that post, Albright earned a reputation as a straight-talking defender of American interests and an advocate for an increased role for the U.S. in U.N. operations. In late 1996, Clinton nominated Albright to succeed Warren Christopher as U.S. secretary of state. After her nomination was unanimously confirmed by the Senate, she was sworn in on January 23, 1997.

As secretary of state, Albright pursued an active foreign policy, including the use of military force to pressure autocratic regimes in Yugoslavia and Iraq, among other troubled regions. Her trip to North Korea in October 2000 to meet with leader Kim Jong Il made her the highest-ranking U.S. official to visit that country at that time. She drew some criticism for her tough position on U.S. sanctions against Iraq, which led to many civilian deaths in that country.

Albright's term ended with the election of President George W. Bush in 2000. Though there was talk of her entering Czech politics, she returned to her teaching post at Georgetown, accepted several board positions and became chair of a nonprofit organization, the National Democratic Institute for International Affairs.

On March 23, 2022, Albright died at age 84. Just one month before her death, she spoke out on the impending Russian invasion of Ukraine, writing in a New York Times op-ed Russian President Vladimir Putin would be making a "historic mistake" by invading Ukraine.

In fact, earlier this year, we launched an updated curriculum that reflects the latest advancements in water safety, including new

content regarding surveillance scanning.

The quality of our Red Cross lifeguard training curriculum is a critical component of our nation's aquatics safety. We use a variety of measures to ensure providers understand and follow

our curriculum and protocols, including comprehensive training and recertification training using standardized teaching resources, tools, and updates. Our robust Quality Assurance department of Red Cross employees focuses on preserving and promoting highquality instruction.

Red Cross continually assesses and refines its systems to promote quality training and to maintain curriculum integrity. We use IT system controls to enforce several key training requirements. We also regularly seek feedback from students to help us quickly identify quality issues.

Additional details about our lifeguarding curriculum are available online. Specific lifeguarding topics addressed in our Lifeguarding Manual and Lifeguarding Instructors Manual.

Investments and Longstanding Commitment to Drowning Prevention

As humanitarian organization, the Red Cross puts the safety of those we serve at the forefront of all we do. Over the past several years, we have increased our investments in an array of aquatics programs, including our water safety programs and services like our Aquatics

Centennial Campaign, which works to reduce drowning rates in locations where those rates are above the national average.

According to Centers for Disease Control and Prevention's data, when looking at Centennial programs as a whole, counties with Red Cross Centennial programs saw an overall 10% decrease in drowning rates versus a 6% decrease nationally. Since the Centennial program's launch in 2014, more than 144,000 people have enrolled, and Campaign partners have delivered more than 120,000 sets of swim lessons.

As a community, we all play an important role in keeping those in and near the water safe.

Things to Know About Water Safety

Ensure every member of your family learns to swim so they at least achieve skills of water competency: able to enter the water, get a breath, stay afloat, change position, swim a distance then get out of the water safely.

Employ layers of protection including barriers to prevent access to water, life jackets, and

close supervision of children to prevent drowning.

Know what to do in a water emergency – including how to help someone in trouble in the water safely, call for emergency help and CPR.

Why Is Water Safety So Important?

It only takes a moment. A child or weak swimmer can drown in the time it takes to reply to a text, check a fishing line or apply sunscreen. Death and injury from drownings happen every day in home pools and hot tubs, at the beach or in oceans, lakes, rivers and streams, bathtubs, and even buckets.

The Red Cross believes that by working together to improve water competency - which includes swimming skills, water smarts and helping others water activities can be safer... and just as much fun.

As always, the Red Cross remains committed to delivering its mission, including aquatics safety, disaster relief, and blood collections, to prevent and alleviate human suffering in the face of emergencies."




